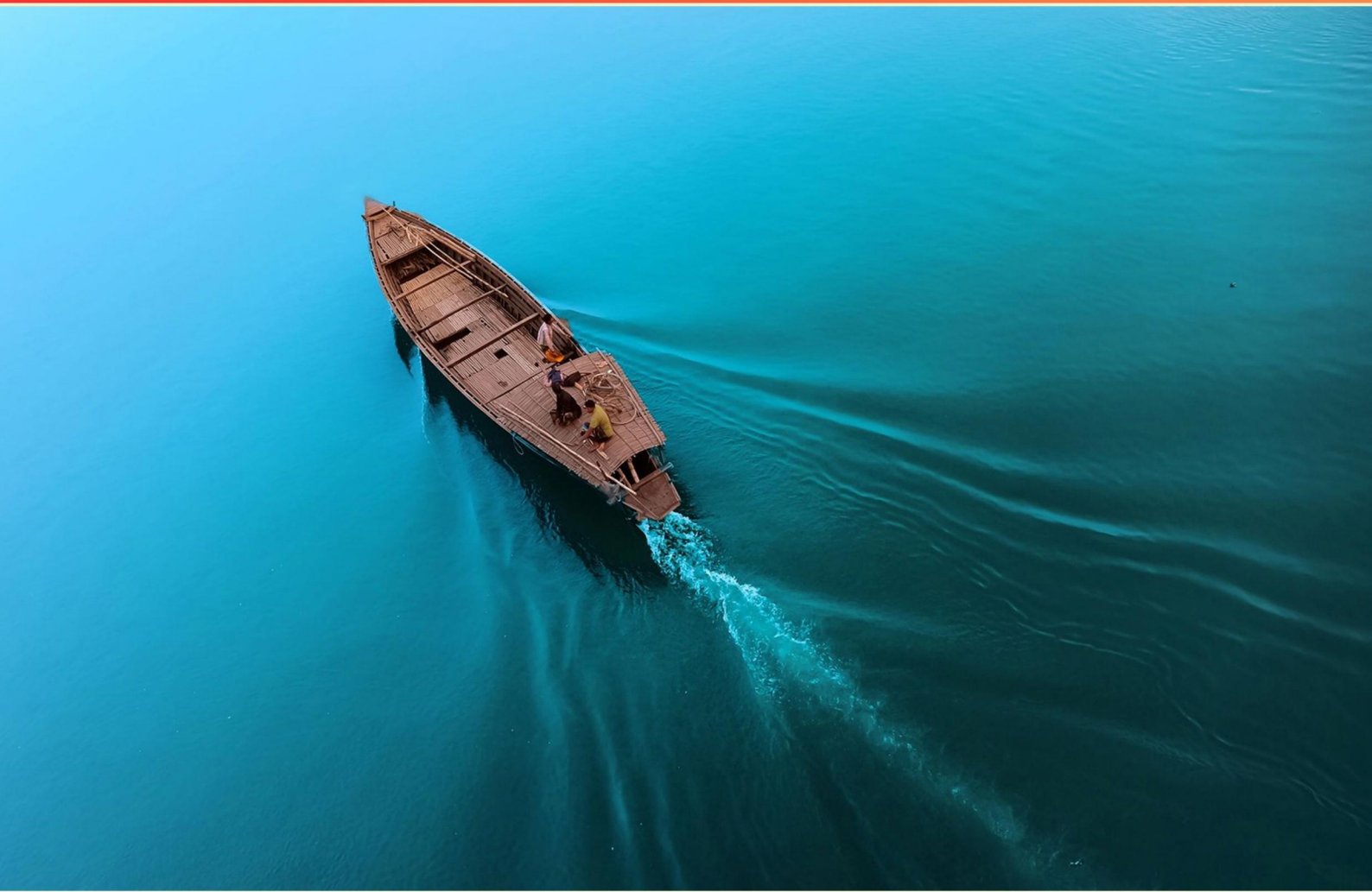

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Explanations

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1. What condition must Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs) be in?

Personal Flotation Devices (PFDs) must be in good and serviceable condition in order to be considered safe and effective.
