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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which term refers to the surrounding words and sentences around a word?**

**A. Context**

Context is the surrounding words and sentences that shape how we understand a word. This surrounding text influences the meaning, tone, and how the word functions in the sentence. For example, bank can mean a financial institution or the side of a river depending on the nearby words. Context clues are the hints within that surrounding text used to figure out an unfamiliar word, which is a slightly different idea. Word structure refers to the internal parts of the word—its roots and affixes—while an antonym is a word with the opposite meaning.

Future perfect tense is used when you want to say something will be finished before a certain point in the future. The emphasis is on completion by that future time, not just on the occurrence of the action. It's formed with will have plus the past participle of the verb. For example: By this time next year, I will have graduated. By the deadline, she will have completed all the tasks. This contrasts with the simple future, which tells you something will happen but doesn't specify that it will be completed by a specific future moment. The present continuous would describe future plans or arrangements, such as I am meeting them tomorrow. The past perfect describes something completed before another past moment, not something planned for the future, as in I had finished the report before the meeting yesterday.

Nouns are the names of persons, places, things, or ideas. This fits the description because a noun is any entity you can name, whether it's a person like a teacher, a place like a library, a thing like a book, or an idea like freedom. Verbs express actions or states of being, adjectives describe qualities of nouns, and adverbs modify verbs or adjectives. For example, in the sentence "The book is on the table," the word book names a thing, illustrating how nouns function as the names of entities.

A sentence fragment is an incomplete sentence because it doesn't express a complete thought and lacks a main clause. In standard writing, a sentence must have at least one independent clause—a group with a subject and a verb that can stand alone and convey a full idea. That's why "Because of the rain" is a fragment: it leaves you hanging and cannot stand by itself. To fix it, you attach a main clause to complete the thought, such as "Because of the rain, the game was postponed," or turn it into a complete sentence on its own, like "The rain caused the game to be postponed." In contrast, a complete sentence contains at least one independent clause and can stand alone; an independent clause is a clause that expresses a complete thought and could function as a sentence by itself; a compound sentence combines two or more independent clauses, usually with a conjunction or semicolon.

Think of pronouns as the word that takes the place of a noun. This lets you refer to someone or something without repeating the noun over and over. For example, "Sara won the race, and she celebrated" uses "she" to replace the noun Sara, keeping the sentence smooth. Pronouns also change form to match the noun they replace in number and gender and can function in different roles, like the subject or the object (he/him, she/her, they/them). Adjectives describe or modify nouns (blue car, tall tree) but don't stand in for the noun. A noun is the actual thing or person (apple, runner), and a verb is an action or state of being (run, exist).

Signal words are words that alert the reader to shifts in tone, direction, section, or category within an essay. They guide you through the writer's flow by signaling contrasts (however, on the other hand), additions (in addition, moreover), conclusions (therefore, as a result), or sequence (first, next, finally). The other options describe ways of presenting information or visuals rather than cue words themselves, so they don't fit. This is why signal words are the best answer.

**7. Which term best matches the definition 'subject' in the context of the material?**

Subject is the broad matter the material is about. The term that fits best is topic, because it names the general area of discussion the piece covers. The main idea is the specific point the author makes about that subject, not the subject itself. The theme is the underlying message or insight, and context refers to the surrounding circumstances like time, place, and purpose. For example, a passage about drought and farming has the subject as drought or water scarcity; the topic is the broader issue of how water availability affects agriculture.

**8. Which term best describes a sentence that stands on its own and expresses a complete thought, such as 'She sings'?**

Understanding what makes a sentence complete means recognizing that it expresses a full thought and can stand alone. In the example, "She sings," the subject is She and the verb is sings, and the whole statement conveys a complete idea. Because of that, it fits the definition of a complete sentence. It's also true that this could be considered an independent clause—something that can stand by itself—but the term that best describes a sentence that stands on its own and expresses a complete thought is complete sentence. The other terms describe different structures: a run-on sentence joins multiple thoughts without proper punctuation or connectors; a compound sentence combines two independent clauses; an independent clause is a clause that could stand alone but doesn't by itself label the sentence as a whole.

Coordinating conjunctions are the words that join two independent clauses to form a compound sentence. They connect equally strong ideas with terms like for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so. Using one of these connectors with a comma before it shows the relationship between the two thoughts—additive, contrasting, or causal. For example: "I wanted to go for a walk, but it started to rain." Here, two complete thoughts are linked by a single connecting word. Other options aren't connecting words: a colon introduces explanation or a list; a semicolon links two independent clauses without a connecting word; a conjunctive adverb (like however or therefore) connects clauses but typically uses a semicolon before and a comma after.

Understanding how things unfold over time is about the order in which events occur—the sequence of events. This label specifically describes listing events from earliest to latest, so you can see how one event leads to another and build a clear timeline. In narratives or history, following the sequence of events helps you grasp cause and effect and how the story develops. Other terms serve different purposes: a written summary condenses content, a sequence of steps outlines the order of actions in a task, and a topic sentence states the paragraph’s main idea. Because it directly names the chronological order of happenings, the sequence of events is the right choice.
