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Explanations

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1. What event is described at Mount Sinai?

- A. The Exodus from Egypt
- B. God gives the Ten Commandments to Moses**
- C. The crossing of the Red Sea

The event described at Mount Sinai is God giving the Ten Commandments to Moses. This moment is when God shares the laws that guide how the Israelites are to live, often depicted as Moses receiving tablets with the commandments on them. Mount Sinai is the place where the Israelites camped after leaving Egypt, and Moses stayed there for a time to receive these laws from God. The other events come from different parts of the story: leaving Egypt refers to the Israelites' departure from slavery, the crossing of the Red Sea is when God parts the waters for safety, and the anointing of Saul is about choosing Israel's first king in a separate part of the narrative.

2. What was the Virgin Mary born without?

This question tests Mary's special privilege of being conceived without the stain of original sin. Original sin is the condition that every human inherits because of the first disobedience of Adam and Eve. In Catholic teaching, Mary was preserved from that sin from the moment of her conception by God's grace, so she could be the mother of Jesus. This unique gift is known as the Immaculate Conception. So, the thing Mary was born without is original sin. She was not without grace—she was full of grace from the start. She also had faith in God and said yes to His plan. The sin of pride is a specific sin, not something Mary was born with, and it doesn't describe her state at birth.

3. Who led the Israelites out of Egypt?

Who led the Israelites out of Egypt is about the person who guided them from slavery during the Exodus. Moses is the one who confronted Pharaoh, asked for the Israelites' release, and led them through the Red Sea to freedom. He also became the conduit for God's laws at Mount Sinai, shaping the identity and covenant of the people. Aaron supported Moses as his spokesperson and held an important priestly role, but he did not lead the Exodus itself. Joshua later led the people into the land promised to their ancestors after Moses' death. David lived later as king and was not part of the Exodus event.

4. Which of the following is a Corporal Work of Mercy?

Corporal Works of Mercy are actions that meet people's physical needs. Feeding the hungry is a classic example because it directly provides for someone's basic sustenance and shows care for their bodily well-being. The other options focus on spiritual practices or personal devotion rather than immediate physical help: forgiving sins is about reconciliation on a spiritual level, praying the rosary is a form of prayer, and reading the Bible is personal study. So feeding the hungry best illustrates a corporal work of mercy.

5. What is the 3rd Commandment?

In this numbering of the Ten Commandments, the instruction to honor your father and mother is listed as the third commandment. That placement is meant to show that respecting those who care for you is a foundational duty, alongside honoring God and living rightly in other areas. So the option about honoring your father and mother is the one that matches the third commandment in this particular set of materials. The other statements refer to different duties—such as worship and reverence toward God through keeping the Sabbath or speaking about God carefully—which are important too, but they appear in different spots depending on the numbering system used.

A creed is a formal statement of what believers declare to believe—a profession of faith. It is spoken aloud in worship to unite the church around shared beliefs, often recited during the liturgy. This makes creeds different from a list of prayers (which are requests to God), a hymn (which is a song), or a rule of church governance (which guides leadership and structure). Creeds summarize what Christians affirm about God, Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and life in faith, and many churches recite them in services to publicly profess their beliefs. A familiar example is the creed that begins with "I believe," used in baptisms and other worship moments.

7. What does the word gospel mean?

Gospel means good news. In Christian usage, it's the good news about Jesus—the story of his life, his death on the cross, and his resurrection, and what that means for people. The gospel proclaims salvation and invites us to follow Jesus. You'll also hear about the four gospel books in the Bible—Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John—that tell this good news. The other options describe things like laws, festivals, or prayers, which aren't what "gospel" means.

8. What is a prophet?

Prophet is someone chosen by God to speak His message to people. Prophets listen for God's words and then share them—guiding, warning, or encouraging people to live in a way that pleases God. This is why the definition that a prophet is a person chosen by God to speak His message is the best answer. A priest helps with worship and mediates between God and people; a king leads a nation; a shepherd watches over sheep. While these roles appear in stories, only a prophet's main task is delivering God's spoken message.

9. Where did Jesus perform His first miracle according to the Gospel of John?

- A. Nazareth
- B. Capernaum
- C. Jerusalem
- D. Cana in Galilee (water into wine)

In the Gospel of John, Jesus' first recorded miracle is turning water into wine at a wedding in Cana in Galilee. This moment is described as the first sign that reveals who Jesus is and begins to show his glory, prompting the disciples to believe in him. The scene also highlights Jesus' power over nature and his willingness to help in everyday life, even at a social event like a wedding. The setting—Cana in Galilee—places the start of his public ministry in the region of Galilee, rather than in Nazareth, Jerusalem, or other locations, and it signals the shift from private ministry to presenting himself as the Messiah through signs.

A parable is a short story that teaches a lesson, often used by Jesus to explain spiritual truths in everyday life. It uses simple situations and characters to show how people should live or how God's kingdom works, rather than just listing facts. That's why the best answer describes it as a short story with a moral told by Jesus. The other descriptions don't fit a parable: a long historical record isn't about teaching a lesson through a story, a hymn is a song of praise, and a prophecy is about future events.
