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Explanations

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1. Who is the author of the Prodigal Son parable in the material?

- A. Jesus**

The Prodigal Son is a teaching story told by Jesus to illustrate God’s forgiving love and the welcome awaiting the repentant. In the material, this parable is presented as Jesus speaking, a common way he teaches through stories. It appears in the Gospel of Luke (Luke 15), showing Jesus’ method of using relatable narratives to convey spiritual truths. Moses, David, and Paul are not the narrators of this parable—Moses is the lawgiver, David the king and poet, and Paul the missionary who writes letters—so they aren’t the source of this story.

Devotion refers to prayerful practices designed to deepen a relationship with God, Mary, or the saints, often done outside a formal church service. The Rosary fits this well because it is a structured sequence of prayers used to meditate on key events in Jesus’ life and Mary’s role, in personal or communal settings. It’s a classic example of a devotional practice meant to grow prayer life and reflect on faith. The Mass is the central worship service and liturgy, focused on the Eucharist and communal celebration rather than a private or devotional prayer routine. A Bible study group emphasizes learning and discussing Scripture, which is more about study than devotional prayer. A charity drive centers on serving others and acts of service, which are important but fall under service rather than devotional prayer. So the Rosary stands out as the example of a devotion.

Sacramentals are sacred signs instituted by the Church that prepare us for the sacraments and contribute to holiness. They include blessed objects and actions—like holy water, blessings, rosaries, medals, and prayers—that help us focus on God and grow closer to Him in daily life. They don’t themselves confer grace in the same way as the actual sacraments, but they aid us in receiving grace by guiding our minds and hearts toward holiness. They are not priestly garments or holy books, which are not sacramentals in themselves, but signs and practices that point us toward God.

In the Bible, the phrase “God’s Chosen People” refers to the Israelites, the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. God made a special covenant with them, promising to guide them, give them His laws, and bless them so they could be an example of faith to the world. This chosen status ties to receiving the Law at Sinai and living as a holy people who follow God’s ways. The other groups—Romans, Egyptians, and Greeks—appear in biblical stories, but they’re not described as the chosen people in the same way that the Israelites are.

From the Catholic perspective, the crucial idea is when a human life begins. The Church teaches that life begins at conception, when the fertilized egg forms a unique human being with a soul created by God. From that moment, this new life is considered a person who deserves protection and dignity. Movements like quickening—feeling fetal movement—were historically used in some contexts, but they aren’t the basis for when life begins in Catholic teaching. Viability outside the womb and birth are later stages of development, not the starting point. So conception best reflects why life is regarded as beginning in Catholic belief.

The Communion of Saints is about the unity and sharing that all members of the Church have in Christ. It means the living faithful on earth are connected with the souls in Purgatory and the saints in heaven as one family in Christ, continually supporting and praying for each other. This “communion” isn’t about a club, a set of prayers, or a festival; it’s the relational and spiritual bond that joins the whole Church across heaven and earth, linked by grace and prayer. In practice, it helps explain why people on earth pray for the dead, why saints are honored and asked to intercede, and why those in heaven and purgatory are considered part of the same glorious, united body of Christ.

Evangelization is about sharing the good news about Jesus and inviting others to know and follow him. It combines telling people about God's love with showing that love in how we live, so others can see what faith looks like in everyday life. It can happen through words—talking about Jesus, inviting someone to church or a youth group—and through actions—being kind, helping those in need, and living with honesty and forgiveness—that reflect the message of the Gospel. It's not just prayer services, building churches, or festivals; those are separate aspects of faith life, while evangelization focuses on helping others encounter Christ.

Beatitudes are Jesus' teachings in the Sermon on the Mount about the attitudes and actions that should characterize the lives of his followers and that lead to genuine happiness and meaning. They describe a mindset—being humble, merciful, pure in heart, mourning over injustice, pursuing righteousness, and seeking peace—and the blessings that come to those who live this way. They are not about miracles, genealogies, or farming parables, which are described elsewhere in the Gospels. In short, they lay out the dispositions and behaviors that bring true joy through God's kingdom.

A Gospel is an account of the life and teachings of Jesus, and four of these books are included in the New Testament. They tell the story of Jesus's birth, his ministry and miracles, his message, and his death and resurrection, helping people understand who Jesus is and what he taught. The other options describe different kinds of writings: a letter to a church is an epistle, a book of laws is a code or legal collection, and a collection of psalms and hymns is a psalter or hymn book.

Understanding the path to sainthood helps you see why beatification sits where it does. In the process, the church first opens a cause and names the person a Servant of God, recognizing that the life is under serious consideration. After careful review of their virtue and life, the next step calls them Venerable, acknowledging heroic virtue. Beatification then comes next, giving the person the title Blessed and allowing limited public veneration—usually after a verified miracle attributed to their intercession. The final step is canonization, where the church proclaims them a Saint for universal veneration. So beatification is the third step because it follows the initial recognition and evaluation of virtue and occurs before the ultimate declaration of sainthood. The initial step would be the Servant of God stage; the next would be the Venerable stage; the final step is canonization as a Saint.
