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Explanations

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1. When was AFA founded?

The question is about the exact date the Air Force Association began. The Air Force Association was established to promote air power and aerospace education in the post-World War II era, and its founding date is February 4, 1946. Tasks like fundraising, recruitment drives, and public relations campaigns are typically handled at the local or regional level or by dedicated national committees, not by the conclave itself. So the best answer reflects that the conclave's primary function is to create and approve national-level legislation consistent with the constitution.

Wearing them together makes both pieces of information visible at once, which is why this pairing is the correct and official choice. A combination that leaves out the rank pin or the fourragère would not fully convey your AAS standing.

Blue and gold are the colors of the AAS fourragère because they reflect the Air Force's official color palette—ultramarine blue and golden yellow. Wearing this two-color braid ties Arnold Air Society members to the broader Air Force identity, symbolizing loyalty and excellence. Since the fourragère is a distinctive insignia for AAS, blue and gold is the correct pairing, while the other color combinations do not represent this insignia.
