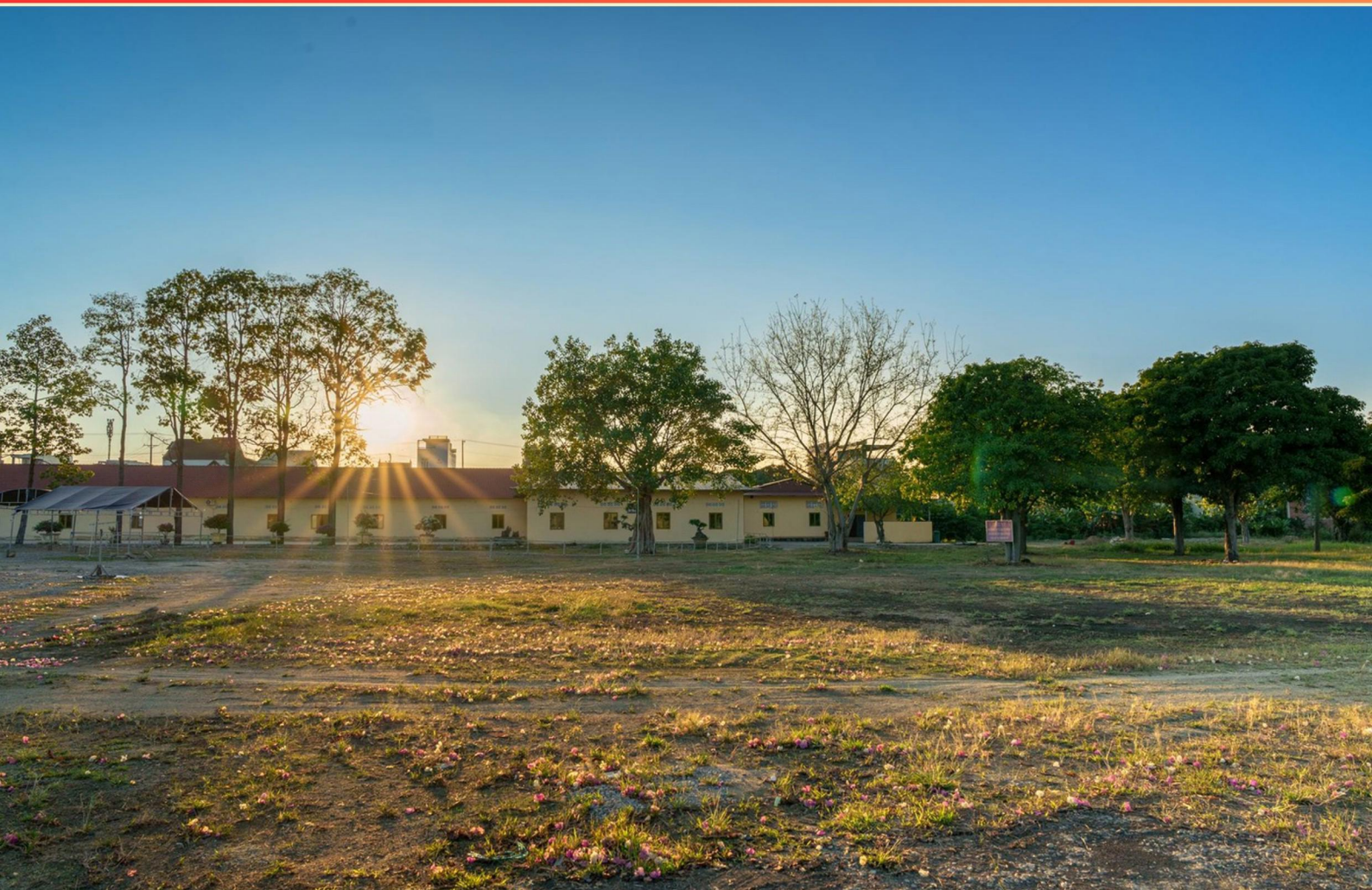

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Explanations

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1. Which rank comes first when sorting these four ranks alphabetically: Colonel, Brigadier General, Major General, General?

- A. Colonel
- B. Brigadier General**
- C. Major General
- D. General

Alphabetical ordering compares letters from the start of each rank. Look at the first word of each: Brigadier General begins with B, Colonel with C, Major General with M, and General with G. Since B comes before C, G, and M, Brigadier General is listed first when sorted alphabetically.

2. Which rank is one step below General?

In the Army, general officers are shown by the number of stars, which indicates seniority. General is a four-star rank, and the rank directly beneath it is Lieutenant General, a three-star rank. This places Lieutenant General exactly one step below General in the hierarchy, with Major General (two stars) and Brigadier General (one star) ranked below that, and Colonel just below the general-officer tier. So the correct choice is the three-star rank directly under General.

