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Explanations

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1. Explain why clarifying questions are important in job interviews and how to sign or phrase them conceptually.

Clarifying questions help ensure both sides share the same understanding of what's being discussed. In a job interview, asking to repeat something or to give an example helps you confirm the exact responsibilities, expectations, or scenarios being described, and it shows you're actively listening and genuinely interested. When you sign or phrase these questions conceptually, you can do it clearly and politely—signs like “Could you repeat that?” or “Could you give an example?” paired with polite signs such as PLEASE or THANK YOU and steady eye contact convey respect and professionalism. This approach reduces misinterpretation and demonstrates you want accurate information before you respond or proceed. Skipping clarifications, relying only on nonverbal signals, or rushing the interview can lead to misunderstandings and a weaker impression.

In ASL, many occupations are formed by taking a field of study and adding a sign that means “a person who does that work.” Psychologist is built that way: the field is science (psychology is treated as a science), and you add the agent sign to indicate a person who practices in that field. The science sign can be shown with an alternative A-handshape, but the meaning remains the same when you add the agent at the end. This combination exactly conveys “a person who works in the science of the mind,” which is the psychologist. The other descriptions describe different ideas (like brain study or thought) and don't match how this occupation is formed in ASL.

People switch occupations mainly for career growth and for better alignment with their interests or skills. When a field offers opportunities to advance, learn new capabilities, or take on more responsibility, it becomes appealing to move. At the same time, working in a role that fits what someone enjoys and excels at leads to greater satisfaction and performance. Sometimes external factors push the move as well, such as shifts in market demand—where jobs are more available or in higher demand in another field—or changes in location that open up different opportunities. This combination explains why people change occupations. The other options focus on perks or superficial reasons that don't capture why people typically switch careers, such as perks like vacation time or aesthetics like an office view.

In ASL, signs for occupations are often formed with a base that points to the body and a second element that names the role or function. For a physical therapist, the best decomposition uses a body-related base together with a sign that captures the professional role: either the concept of helping or the common abbreviation PT. This matches how the sign operates: you convey both the person (the body reference) and the core job you do—in this case, helping people with their physical function, which is precisely what a physical therapist does. The “help” idea reflects the therapist’s core activity—assisting patients to improve movement and strength—while using “PT” as a conventional shorthand makes the profession immediately recognizable. Other options shift the meaning. “Body + care” sounds more like a caregiver or general care provider, not specifically a physical therapy professional. “Body + assist” could imply simply assisting in some generic way, not the licensed profession. “Body + therapy” centers on therapy as the process itself, which can obscure that the sign identifies the professional role rather than the service.

The setup is about combining the field shown with the typical role that represents or handles work in that field. In music, performers and creators often work with a talent agent who handles bookings, contracts, and career opportunities. So a musician is the profession that best fits both elements: someone who works with music and typically collaborates with an agent to secure gigs and deals. The other options don't center on music or the use of an agent in the same way, so they don't align with both parts of the clue.

6. In a job interview, which question helps you understand how you would fit the role within the team?

Asking about team structure and how this role fits into it focuses on how you would collaborate and where your work sits in the bigger picture. This question reveals who you report to, who you work alongside, and how responsibilities are shared, which helps you judge whether your working style and strengths align with how the team operates. It also signals that you care about clear expectations, practical collaboration, and contributing to the team's goals, all of which are key to feeling like you belong and can succeed in the role. Questions about vacation, typical finish times, or weekend work mainly address logistics or benefits rather than how you would mesh with teammates or contribute to the team's workflow. They're important for planning, but they don't directly show how you would fit into the team dynamic, communicate, or collaborate on daily tasks.

In this item, the idea is to use a topic-comment structure where the topic sets who we're talking about (the doctor) and the comment describes what that topic does in a natural order. The best sequence lists the doctor first, then the actions in the typical flow of a day: seeing patients, diagnosing illnesses, prescribing treatments, and documenting the visit in records. This mirrors how a doctor usually progresses through patient encounters and then records what happened. The other options break that flow or switch the topic in a way that doesn't fit how a doctor's day unfolds. For example, starting with prescribing before seeing a patient suggests an unrealistic order; using the patient as the topic shifts the focus away from the doctor's role; and placing documenting records before seeing patients disrupts the natural sequence of a visit.

Certification functions as a credential that shows you've demonstrated defined skills and knowledge, issued by a professional organization after meeting specific requirements. It's earned by completing steps such as passing an exam, proving work experience, or meeting continuing education standards, and often needs renewal to stay valid. This makes it a targeted, validated signal of competence in a particular field, different from a full college degree which is an academic credential, and different from a government-issued license to drive, which grants legal permission to perform a regulated activity. A certification is therefore evidence that you meet established professional standards, and many employers look for it when outlining job requirements.

The sign meaning "practice" is most closely tied to roles that revolve around teaching and guiding others to repeat skills. A trainer's work centers on helping people develop abilities through practice and drills, so the sign for practice naturally fits that job. Economists focus on data and analysis, volunteers provide service without a primary emphasis on repeated skill-building, and housekeepers concentrate on cleaning tasks; none of these occupations center on practice in the same way. So, the trainer is the best match.

10. Which of the following is NOT a firefighter responsibility?

Firefighter work centers on emergency response, rescue, and medical aid. On scene, they suppress fires, perform search-and-rescue, and provide first aid or basic life support until EMS arrives. Writing software code has nothing to do with those on-scene duties and is instead a job for software developers or IT specialists. Since the other tasks align with hands-on emergency response and patient care, the activity that doesn't fit as a firefighter responsibility is writing software code.
