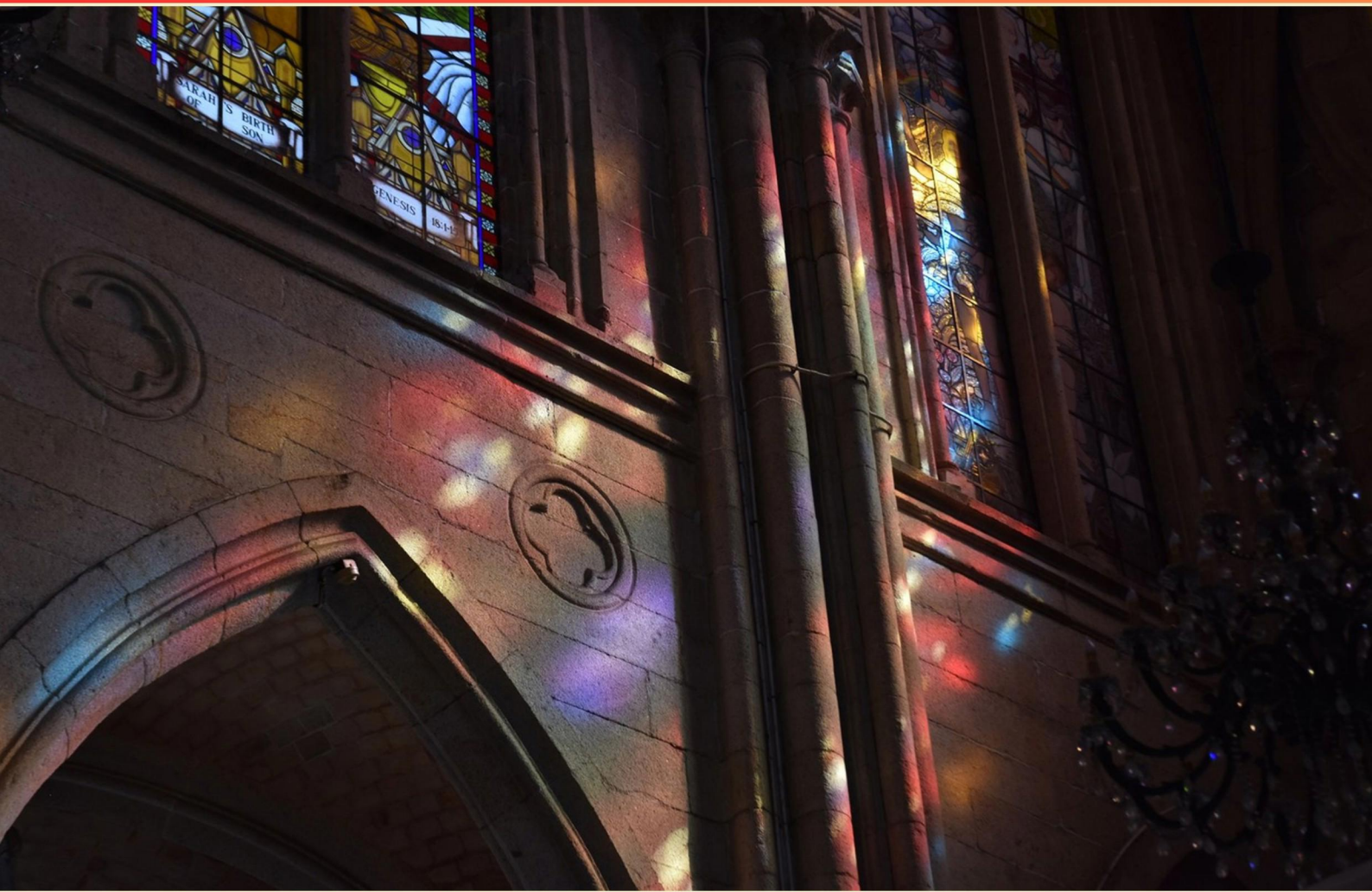

Initiation of those who have not yet been baptized into the Church happens most prominently at the Easter Vigil. On that night, catechumens complete their preparation and are baptized, then confirmed, and receive the Eucharist for the first time, formally joining the Catholic Church. The Easter Vigil symbolizes new life in Christ, making it the traditional moment for welcoming catechumens into full communion. Pentecost marks the coming of the Holy Spirit and the growth of the Church, but it is not the standard time for catechumen reception. The Feast of Booths is a Jewish festival and has no place in Christian initiation. Christmas Eve is a major vigil before Christmas but is not the typical day for the catechumen reception ceremony.

