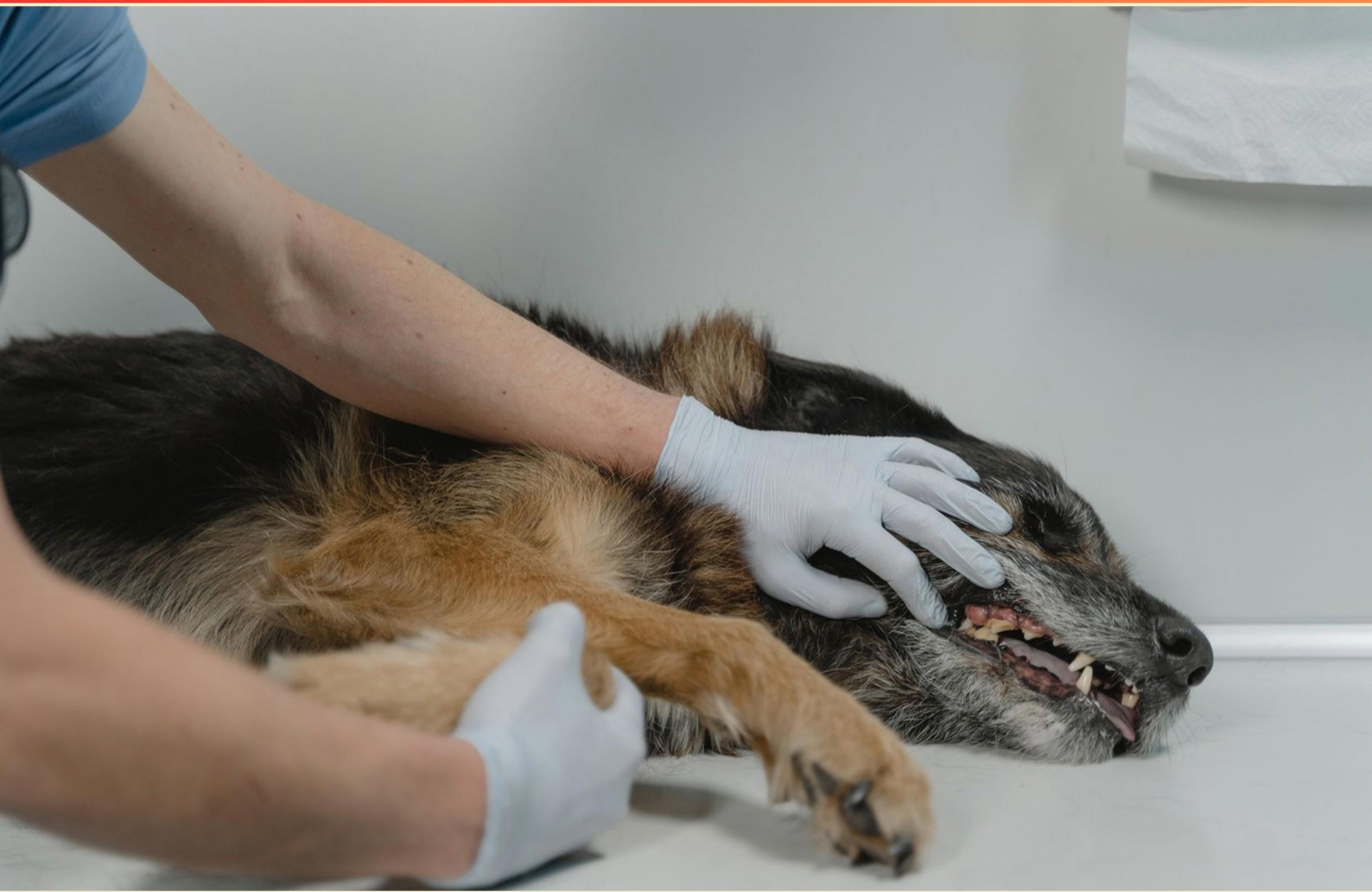

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Explanations

The AVMA primarily focuses on various professional aspects, advocacy, and education of veterinarians, and the Council on Education for Veterinary Medicine is concerned with accreditation processes for veterinary educational programs. Similarly, the National Veterinary Medical Association serves a different niche within the veterinary community, often emphasizing diversity and the needs of minority veterinary professionals.
