SAMPLE

1. What is the name of the first liturgical season of the Church year?

- A. Advent
- B. Christmas
- C. Lent

Advent is the first season because it opens the Church year with a focus on preparation and expectant waiting for Jesus' coming, both in the birth of Christ and in his promised return. It lasts about four weeks before Christmas and sets the tone for the entire year by inviting reflection, hope, and readiness. Christmas then follows Advent and celebrates Jesus' birth; Lent comes later as a time of penance and preparation for Easter; Easter celebrates the resurrection and closes the cycle. So Advent fits as the starting point since it begins the calendar and centers on anticipation for the Messiah.

2. Which term refers to a distinct 'who' within the Trinity?

- A. Nature

Think of the Trinity as one God expressed in three distinct identities. The word that names those individual identities is "Person." Each person—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—is fully God, yet they are not the same person. They share one divine nature, which is why terms like nature or substance refer to what God is in common to all three. The whole concept of the Trinity refers to the one God in three persons, not to a single person. So the term that best fits a distinct "who" within the Godhead is Person.

3. Inspiration of Scripture describes

Inspiration of Scripture describes how God guides the human authors to write truths for others, blending divine direction with their own voices and historical contexts. That guidance often leads those who proclaim and live out these truths to face opposition—from insult to persecution—because living righteously can challenge unjust powers and systems. This fits best with the idea that inspiration involves enduring hardship for righteousness. It isn't about wealth being celebrated, being worshiped by all, or being read only by scholars; Scripture is presented as accessible to believers and sometimes at odds with those in authority, rather than simply being celebrated or restricted.

4. Which statement about Moses' Law's relation to Jesus is presented in the material?

The main idea is that Moses' Law serves to reveal moral truth and point to Christ. The Law lays out God's righteous standards and shows what is owed to Him, making human inability to meet those standards clear. In doing so, it exposes sin and directs people toward faith in a Savior. At the same time, it prefigures and anticipates the coming Christ, whose life fulfills the Law's demands and brings forgiveness. That relationship—the Law revealing moral truth and pointing to Christ—best matches the material's presentation. The other ideas miss this dual purpose: the Law isn't mainly about presenting Jesus within its text, nor is its primary aim punishment or wealth discovery.

5. What is the term for the Church's official public daily prayer?

The main idea here is recognizing the Church's official daily public prayer. The term used today for that practice is the Liturgy of the Hours, which is the modern name for what was traditionally called the Divine Office. This daily cycle of prayer, chant, psalms, and Scripture readings is meant to be prayed at designated times throughout the day, uniting the entire Church in worship no matter where it's lived. The Rosary is a separate devotional practice centered on Marian prayers; Mass is the celebration of the Eucharist; and while Divine Office refers to the same practice, the term most commonly used now is Liturgy of the Hours, making it the best match for the question.

6. Which term means praying for the needs of others?

Intercession is praying on behalf of others, bringing their needs before God and asking for His help for them. This act expresses care and concern by talking to God for someone else, whether for family, friends, or people in need. In Christian practice, believers are encouraged to intercede for others, and Jesus is described as the ultimate Intercessor who speaks to the Father on our behalf. That makes intercession the best fit for "praying for the needs of others." Mediation is about acting as a go-between to resolve disputes or connect people with God in a broader sense, but it isn't the specific act of praying for someone's needs. Advent is a liturgical season of anticipation before Christmas, not an act of prayer. A patron saint is a saint viewed as a protector or advocate for a particular group or place, which is about sponsorship or guidance, not the act of praying for others.

7. Which title is used for Mary when she is depicted as the Ark of the Covenant?

- A. Theotokos

The Ark of the Covenant represents God's dwelling with His people. When Mary is depicted as the Ark, the idea is that she bears Jesus, the Word made flesh, inside her—so she becomes the vessel that carries the divine presence. Naming her as Mary as Ark of the Covenant directly expresses that imagery. Other titles like Theotokos or Mother of God describe Mary's role as the God-bearer in a broader sense, but they don't specifically capture the Ark imagery of bearing the divine presence within her. So the best fit for that depiction is Mary as Ark of the Covenant.

8. What term describes teachings handed down from the Apostles?

- A. Apostolic Tradition**
- B. Sacred Scripture
- C. Liturgical Practice
- D. Magisterium

The concept here is how the Gospel is handed on across generations. The term for that living transmission from the Apostles is Apostolic Tradition. It covers the teachings, practices, and faith forms that the apostles themselves handed down and that the Church continues to preserve and pass on, including creeds, liturgical practices, and the understanding handed through the Church's history. Sacred Scripture, while essential, is the written record of revelation, not the entire living transmission. Liturgical Practice is part of that living tradition but doesn't by itself name the ongoing teachings. The Magisterium refers to the Church's teaching authority that safeguards and interprets Tradition and Scripture, not the teachings handed down. So the best term for teachings handed down from the Apostles is Apostolic Tradition.

9. Which concept describes bishops maintaining the mission of the Apostles through an unbroken line?

- A. Magisterium

Apostolic succession is the belief that bishops preserve the mission entrusted to the Apostles by forming an unbroken line of ordination from the original apostles to today's bishops. This continuity is maintained through the laying on of hands in ordination, ensuring the same authority to teach, govern, and sanctify is passed down across generations. Because the Apostles were commissioned to proclaim the gospel and shepherd the church, bishops act as their successors who safeguard that mission over time. The other terms refer to different aspects: the Magisterium is the Church's teaching authority as a body, grace is God's gift to believers, and liturgy is the public worship and sacraments. None of these alone captures the idea of an unbroken chain of ordination that transmits the Apostles' mission.

10. A saint intercedes for a specific group or cause is called what?

- A. Intercession
- B. Vocation

Patron saint is the title given to a saint who is regarded as a special guardian or advocate for a particular group, place, or cause. People invoke the patron saint to seek intercession—to pray to God on their behalf for help with specific needs or concerns. This is different from the act of interceding itself, which is what saints do when they pray on behalf of others. It's also distinct from a vocation (one's calling to religious life or ministry) and from holiness (the state of being holy). So, when a saint is associated with a specific group or cause and is believed to intercede for them, that saint is a patron saint.
