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## **Explanations**

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## 1. How often should coronal polishing be performed on patients?

Coronal polishing should be performed every six months or as recommended based on the individual patient's needs. This timeframe aligns with the general dental hygiene practices that support optimal oral health. The rationale behind this frequency is to effectively remove plaque, stains, and biofilm that accumulate on the surface of the teeth. Regular polishing contributes to preventing caries and periodontal disease by maintaining smooth tooth surfaces that are easier to keep clean. Therefore, the recommendation of every six months or as suggested by a dental professional strikes the right balance between effective oral hygiene and patient safety.

It helps to ensure that any remaining plaque in these areas is removed, further contributing to oral hygiene. Finally, disclosing again can serve as an effective confirmation step. By using the disclosing agent once more, the dental professional can assess their effectiveness in removing plaque and provide feedback to the patient about their oral hygiene practices. This sequence – disclose, polish, floss, and disclose – promotes a thorough cleaning process while allowing for clear communication with the patient about their oral health.*
