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Explanations

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1. The tendency of all human beings toward sin, as a result of Original Sin is called?

- A. Concupiscence**
- B. Temptation
- C. Original sin

Concupiscence is the inward tendency to sin that humans inherit as a result of Original Sin. It describes the pull toward disordered desires that remains in human nature, making temptation easier to yield to. Temptation, by contrast, is the invitation or lure to sin that can come from outside or inside; concupiscence is the predisposition that makes such temptation more likely. Original Sin explains why this inclination exists in the first place, but it is not the inclination itself. Grace is God's help to do good and overcome sin, not the tendency toward sin. So the best term for the described tendency is concupiscence.

2. Which sacrament commemorates the Last Supper by consecrating bread and wine?

The key idea is a ritual that re-enacts Jesus' Last Supper by blessing and sharing bread and wine with the community. This sacrament is the Eucharist, also known as Holy Communion, where believers commemorate Jesus' sacrifice and, in many traditions, experience His presence through the consecrated elements. The other rites serve different purposes: Baptism initiates a person into the faith with water; Reconciliation involves confessing sins and receiving forgiveness; Confirmation strengthens the grace received at baptism. The Eucharist uniquely centers on the Last Supper and the blessing and distribution of bread and wine.

This approach builds empathy, reduces stereotypes, and helps students consider beliefs within their historical and cultural contexts. It also equips learners to discuss religion thoughtfully in a pluralistic world. The other reasons—trying to convert others, memorizing sacred texts, or celebrating only one tradition—don't align with the goal of a balanced, evidence-based study of world religions.

The Last Supper is the event where Jesus instituted the Eucharist. It happened during a Passover meal with his disciples, when Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and said, "This is my body given for you," then took the cup and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, poured out for you." He told them to continue this meal in remembrance of him, establishing the practice that would become the Eucharist (Holy Communion) for Christians. That's why this event is the right one: it is the moment in the Gospels where the ritual of sharing bread and wine as symbols of Jesus' body and blood was first instituted. The other options refer to different things: Ascension is Jesus' return to heaven, Genesis is the creation narrative, and Conscience is a general concept, not a biblical event.

5. What are the three parts of the Tanakh?

The Tanakh is the Hebrew scriptures split into three sections: the Torah, the Nevi'im, and the Ketuvim. The Torah, also called the Law, contains the first five books of Moses and lays out foundational narratives and commandments. The Nevi'im, or the Prophets, includes both historical books about Israel's leaders and the prophetic writings that convey God's messages to the people. The Ketuvim, or the Writings, is a diverse collection of poetry, wisdom literature, and other writings, such as Psalms, Proverbs, and Ruth. The name Tanakh itself comes from the initials of these three divisions (T-N-K), and this three-part structure distinguishes the Jewish canon from other biblical groupings.

The season described is Lent, a time of penance and preparation for Easter focused on conversion. It spans about forty days of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, echoing Jesus' forty days in the desert. Sundays are not counted toward the forty days because they are celebratory days within Lent, still part of the season but treated as feast days that interrupt the fasting emphasis. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, when ashes symbolize repentance, and it ends with Holy Saturday, the day before Easter, leading into the Easter Triduum. This period centers on turning more fully toward God and recommitting to spiritual growth, which is why conversion is highlighted. For contrast, Advent prepares for Christmas, the Easter Season runs from Easter to Pentecost, and Ordinary Time fills the periods outside these seasons.

Virtue is a stable, formed habit of doing good. It means a settled disposition to choose and act rightly, developed by repeatedly making good choices and guided by reason and character. When you cultivate virtues like honesty, courage, justice, and temperance, doing the right thing becomes natural rather than forced. Grace is a divine gift that helps a person live rightly, not something you develop by habit. Faith is belief and trust in God, not the ongoing habit of doing good. Charity is love in action—the love of God and neighbor—an important expression of virtue, but the general description of a habitual good disposition is virtue.

In Christian theology, sacraments are sacred rites through which God's grace is communicated to believers. This term best fits because a sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ that conveys grace; baptism and the Eucharist are classic examples. The other options describe different aspects of Christian life: Beatitudes are Jesus' teachings about blessed living; Liturgy of the Hours is a daily cycle of prayers; Pentecost is the event celebrating the Spirit's coming, not a ritual that transmits grace in the standard sense. So the term that defines such ceremonies through which grace is transmitted is Sacrament.

An annulment is a declaration that a marriage never became a valid, sacramental bond in the eyes of the Church. In Catholic teaching, a marriage is valid only if both spouses freely give genuine consent and the proper form is observed. If essential elements are missing—such as lack of true consent, coercion, inability to commit, or failure to follow canonical form—the Church may determine that no true marriage ever existed. This is different from a civil divorce, which ends a valid marriage in secular law. If an annulment is granted, the individuals are free to marry again in the Church because the original bond is considered invalid from the start. Other options describe ending or separating a marriage, not asserting that it was invalid from the beginning.

10. What term refers to the gift from God that allows us to judge right from wrong, often described as God's voice in our hearts?

Conscience is the inner sense given by God that helps us distinguish right from wrong and guides our choices toward what is good. It's often described as God's voice in our hearts because it makes moral judgments about our actions and urges us to do good or to avoid harm. This understanding emphasizes that conscience is formed by reason, truth, and the moral law revealed by God, and it can be sharpened through education, virtue, and prayer. By contrast, faith refers to belief and trust in God, a covenant is a binding promise between God and His people, and the Annunciation is the event in which the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would conceive Jesus. Hence, conscience best matches the description given.
