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## **Explanations**

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**1. For the occupation Chef, which base word forms 'cook + agent'?**

- A. C-H-E-F
- B. Cook**
- C. Chef
- D. Bake

Forming a person who performs an action by adding the agent suffix -er to a verb is the pattern here. The base word is the verb cook. When you attach -er, you get the term for a person who cooks—an agent of the action. That fits the occupation sense behind chef, since a chef is essentially a skilled cook. The key idea is identifying which base word can pair with the agent suffix to denote the doer of the action. Other options either represent the finished occupation word, a different action, or a spelling of the final term, not the base verb that forms the agent noun. Therefore, the correct base word is cook.

**2. The profession that uses 'Student + agent'?**

In ASL, signs for occupations are often created by taking a verb and adding the agent suffix to name the person who does that action. For the action of studying, adding the agent suffix yields the sign for the person who studies: student. So the profession described by using “Student + agent” is the student sign, since it comes from the verb study plus the agent marker. This mirrors how a teacher is formed from teach plus the agent suffix, while the other options would be based on different base actions (like teach, build, grow), not on studying.

**3. Which profession uses the sign 'Wood + agent'?**

In ASL, many profession signs show what the person works with plus that they are a person doing that job. The material sign Wood points to someone who works with wood, and adding the sign for an agent/person indicates the worker. Put together, this means a carpenter—someone who builds or shapes with wood. The other professions are associated with different materials or activities (flowers for a florist, music/instruments for a musician, engineering concepts or machines for an engineer), so they don't fit the Wood plus agent pattern.

**4. The sign for which occupation uses an Eye sign followed by Doctor?**

Reading signs that name an occupation often uses a field indicator paired with a professional label. The Eye sign signals vision or eye-related work. When this is placed before the sign for Doctor, it communicates a medical professional who specializes in eyes. That specific combination is how you express optometrist in ASL—someone who examines and treats vision. The other occupations involve different domains (math, law, or electrical work) and use signs tied to those fields, not eye-focused signs used with Doctor.

**5. Which occupation is described by the clue 'design + agent'?**

- A. Designer**
- B. Doctor**
- C. Nurse**
- D. Interpreter**

In word clues like this, the agent suffix “-er” is used to turn a verb into the name of the person who does that action. So taking the base word “design” and adding the agent suffix gives “designer,” the occupation of someone who designs. That’s why this fits best: it directly forms the job title from the action described. The other options don’t follow this wordplay. They come from different roots (medical terms or language work) and aren’t created by simply adding a suffix to “design,” so they don’t match the clue.

**6. The profession that uses 'Flower + agent'?**

- A. Florist**

The key idea is recognizing how a profession name can be formed from a base object plus a suffix that means “a person who does this.” Here, “flower” is the base, and adding the agent meaning suffix gives a term for someone who works with flowers. That yields florist, the person who arranges, sells, or works with flowers. Other options point to different fields—music, construction, or farming—none of which centers on flowers, so they don’t fit the clue as well.

**7. The sign 'Flower + agent' corresponds to which profession?**

In ASL, professions are often formed by showing a domain sign plus an indication of the job role. The sign for flower shows the domain, and adding the sign that marks a person who does that job points to someone who works with flowers. That combination names a florist—the professional who handles, arranges, and sells flowers. The other options don't fit because they point to different fields: farming with crops, woodworking, or music, none of which center on flowers. So the sign described is Florist.

**8. The sign for Psychologist is described as which option?**

- A. Brain + Study

In ASL, many occupations are formed by taking a field of study and adding a sign that means "a person who does that work." Psychologist is built that way: the field is science (psychology is treated as a science), and you add the agent sign to indicate a person who practices in that field. The science sign can be shown with an alternative A-handshape, but the meaning remains the same when you add the agent at the end. This combination exactly conveys "a person who works in the science of the mind," which is the psychologist. The other descriptions describe different ideas (like brain study or thought) and don't match how this occupation is formed in ASL.

**9. Which occupation is signed with a 'C hand on shoulder'?**

- A. Optometrist

The idea being tested is how signs for occupations use different handshapes and placements to convey the job. A C-shaped hand placed on the shoulder is a visual cue for someone who is in charge or in a supervisory role. That makes it the best fit for "boss," since a boss is the person who leads or oversees others, and the shoulder area with a C handshape communicates that authority clearly. The other occupations don't use that same cue. Signs for an optometrist would focus on eyes and vision, not leadership placement. A dentist would involve mouth-related signs like teeth or dental work, not signaling authority from the shoulder. An author/writer/journalist tends to sign something related to writing or journalism, often with movements near the hand or paper, not a shoulder-driven authority sign.

**10. Which sign describes the profession Engineer?**

**A. Sign 'Measure' Dominant hand wiggles up and down**

**B. Wood + agent**

In ASL, signs for occupations often connect to what the job emphasizes. Engineer is tied to measurement, design, and precision. The sign for engineer uses the measure gesture—the dominant hand makes a quick wiggle as if measuring with a tool—placing focus on calculation and planning, which fits what engineers do. That is why this option best represents the profession. The other options point to different trades: a wood-based sign corresponds to carpenter, a sign involving flowers points to florist, and teach plus agent signals teacher. These are distinct occupations and don't capture the engineering emphasis on measurement and design.
