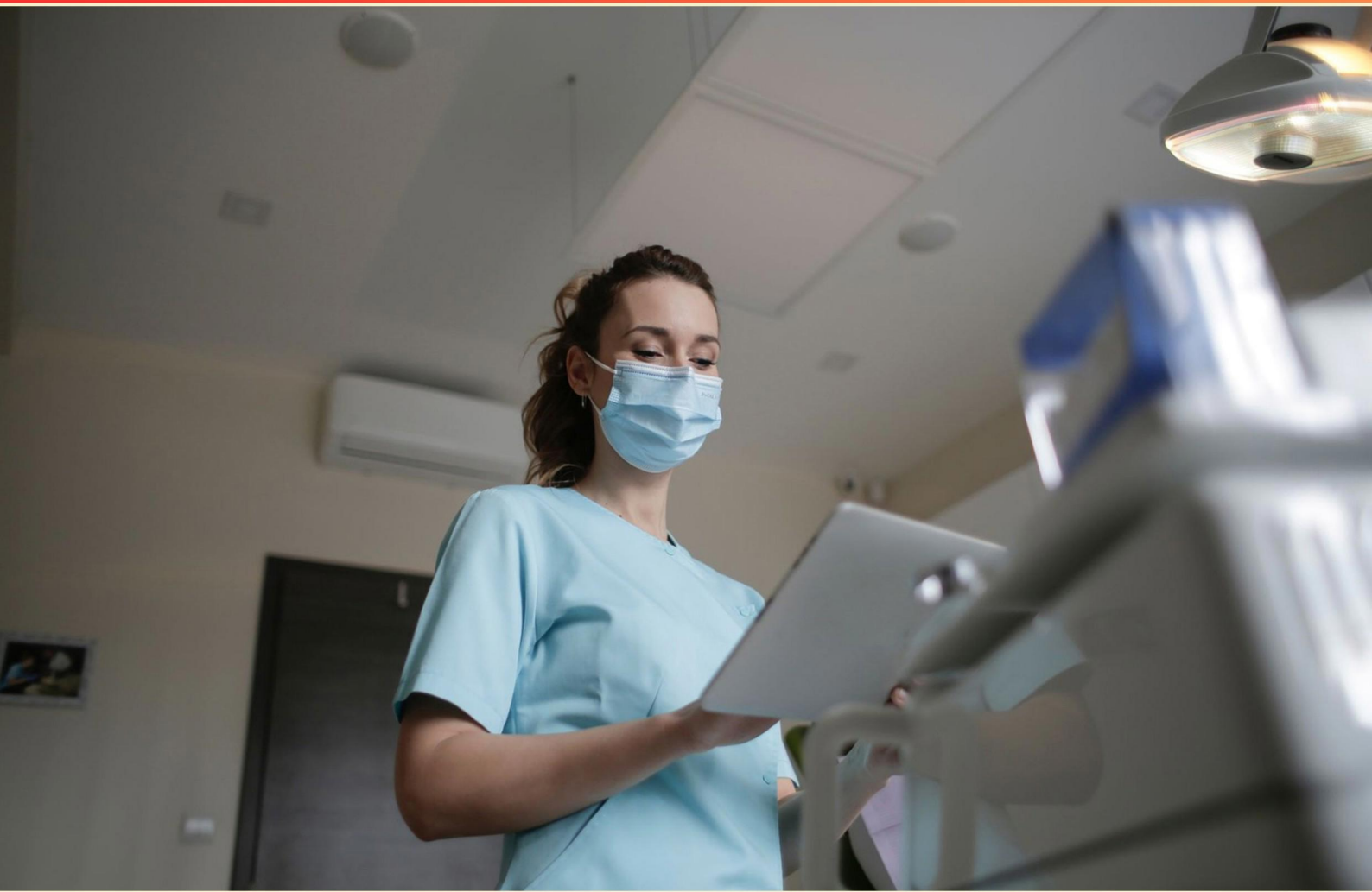

The Medical Record Confidentiality Act deals with the management and privacy of medical records but does not provide the same framework for exceptions related to mandatory reporting of abuse as HIPAA does. Hence, understanding HIPAA's role in mandating reporting of suspected abuse or neglect is crucial
