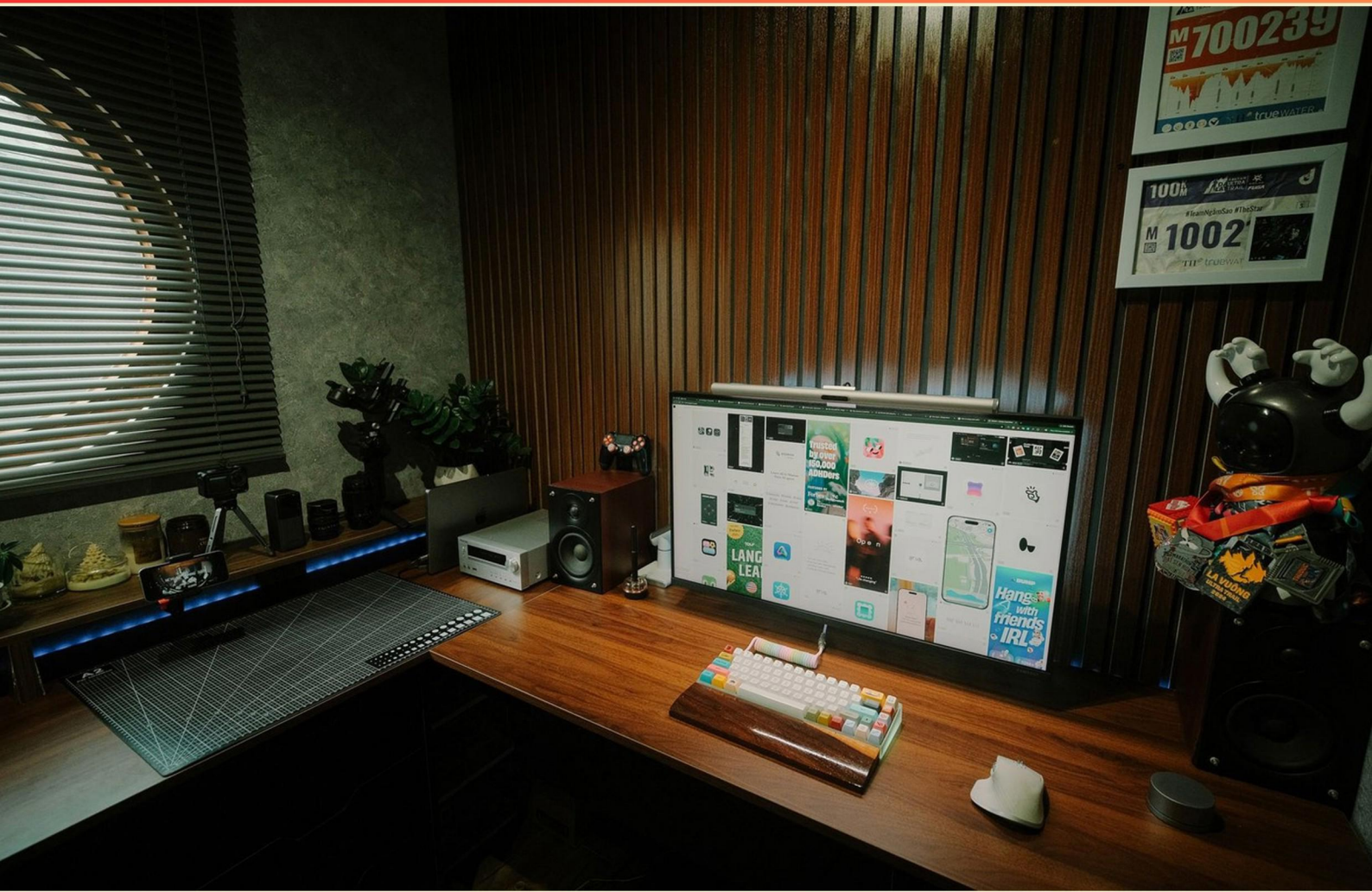

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Explanations

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1. What impact does Ripple Trim have on an active track?

- A. Moves all material to the right of the clip you're trimming forward or backward
- B. Changes the timeline's playback speed

Ripple trim changes the length of the edited clip on the active track and automatically shifts all media to the right of that edit point to compensate. This keeps the timeline on that track continuous without gaps, so the overall timing on that track is preserved as you trim forward or backward. It's a track-specific adjustment, meaning it doesn't alter playback speed, duplicate clips, or apply a cross-dissolve by itself.

2. Which action best describes the effect of the Add Edit button on a segment, compared to a simple cut?

Add Edit creates an edit point inside a clip at the playhead, turning one segment into two separate segments on the timeline. This lets you treat the front and back portions independently, which is what you need when you want to insert something between them or apply different edits to each part. It's not duplicating the clip, locking it, or extending it to fill gaps. So the action described is that it divides the segment in the Timeline.

