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Explanations

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1. What does 'postmorbidity' refer to?

Postmorbidity refers to after the onset of an illness, and is the opposite of pre-morbidity which refers to before the onset of an illness. Option A is incorrect because it describes pre-morbidity. Option C is incorrect because it refers to a specific type of condition (manic episode) rather than the general state of being post-morbidity. Option D is incorrect because postmorbidity is a valid term and does not refer to "none of the above".

2. What is idealization?

Idealization is a cognitive bias that involves overestimating the positive qualities or characteristics of another person, situation, or thing. It is during the formal operations stage, from ages eleven and up, that children develop the ability to think abstractly and hypothetically, solve abstract problems, and reason logically about abstract concepts. This stage is characterized by the ability to think beyond concrete experiences
