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Explanations

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1. Which Old Testament king is described as asking God for wisdom to govern his people?

- A. David
- B. Rehoboam
- C. Jehoshaphat
- D. Solomon**

When a king asks God for wisdom to govern the people, it shows a heart aimed at ruling rightly and seeking guidance beyond himself. The king who did this is Solomon. In the moment God offered to grant him anything, Solomon chose wisdom to judge the people well and lead with discernment. God was pleased with that request and gave him extraordinary wisdom, along with wealth and honor. This story, found in the early chapters of Kings and Chronicles, highlights how true leadership starts with asking God for the wisdom to govern fairly and wisely. David is known for his heart for God and his own leadership, but the specific moment of asking God for wisdom to rule with justice is Solomon's defining note. Rehoboam's story centers on his leadership decisions and their consequences, not a request for divine wisdom in governance. Jehoshaphat is praised for seeking God and seeking guidance, but the famous request for wisdom to govern comes from Solomon.

Jesus grew up in Nazareth, a small town in the region of Galilee. He is often called Jesus of Nazareth because his family lived there during his childhood. In Nazareth he lived with Mary and Joseph, learned a trade as a carpenter, and grew up before he began his more public ministry. Bethlehem is where he was born, but his upbringing was in Nazareth. Jerusalem and Capernaum are places associated with his later life and teachings, not where he spent his childhood.

3. In what kind of prayer do we ask God for good things?

Asking God for things we need or want is a petition. It's when we bring requests before God for help, guidance, or good outcomes. For example, praying for strength to face a difficulty or for healing for someone are petitions. Thanksgiving, contrition, and praise focus on thanking God, admitting sins and seeking forgiveness, or worshiping Him, respectively. So when the goal is to ask for help or for good things, that's a petition.

A sacrament is a sacred outward sign of God's grace, instituted by Jesus to make His life with us tangible. Think of baptism with water or the Lord's Supper with bread and wine: these elements are visible signs that point to and convey a real grace given by God. The sign is not just a ritual; it is a concrete way God communicates His presence and enables believers to participate in that grace. That's why the description "a visible sign of God's divine life" fits best. It's not simply a prayer, a place of worship, or a set of rules, even though prayers can accompany it, a church building is where people gather, and rules may guide behavior.

Baptism brings you into God's family. When you are baptized, God adopts you as his child, giving you new life in Christ and a place in his family. That identity—becoming a child of God—is the fundamental change because it describes your relationship with God and your belonging to him and to the Church. Baptism also means you're welcomed into the Church and you receive the Holy Spirit to guide and empower you, and it cleanses sin so you start fresh in grace. These are true effects, but the key idea that best captures what baptism changes about you is the shift into being God's child.

6. Which day and city are linked to Jesus' birth?

Knowing when and where Jesus was born helps you connect the nativity story to its traditional setting. Christmas is the day Christians celebrate Jesus' birth, and Bethlehem is the town described in the Gospels as his birthplace. So this pairing directly reflects the birth event and its location. The other options mix birth with places or events tied to later parts of the story: Easter is about the resurrection, Good Friday recalls the crucifixion, and Pentecost marks the coming of the Holy Spirit. Nazareth is where Jesus grew up, not where he was born, and Jerusalem is linked to his crucifixion and some other events, not his birth. Therefore, Christmas with Bethlehem best fits the question about birth.

Venial sin is a smaller offense against God that wounds our love for Him and for others, but it does not destroy our relationship with Him. It can be repaired by acts of charity and repentance—loving actions, prayer, and turning back toward God. This is different from mortal sin, which is a grave offense that breaks our communion with God and usually requires confession for healing. It isn't described as a sin that only God knows.

8. What is a covenant?

A covenant is a sacred promise between God and humans. This kind of promise goes beyond everyday agreements because it involves a relationship with God and often includes responsibilities, blessings, and signs. In biblical stories, God makes covenants with people—such as with Noah, promising protection and setting the rainbow as a sign; with Abraham, promising a great nation; and with Moses, giving the laws as part of living in a special relationship with God. The key idea is that a covenant binds God and people together in a lasting relationship and outlines how they will live. Why the other ideas don't fit: a contract between two kings is about political alliances between rulers, not a divine promise; a social agreement among neighbors is a normal, everyday understanding without the sacred element; a vow by a single person is simply a personal promise, not a formal promise from God to humanity. The defining feature here is the involvement of God and the lasting relationship it describes.

Prophets. Isaiah and Jeremiah are part of the books that contain messages from God spoken through His messengers. These prophetic writings—often called the Prophets—include both the longer works (major prophets) and shorter ones (minor prophets). The Law refers to the first five books, the Gospels are the four accounts of Jesus in the New Testament, and the Writings include poetry and wisdom literature like Psalms and Proverbs. So the division that includes Isaiah and Jeremiah is the Prophets.

10. What is the 2nd Commandment?

Using God's name with respect is the idea behind this rule. The second commandment tells us to avoid using the Lord's name in ways that are empty, disrespectful, or wrong. "In vain" means speaking or acting with God's name without care for truth or holiness—like using it as a casual exclamation, or to back up a lie, a joke, or a broken promise. Treating God's name as sacred helps us show reverence for Him and speak honestly about Him in everyday life. If we think about daily speech, we're called to use God's name only in truthful, sincere ways—when we pray, when we speak about God with respect, and when we mean what we say. The other options point to different commandments—keeping the Sabbath, not worshiping other gods, and honoring parents—which are important too, but they aren't the rule described by the second commandment.