3. CPT Parks holds which role?

A captain's typical duty is to command a company. A company is the basic tactical unit in a battalion, usually made up of 100–200 soldiers and several distinct platoons. The company commander is responsible for training, readiness, welfare, and mission execution for that unit. Roles like Ordnance Chief are senior officer or staff positions within a specialized branch, the Brigade CSM is a top enlisted advisor (not an officer), and the Army Chief of Staff is a general officer. Given the rank and common assignment, CPT Parks would most often serve as the Company Commander.

4. Terrain and weather considerations in field operations contribute to which aspect of Situational Awareness?

Terrain and weather are essential pieces of Situational Awareness. They provide environmental input you must perceive, interpret, and anticipate to understand how the battlefield will evolve. This information directly influences planning and execution—route selection, pacing, timing, concealment, risk management, and logistics—because how terrain can be traversed and how weather affects visibility, movement, and weapon effectiveness changes what you can do and when you can do it. In the common three-element model of SA, the environment is one of those elements you continually assess to forecast near-term developments, so terrain and weather contribute to SA by shaping both planning and execution.

5. Which value is the sixth Army Core Value?

- A. Integrity**

The values are a sequence of behaviors guiding how soldiers act. In the standard order, Integrity is the sixth value, coming after Honor and before Personal Courage. Integrity means doing what's right legally and morally, even when no one is watching. It involves honesty, taking responsibility for actions, and keeping commitments, which builds trust within the unit and with the public. Personal Courage is the final value, focusing on facing fear, danger, or adversity. Because of its place in the sequence and its emphasis on truthful, accountable conduct, Integrity is the correct value.

6. Which rank is considered the top enlisted leader of the entire Army?

- A. Command Sergeant Major

The top enlisted leader for the entire Army is the Sergeant Major of the Army. This is a unique appointment held by a senior noncommissioned officer who acts as the principal enlisted adviser to the Chief of Staff of the Army and to the Army as a whole. The SMA shapes policy, standards, training, and welfare for all enlisted soldiers, representing their interests at the highest level. A Command Sergeant Major serves as the senior enlisted adviser to a specific command (like a division or corps), not the entire Army. A Sergeant Major is a senior NCO rank within a unit, and a First Sergeant is the company-level senior NCO responsible for welfare and readiness. So, the Sergeant Major of the Army is the best answer.

7. Which rank would you most likely see as the first general officer in the listing?

- A. Colonel

Understanding how general officer ranks are ordered helps you see why this is the first one you'd list. In the Army, a general officer is anyone with a general-rank designation, which begins at Brigadier General, a one-star rank. A Colonel, while a senior and prestigious rank, is not a general officer—it's a senior field-grade officer (O-6) but lacks the general designation. From there, the sequence continues to Major General (two stars), then Lieutenant General (three stars), and finally General (four stars). So, the first general officer you'd encounter in an ascending list is Brigadier General.

8. Which sequence correctly lists the five steps of the Army risk management process?

Identifying hazards first is essential because you can't manage risk effectively if you don't know what can cause harm in the activity. Once hazards are known, you assess them to determine the level of risk they pose, considering both probability and severity. With that understanding, you develop controls and make risk decisions about which mitigations to apply and whether the remaining risk is acceptable. Implementing those controls puts the chosen mitigations into action. Finally, you supervise and evaluate to ensure the controls work as intended and to adjust if necessary. If you try to assess hazards before identifying them, the assessment wouldn't have concrete inputs. If you develop controls before assessing, you might choose inappropriate or unnecessary mitigations. Skipping the evaluation step means you wouldn't verify effectiveness or catch issues that require changes.

9. Heels should be replaced after wear of 1/2 inch, not 7/16.

The key idea is the heel wear threshold that triggers replacement. Heels are replaced when wear reaches seven-sixteenths of an inch, which is about 0.4375 inches. The statement claiming replacement should occur at a half-inch (0.5 inches) wears later than this standard and could reduce stability and grip. So that claim isn't correct. In practice, regularly inspect heel wear and replace when the tread depth reaches 7/16 inch on either heel.

10. Who is the first Master Gunner?

- A. John Smith
- B. Samuel Sharpe**

- D. Peter Brown

This question tests recognizing who first held the Master Gunner position in the material you're studying. The Master Gunner is the senior artillery NCO responsible for gunnery training, standards, and firing procedures. In the course or unit history you're using, Samuel Sharpe is identified as the first person to hold that appointment, which is why he is the correct choice. The other names don't appear as the initial holder of the role in that context, so they aren't the right answer. Remember, the "first Master Gunner" refers to the earliest documented holder of the title in the material, not just any person who later served in a high gunnery role.
