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Explanations

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1. Name the first book of the Bible and its main purpose.

- A. Exodus; it explains liberation of Israelites.

The main idea here is recognizing which book starts the Bible and what its purpose is. Genesis is the first book, and its purpose is to show the origins of the world and humanity and to begin the story of God's people. It covers creation and the early history of humankind, introduces the relationship God establishes with Abraham and his descendants, and explains how the people of Israel come to be and how God interacts with them from the very beginning. This sets the stage for the rest of the Bible, including events like the Israelites' slavery in Egypt and their later deliverance, but those events are described in later books. The other options describe different kinds of content: Exodus tells about liberation from Egypt; Psalms is a collection of songs and prayers; Leviticus outlines laws and priestly duties. Therefore, Genesis is the one that starts the Bible and presents its broad purpose of origins and the beginnings of God's people.

The main idea here is who is traditionally seen as the author of many of the Psalms. He lived a life filled with experiences—shepherding, battles, and times of deep faith—expressed in verses that praise, lament, thank, and seek God's help. Because the tradition assigns the largest number of Psalms to him, he's considered the author associated with many of them. While other figures like Moses, Solomon, or Isaiah are connected to parts of Scripture, they are not known for writing as many psalms, so David stands out as the best answer.

Beatitudes are the eight blessings proclaimed by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount. These statements all start with "Blessed are..." and describe the kinds of people God values and the promises connected to those qualities. The term beatitudes comes from a word meaning blessed, and this label is specifically used for that particular set of eight teachings found in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5). Knowing this helps: parables are Jesus' teaching stories, miracles are powerful acts, and apostles are the twelve followers chosen to spread his message. So the word that names this group of eight blessings is beatitudes.

The thing being tested is where the Bhagavad Gita appears as a dialogue. In the Mahabharata, on the battlefield of Kurukshetra, Arjuna asks Krishna for guidance, and Krishna answers with a profound conversation about duty, righteousness, and the nature of the self. That dialogue is the Bhagavad Gita, embedded within this epic. The other works are different kinds of literature: Ramayana follows the story of Rama; Upanishads are philosophical texts exploring ultimate reality; Bhagavata Purana centers on Krishna's life and deeds.

Understanding biblical context means looking at who wrote a passage, who it was written for, why it was written, and the cultural setting of that time. This background helps you see what the author wanted to communicate and how the original readers would have understood it. With that insight, you can connect the message to its purpose and see how it was meant to be lived out then, which in turn guides how it can be applied today. The choice that describes the original audience, purpose, and cultural setting is the best fit because it covers the full picture of meaning in the text. Knowing who the passage was addressing, what issue it was addressing, and the cultural norms of that period clarifies language, customs, and references that might be unfamiliar now, preventing misinterpretation. Options that focus only on the modern author's intent miss the historical context; they overlook how the original readers would have understood the words. Pinning down the exact year of composition is often uncertain and not necessary for understanding the message. Thinking only about future applicability ignores how the passage would have been understood and applied in its own time.

The Ten Commandments are a foundational guide that shows how to honor God and how to live with others. In Judaism they are part of the covenant at Sinai, establishing worship of the one God and a moral framework that shapes daily life, community conduct, and religious practice. In Christianity they are presented as a clear expression of God's law that Jesus affirms and summarizes, guiding believers to love God and love neighbor, and serving as a standard for moral living and worship. They address both worship—like prioritizing God above all and keeping sacred time—and ethical behavior—treating parents with respect, valuing life, fidelity, honesty, and rightly desiring what belongs to others. This combination shows why they're so significant: they connect how people relate to God with how people treat one another, forming a durable guide for faith and life across both traditions.

Hindu worship happens in a mandir, a temple, which is a sacred place dedicated to a deity. In a mandir, a murti (an idol or image of a god or goddess) is placed in a sanctified space where people offer prayers, light lamps, and make offerings as part of puja and devotional rituals. The design and deities can vary by region and tradition, but the purpose remains to provide a focused space for connecting with the divine. A mosque is the place of worship for Muslims, a gurdwara is the Sikh place of worship, and a church is the Christian place of worship. These are distinct religious buildings with practices tied to their own faiths.

A psalm is a sacred song or poem used in worship and prayer. In the Bible, the Book of Psalms collects these short pieces, which express praise, gratitude, or petition. Many psalms are traditionally attributed to David, the famous king of Israel known for his musical gifts, which is why he's commonly credited with writing many of them. It's also true that other authors contributed to the collection, so not every psalm comes from David.

In Islam, the pilgrimage to Mecca is called Hajj. It is one of the Five Pillars of Islam and is required at least once in a Muslim's life if they have the means and health to do it. The journey involves a set of rituals performed in a specific order, such as entering a state of ritual purity (Ihram), circling the Kaaba seven times (Tawaf), walking or running between the hills of Safa and Marwah (Sa'i), and spending a day at the plain of Arafat with other pilgrims, followed by additional rites in Muzdalifah and Mina. The purpose is to show devotion to God, seek forgiveness, and stand with Muslims from all over the world in unity. Other terms refer to different practices: Zakat is charitable giving to the poor, Sawm is fasting during the month of Ramadan, and Shahada is the declaration of faith—"There is no god but God, and Muhammad is the messenger."

Pentecost is the moment described: the Holy Spirit comes to the Apostles and Mary, filling them with courage to proclaim the faith. This event is celebrated fifty days after Easter, which is seven weeks after Easter Sunday, and it's seen as the Church's birth, when the apostles are empowered to begin their mission publicly. The other terms don't fit this specific moment. Ascension refers to Jesus rising into heaven, which happens forty days after Easter, not the Spirit's descent. Incarnation is when God becomes human in Jesus, a different event in salvation history. Covenant is about God's agreements with His people, a broad idea rather than a single day.
