This repetition enhances the phrasing, making it more engaging and memorable. In contrast, the other phrases do not feature this same initial consonant repetition. "Cold as ice" employs a simile to draw a comparison between coldness and ice. "Bright like a star" also utilizes a simile, comparing brightness to a star. "Time flies" is an idiomatic expression that conveys the passage of time, but without the alliterative quality present in the correct choice. Thus, "Busy bees buzz" stands out as the clear example of alliteration.
