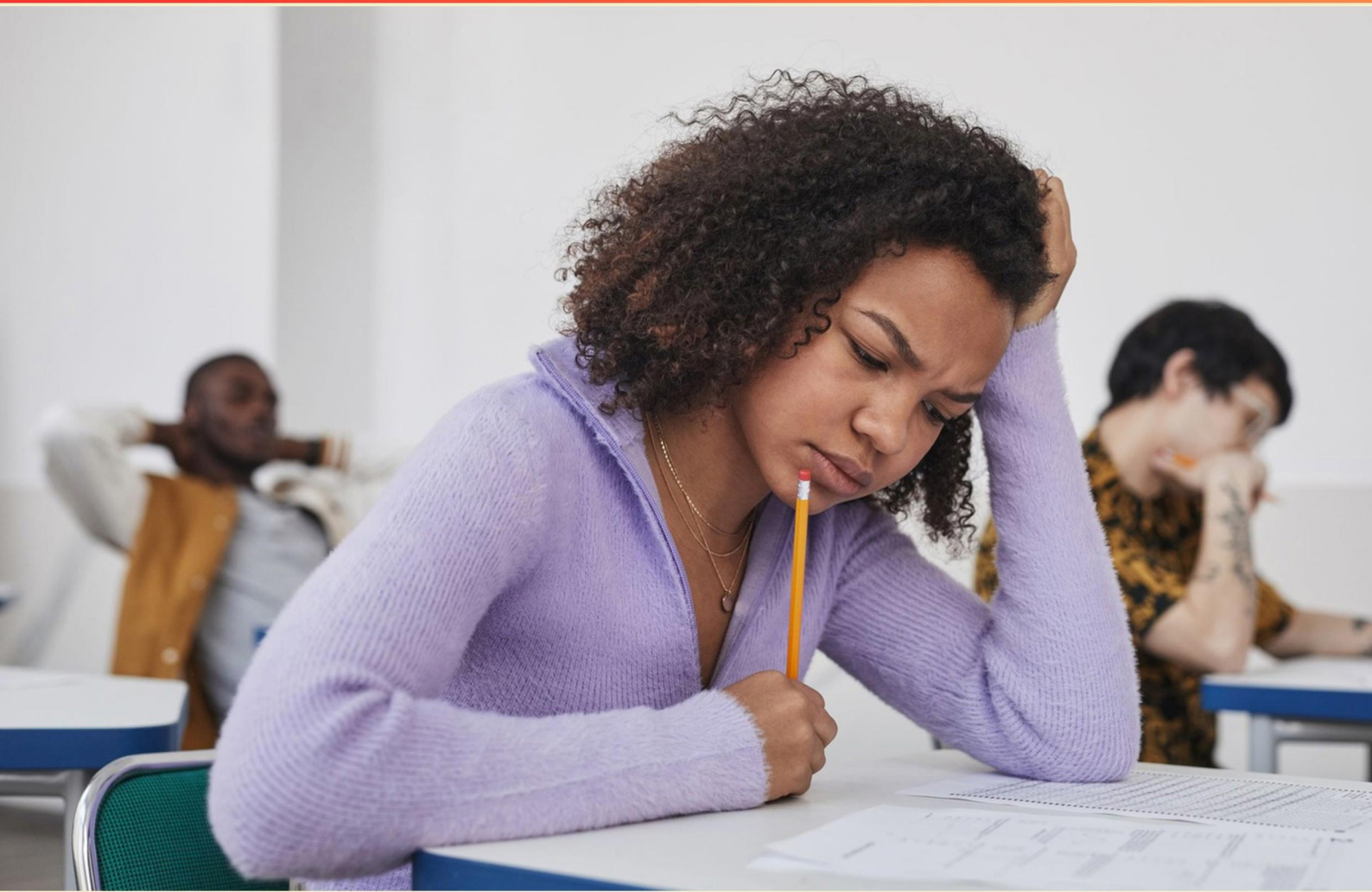

1. What do the Gospels primarily recount?

The main idea is that the Gospels are about Jesus' life and message. They tell who Jesus is, what he did, and what he taught—from his miracles and parables to his crucifixion and resurrection—so readers understand his identity as the Messiah and what it means to follow him. The four Gospels present these events from slightly different angles, but all center on Jesus' ministry, his teaching about the Kingdom of God, and the significance of his death and rising again. The other options mix in different parts of the Bible: the history of Israel's kings comes from the historical books that focus on Israel's rulers; prophecies about the end times appear in prophetic or apocalyptic writings; and the Acts of the Apostles is a separate book that follows the early Christian church after Jesus' ascension.

2. Name a major prophet who spoke about a coming Messiah in the Old Testament.

The main idea here is recognizing messianic prophecy—that is, predictions about a coming savior. The prophet Isaiah is the best-known for this because his writings repeatedly describe an Anointed One who would bring salvation. He includes clear details such as a virgin birth sign, a future king who brings peace and justice, and a suffering servant who bears the sins of many. These vivid images in Isaiah's prophecies give a strong, consistent picture of the Messiah, making him the major prophet most closely tied to predictions about the coming Savior. While other prophets contribute important messages, Isaiah's prophecies stand out for their explicit and abundant messianic content.

