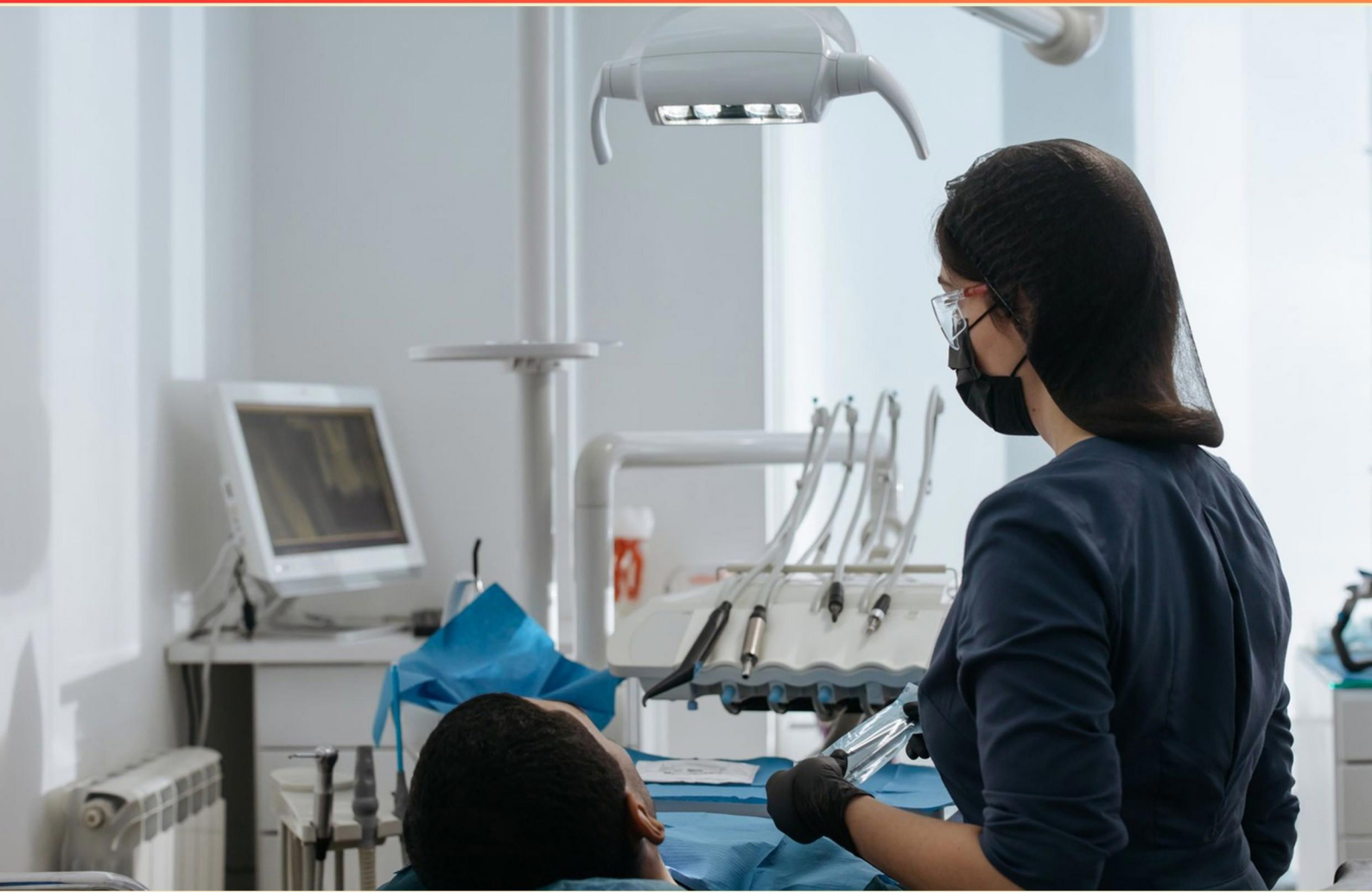

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Explanations

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1. What factors affect x-ray exposure settings (mA, kVp, time) and how should a dental assistant adjust them for a small patient?

A. Increase mA and time

B. Increase kVp

C. Increase exposure time

D. Reduce mA and Time according to guidelines and manufacturer recommendations

When imaging a small patient, the priority is to keep radiation exposure as low as possible while still producing a diagnostically useful image. The factors mA and exposure time together determine the total amount of X-ray photons produced, known as mAs. Lowering either mA or the exposure time reduces the dose, and using the smallest mAs that still yields an acceptable image is how clinicians apply the ALARA principle in pediatrics. Guidelines and the manufacturer's technique charts exist precisely to guide these reductions for different patient sizes, ensuring you stay within safe, validated ranges while maintaining image quality. Increasing mA or extending exposure time would raise the patient's radiation dose, which is especially undesirable for small patients. Adjusting kVp is part of optimization, but it should be done within the recommended pediatric ranges to avoid compromising image contrast; the strongest, most reliable dose-reduction move in this scenario is to reduce mA and time according to official guidelines and manufacturer recommendations.

Describing eruption status uses terms that tell where a tooth is in the eruption process. When a tooth has not yet broken through into the mouth, the correct term is unerupted. It simply means the tooth is still within the jawbone or soft tissue and hasn't emerged into the oral cavity yet. That's exactly what the question describes. Erupted means the tooth has already emerged into the mouth. Impacted describes a tooth that cannot erupt because something blocks it—bone, another tooth, or abnormal position. Retained is used when a tooth has erupted but remains in the mouth or remains in the eruption path longer than normal (often referring to deciduous teeth that haven't exfoliated or a tooth that has already erupted but isn't shedding as expected). So unerupted is the precise term for a tooth that has not yet erupted.

