Thus, retaining records for at least six years after discharge provides a balance between regulatory requirements, patient care needs, and operational efficiency.

Relying solely on duration, the name of a referring physician, or just patient demographics would not provide the necessary detail and framework that a proper treatment plan entails. Each of these elements is essential for effective patient management and to align with standards of care in physical therapy practice in Arizona.

Each of these actions aligns directly with the regulatory framework established by the Board, emphasizing the importance of compliance and ongoing professional development in physical therapy practice.