The Gospel is the good news about Jesus Christ—the life he lived, the death he died on the cross for sin, his resurrection, and the offer of salvation available to anyone who believes. It focuses on God's rescue plan for humanity and how forgiveness and a restored relationship with God come through faith in Jesus. This isn't about rules to follow on a moral checklist, nor is it a history of Israel's kings, nor a book of poems and prayers. Those other parts of the Bible serve different purposes, but the Gospel is specifically the message that Jesus is the Savior and that through him people can be saved.

4. In which two Sacraments is the anointing a sign of receiving the Gifts of the Holy Spirit?

Anointing with sacred chrism signals the recipient of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit in Baptism and Confirmation. In Baptism, the chrismal anointing marks entry into Christ's life and begins the Spirit's work in the believer, initiating the Gifts of the Spirit. In Confirmation, the bishop anoints with chrism on the forehead and proclaims the sealing with the Gift of the Holy Spirit, strengthening and empowering the person to live out those gifts more boldly. The other options don't center on this oil rite: Eucharist and Reconciliation focus on Communion with Christ and forgiveness, while Anointing of the Sick uses oil for healing and comfort rather than the Gifts of the Spirit. So the two sacraments are Baptism and Confirmation.

5. Name one major theme from the Book of Proverbs.

Wisdom paired with reverence for God is the central idea in Proverbs. The book presents wisdom as practical know-how for everyday living, but it roots true understanding in honoring and following God. You'll hear statements like that being wise starts with the fear of the Lord, meaning real insight comes from prioritizing God and letting His ways shape decisions. Proverbs shows how choosing wisdom over folly affects speech, work, family, and daily choices, leading to a well-ordered life and real flourishing. Miracles in daily life aren't the focus here, since Proverbs emphasizes how to live wisely in ordinary moments. Kingship and monarchy appear in some verses, but they aren't the overarching theme of the collection. Prophecy about the end times belongs to other biblical books, not Proverbs.

6. What is the meaning of 'Messianic expectation' in the context of Second Temple Judaism?

Messianic expectation in this period centers on the belief that God would raise up a future anointed leader from David's line who would deliver Israel from oppression and restore God's rule on earth. The word messiah means "anointed one," and in Second Temple Judaism this often referred to a political-kingly figure who would reestablish the Davidic kingdom and bring about God's justice. This is why the idea of a Davidic king delivering Israel and renewing God's kingdom is the best fit for this concept. The other options don't capture that core idea: the belief in many messiahs wasn't the mainstream focus, the rejection of kingship runs opposite to the messianic hope, and while eschatology can include judgment, the central image here is the coming king and the restoration of God's rule.

7. Which Cardinal Virtue helps us endure difficulty?

Enduring difficulty and staying committed to what is good even when it's hard is the essence of Fortitude, one of the Cardinal Virtues. Fortitude gives us steady courage and perseverance: we face fear, pain, or temptation without giving up, choosing the right course despite obstacles. It isn't about reckless risk; it's about doing what is right when it would be easier to quit. Fortitude works alongside prudence, helping us decide what is worth enduring and how to act; with temperance, it helps us keep going without being overwhelmed by desires; and with justice, it sustains our commitment to the good of others even in hardship. So the virtue that directly enables us to endure difficulty is Fortitude.

Miracles can be grouped by what they involve. A category that fits this question is nature miracles—moments where Jesus shows power over the natural world, like turning water into wine, calming a storm, or walking on water. These events demonstrate control of nature rather than healing a person, driving out a demon, or bringing someone back to life. Parables are stories used to teach lessons, not miracles. Sermons are speaks or messages delivered to listeners, also not miraculous acts. "Parables with crowds" describes a teaching moment, not a type of miracle. So the only option that names a real category of Jesus' miraculous acts is nature miracles.

Sin is a deliberate offense against God, including thoughts, words, deeds, or omissions that break God's law and express a failure to love God and neighbor. This captures the idea of choosing against love and truth in daily life. Virtue is the opposite of this, representing good habits that align with God's law. Temptation is the lure toward sin, not the offense itself. Mortal sin is a grave, serious form of sin that destroys grace; the description here refers to sin overall, not necessarily a grave act, so sin is the best fit.

Virtue is a stable habit of choosing the good that grows through practice and grace. This means it's about more than just how you look on the outside—it's about developing an inner disposition that makes you consistently pick what's right. When you practice good decisions—telling the truth, helping others, acting bravely—these choices become easier and form your character. It's not a temporary feeling that comes and goes, but something enduring that shapes daily life. It isn't irrelevant to daily life either; every everyday decision can reflect and strengthen virtue as your habits solidify. So the best description is that virtue is a stable habit of choosing the good cultivated through practice and grace.