Exostosis is a benign bony outgrowth that pushes outward from the surface of a bone, commonly seen on the jaw as a small, discrete projection on the cortical plate. This is different from an osteophyte, which is a bone spur that forms at joints in response to arthritis and isn't typically found on the jawbone. Hyperostosis refers to diffuse thickening of bone rather than a distinct bump, and osteitis means inflammation of bone, which would involve pain and systemic signs rather than a simple outgrowth. So for a bony outgrowth on the jaw, exostosis is the right term.

4. Which types of waste require special handling as regulated medical waste in dental offices?

The key idea is how regulated medical waste is defined and handled in a dental setting. In dental offices, waste that could transmit infection or cause injury—especially sharps (needles, scalpel blades) and materials contaminated with blood or saliva—counts as regulated medical waste. In addition, any waste that local or state regulations designate as regulated medical waste also falls into this category. Because of the infection risk and potential harm to workers, this waste must be placed in leak-proof, puncture-resistant containers and stored securely until picked up by a licensed medical waste disposal service. Regular office trash, recyclable plastics, and compostable waste do not meet the criteria for regulated medical waste, so they're handled through standard trash or recycling streams unless other, separate regulations apply (for example, environmental rules about hazardous chemicals or mercury-containing waste).

5. The nerve of the tooth inside the root below the dentin is called

The soft tissue inside the tooth that contains blood vessels and nerves is the dental pulp. In the root, this tissue fills the root canal and is known as the radicular pulp. The phrase "inside the root below the dentin" points to this pulp tissue, not the hard dentin that surrounds it. The pulp chamber refers to the crown portion of the pulp, while dentin is the hard tissue forming the tooth walls. The term nerve isn't used by itself to name the tissue; nerves are part of the pulp's contents. So, the tissue inside the root beneath the dentin is the pulp.

6. Which term is the process of removing tissue for evaluation?

Biopsy is the process of removing tissue for evaluation. In dentistry, a biopsy means taking a small sample of tissue from a suspicious area in the mouth (such as soft tissue or bone) so a pathologist can examine it under a microscope and determine things like inflammation, infection, precancerous changes, or cancer. This can be done by taking a portion of tissue (incisional biopsy) or removing the entire lesion (excisional biopsy), with the sample sent to a lab for histopathology. Bridge refers to a fixed dental prosthesis that replaces missing teeth and is anchored to adjacent teeth. Buccal relates to the cheek or the outer surface of the teeth. Calculus is hardened dental plaque (tartar) that can form on teeth. None of those involve removing tissue for laboratory evaluation like a biopsy does.

A dental bridge is a fixed prosthesis that replaces one or more missing teeth by spanning the gap and is supported by adjacent natural teeth (abutments) or by dental implant abutments. The bridge includes crowns on the abutment teeth and a pontic in the middle that takes the place of the missing tooth or teeth. Because it is cemented or attached to the abutments, it provides a stable, non-removable solution that restores function and aesthetics. The other terms don't describe a prosthetic replacement: buccal refers to the cheek-side surface, cavity denotes decay or a hole, and calculus is hardened dental plaque.

8. What is the purpose of environmental cleaning and disinfection in standard precautions?

Environmental cleaning and disinfection in standard precautions is all about reducing the chance that pathogens are transferred via surface contact after patient care. Surfaces and equipment can harbor microorganisms, so cleaning removes visible soil and organic material, and disinfection lowers the number of remaining pathogens on nonporous surfaces. When high touch surfaces like chair arms, countertops, light switches, and keyboard/mouse areas are properly cleaned and disinfected between patients, the likelihood of cross contamination to staff, patients, or other clients drops significantly. This purpose is broader than just sanitizing instruments or decontaminating air, and it doesn't replace the need for PPE—PPE still provides a barrier, while cleaning and disinfection reduce environmental sources of infection.

9. Therapy for preserving the health of gums is known as what?

Maintaining gum health relies on ongoing periodontal maintenance after active treatment. After procedures that address periodontal disease, the goal shifts to preserving the health already achieved by monitoring gum condition and reinforcing the patient's daily oral hygiene. Periodontal maintenance involves regular professional cleanings, evaluation of gum health (such as probing depths and signs of inflammation), removal of any new calculus or plaque buildup as needed, and education to keep inflammation under control. This ongoing care is specifically aimed at preventing recurrence and sustaining healthy gums over the long term. Prophylaxis is a preventive cleaning for patients with generally healthy gums, not the ongoing therapy used after treating gum disease. Scaling is a procedure that removes calculus and plaque, typically part of active treatment rather than ongoing maintenance. Root planing is a deeper cleaning that smooths the root surfaces to remove toxins and is also part of initial periodontal therapy, not routine maintenance.

Removing plaque through a professional cleaning is the idea of a preventive maintenance visit. A dental prophylaxis is the routine cleaning that removes plaque and calculus from tooth surfaces and may include polishing to help prevent cavities and gum disease. It's preventive because it reduces the bacterial load and supports healthy gums and teeth before problems develop. The other items are not preventive cleanings: a dental implant replaces a missing tooth, crown lengthening is a surgical procedure to expose more tooth structure, and decay refers to the disease process, not a treatment. So the procedure that involves removing plaque and is preventive is dental prophylaxis.