Sutra is a concise teaching text or discourse that serves as a short, memorable thread of instruction. In Buddhism, sutras are the Buddha's sermons and dialogues recorded as scripture. In Hinduism, sutras appear as compact manuals or aphorisms that summarize larger systems—think of the Yoga Sutras or the Brahma Sutras. In Jainism, sutras appear in the Agama literature, presenting compact doctrinal guidance. The word itself evokes something tight and to the point, meant to be transmitted and recalled easily. That's why describing a sutra as a short scriptural text or discourse used in Hinduism, Buddhism, and Jainism fits best. The other options describe things that aren't sutras: long legal codes, prayers, or festivals associated with other traditions.

Baptism in the early church was the rite that brought someone into the Christian community, typically after a period of instruction or a profession of faith. By the third century, baptizing infants had become common in many communities, as evidenced by references to household baptisms and the practice of including children in the rite. This is why the statement about infant baptism being normal in the third century is the best fit: it reflects how baptism expanded beyond one-off adult conversions to include infants within the faith community. The method of baptism wasn't limited to immersion; while immersion was common for many adult converts, pouring (affusion) and sprinkling were also practiced, especially for infants or those who couldn't be immersed. Baptism was not reserved only for those who asked after instruction; rather, communities typically baptized after some catechetical preparation, though eager converts and households seeking entry were often baptized as well. And though Easter was a significant and traditional time for baptisms, the rite occurred at other times too, depending on local practice.

In gurdwaras it rests on a throne, is read aloud in services, and its hymns—composed by the Sikh Gurus and other saints—inform prayers, philosophy, and how believers treat others. Because it's considered a living Guru, its authority extends to doctrine, ethics, and community conduct, guiding practices like remembering God, working honestly, serving others, and practicing equality. This makes it central to both personal devotion and communal worship, far beyond a ceremonial text or a simple collection of hymns.

The other statements mix up these roles or describe beliefs rather than governance aims, making the separation-and-neutrality contrast the best fit.

Guru Nanak founded Sikhism, teaching devotion to one God, equality, and truthful living, in the Punjab region toward the end of the 15th century. The Guru Granth Sahib, the central sacred scripture, is revered as the eternal Guru—the living guide for Sikhs—after the line of human Gurus ended with the tenth Guru. It was compiled by the Gurus and contains the hymns of Guru Nanak and later Sikh Gurus, plus devotional writings by saints from Hindu and Muslim traditions, all gathered to direct worship and daily conduct. Other traditions point to different founders and sacred texts: Siddhartha Gautama founded Buddhism and the Tripitaka is Buddhist scripture; Krishna and the Vedas belong to Hinduism; Mahavira founded Jainism and the Agamas are Jain scriptures.

Sikhism centers on the Guru Granth Sahib, Hinduism has a wide range of scriptures with diverse creation stories, and Buddhism focuses on the Buddha's teachings rather than a single creation account in a canonical text. Because the Quran is uniquely tied to Islam, the religion associated with creation accounts found in the Quran is Islam.

The Great Schism refers to the formal split of the Christian Church around 1054 into two main branches: the Western Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church. It happened because of intertwined theological, political, and cultural differences. The West emphasized the authority of the pope as universal head of the Church, while the East favored a more collaborative leadership among bishops and rejected certain papal claims. Theological disagreements also mattered, such as the filioque clause added to the Creed in the West without Eastern consensus, and other disputes over doctrine and liturgical practices. These debates, carried and amplified by political rivalries and growing cultural distance between Latin-speaking Europe and Greek-speaking Byzantium, solidified into a lasting division. The long-term effects on Christian traditions were substantial. The schism created two distinct branches with their own identities, structures, and practices. The Western tradition developed a centralized papal authority and Latin liturgy, while the Eastern tradition maintained a network of autocephalous churches with a focus on the Byzantine rite and Greek—leading to separate calendars, sacraments, and theological emphases. Because of this enduring separation, many regions followed one tradition or the other, shaping centuries of religious, cultural, and political life in Europe and beyond, and influencing later ecumenical dialogue as Christians sought reconciliation.

These five books are known as the Torah, also called the Pentateuch. The word Torah means instruction or teaching in Hebrew, highlighting that these books lay out laws, covenants, and foundational stories for Israel. The name Pentateuch comes from Greek and means five scrolls or volumes, reflecting the five-part collection Genesis through Deuteronomy. They form the opening section of the Hebrew Bible and Christian Old Testament, distinct from The Prophets and The Writings; Psalms, for example, is part of The Writings. So Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy are collectively known as the Torah, or Pentateuch.

The concept here focuses on those who are in the process of learning and preparing before baptism—the catechumens. Catechumens are literally the ones being instructed in Christian beliefs, creeds, morals, and practices during a period of formal catechesis. This preparation leads to baptism and full initiation into the church. The other terms point to different ideas: agape refers to the love feast or love in action, not a group undergoing baptismal prep; an apologist is someone who defends the faith; and the Didache is an early teaching document outlining Christian practice, not the name of the group being educated for baptism.
