A pharmacy intern or pharmacist-in-charge (PIC) is required to provide an inventory of controlled substances within a specific timeframe after ceasing employment to ensure proper tracking and accountability of these substances. In Arkansas, the law stipulates that the PIC must complete the inventory of controlled drugs within 5 days after ceasing their position. This requirement serves important regulatory and safety purposes. The category of controlled substances that tends to have the lowest potential for abuse is Class V. Examples include medications like lomotil (diphenoxylate and atropine) and various preparations containing codeine in limited doses. As a result, these substances are subject to less stringent controls than those categorized as Class II, III, or IV, reflecting a consensus that they present a significantly lower risk when used as directed. The other categories, on the other hand, include substances which have increasing potential for abuse and dependency from Class II (high potential for abuse with severe psychological or physical dependence) to Class IV (lower risk but still regulated due to potential for abuse). Thus, Class V stands out as the category with the least potential for abuse.

This practice helps maintain a higher standard of care and deepens the pharmacist-patient relationship, fostering better adherence to medication regimens over time. Moreover, it aligns with the broader patient care goals in pharmacy, aiming to enhance health outcomes through informed medication use. In contrast, the other options either limit counseling to only certain occasions or do not capture the comprehensive intent of continuous patient education, which is essential for effective pharmaceutical care.