3. What does the Extract function do in the timeline?

- A. Removes material from the Timeline and closes the gap left by its removal

The Extract function removes the selected portion from the timeline and automatically closes the gap by shifting everything that comes after it left to fill the space. This means the sequence remains continuous and the overall duration decreases by the length of the removed segment. For example, removing a two-second section in the middle causes the subsequent material to move up two seconds. This is different from lifting, which also removes material but leaves a gap in the timeline. The other actions—adding a new clip, duplicating a segment, or applying a transition—do not describe removing a segment and closing the space.

4. There are three Frame Views. Which statement is true?

The key idea is to align your choice with the given setup. If the question states there are three Frame Views, the true statement is the one that directly says there are three Frame Views. The other options propose different counts and would contradict the stated condition, so they aren't correct. Think of Frame Views as the number of panels you're viewing at once; with three shown, the option that says three matches exactly what's been given.

5. How do you enable the Solo option on an audio track?

- A. Click the M button in the Timeline Track Control panel
- B. Right-click the track header and select Solo
- C. Double-click the track to open its properties
- D. Click the S button in the Timeline Track Control panel**

Soloing a track isolates it so you hear only that track during playback. In Avid Media Composer, the Solo control is the S button in the Timeline Track Control panel. Clicking it enables Solo for that track, and with Solo on, all other tracks are muted so you can focus on the audio of the selected track. Click the S button again to turn Solo off and return to normal playback. The M button mutes a track, not solo, and opening a track's properties or other paths won't enable Solo in the standard timeline workflow.

6. What does this button do? [:::] | [:::] (add edit)

- A. Moves a segment to a different track

Inserting an edit point at the playhead to divide a segment is what this button does. When pressed, the clip under the playhead is split into two separate clips, creating a cut in the Timeline. This lets you insert or adjust other material between the two parts without moving anything to another track or creating a new timeline. If the clip contains both video and audio (and they are linked), the split applies to both at that position, giving you two pieces you can trim or rearrange independently. In short, it divides a single segment into two at the current position.

7. How do you create a freeze frame clip within Media Composer?

- A. Right-click the clip and choose Freeze Frame
- B. Apply Freeze Frame from the Effects menu
- C. Load a clip in the Source monitor and go to Composer > Freeze Frame**
- D. Use Timewarp on the clip

Creating a freeze frame in Media Composer is about turning a single, exact frame from your clip into a still image you can hold on the timeline. Do this by loading the clip in the Source monitor, moving the playhead to the frame you want to hold, and choosing Freeze Frame from the Composer menu. This creates a still clip from that precise frame, which you can then insert into the timeline and extend to your desired duration. This approach is the straightforward, frame-accurate way to lock a moment in time. Options that apply an effect or alter speed aren't the same as generating a still frame from the current frame, so they don't accomplish the same result.

To compare a stabilized clip with the original, you bypass the stabilization rather than duplicating or exporting. In the Effect Editor, stabilization is controlled by parameter groups. Disabling the active parameter groups temporarily turns off the stabilization, so you can view the clip as it was originally—within the same timeline and without applying the effect. This lets you see exactly how stabilization changes motion, cropping, or framing on each frame, side by side with the stabilized result when you re-enable the parameters. It's more efficient for direct in-project comparison than rendering a side-by-side view, duplicating the clip and stabilizing it, or exporting a separate file.

9. Which action does the Add Edit button perform?

Add Edit places a cut at the playhead position on the selected track, dividing an existing segment into two separate segments. This is how you insert a break in a clip to adjust timing or to fit in another piece of media. For example, a 10-second clip would become two clips at the cut point: one before the playhead and one after. It doesn't duplicate the clip, remove a portion, or lock the segment; those are different actions handled by other tools.

10. When creating a motion effect, which render method works best for 24p footage?

When applying a motion effect to 24p footage, handling fields properly is crucial for clean, smooth motion. Even though 24p is progressive, motion processing often relies on field-based sampling to build and analyze temporal information. Rendering with both fields provides two complementary temporal samples: one field content can be duplicated to fill in the other, while the other field can be interpolated to create a fuller frame. Using both fields gives the motion engine more data to work with, improving motion estimation and reducing artifacts, which helps preserve the natural cadence of 24p while avoiding stutter or blur. If you render with only the duplicated field, motion can appear choppy; with only the interpolated field, you may introduce interpolation artifacts and softness; skipping fields altogether can misalign the motion with the source timing. Therefore, using both fields yields the most robust result for 24p motion effects.
