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Explanations

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1. Explain contingency planning in RC aviation and give an example.

- A. Plans for unexpected events with no practical examples.
- B. Only plans for weather-related issues.

Contingency planning is about pre-arranging backup options for things that could go wrong during a flight. In RC aviation, it means thinking ahead not just about weather, but about any disruption—equipment issues, navigation problems, airspace restrictions, or a blocked route—and having ready-made alternatives. The best choice captures that idea and gives a concrete example: planning an alternate landing site along the planned route so you can divert if the primary area becomes unavailable. This shows how you anticipate disruption and keep the mission safe by having a viable fallback. Other options miss the full scope. It isn't just about plans with no practical examples, nor is it limited to weather issues, and contingency planning is indeed a standard practice used to manage risk and keep operations safe.

2. Movement to Contact Subtasks include which of the following?

Movement to Contact is about finding the enemy and then engaging to establish contact. The subtask pairing that captures this sequence is to search for the enemy and then attack to close with and destroy them. This reflects the proactive nature of MTC: locate the threat quickly and move to defeat it so you can gain or regain contact. The other options describe different actions—defending is holding a position, flanking is a maneuver to wheel around the enemy, and reconnoitering is about gathering information. While some reconnaissance may occur, the formal subtasks for Movement to Contact center on Search & Attack.

3. Which unit level is typically commanded by a captain and oversees several platoons?

Captains typically command a company, a unit made up of several platoons. This is the level where leadership coordinates multiple platoons, handles company-wide planning, logistics, and administration, and supervises mid-range operations. A team or crew is much smaller and usually led by a sergeant, not a captain. A brigade is a much larger formation composed of multiple battalions and generally commanded by a colonel or general. A battalion sits above a company and includes several companies, typically commanded by a lieutenant colonel. In many branches, artillery units use the term battery and cavalry/armored units use troop, which are equivalent in size to a company and also commonly commanded by a captain. So the unit level that fits the description of being commanded by a captain and overseeing several platoons is the company (or its equivalent in other branches, such as a battery or troop).

4. In a joint environment, how does AVN C3 RC share data with coalition partners while preserving security?

The main idea is how to share data with coalition partners in a joint environment while keeping information secure. The best approach combines secured data links with encryption, network segmentation, role-based access, and joint interoperability standards. Secured data links protect data in transit from eavesdropping and tampering. Network segmentation limits where data can move within the network, so a compromise in one segment doesn't necessarily give access to everything. Role-based access enforces least privilege, ensuring individuals only see what they need for their role. Joint interoperability standards align data formats, protocols, and security controls across partners, enabling reliable, secure exchanges despite different systems. Together, these measures preserve confidentiality, integrity, and controlled accessibility, enabling secure collaboration. Unsecured links or public networks with minimal controls would expose data to interception and manipulation, undermining security. Ignoring coalition data requirements would bypass governance and create significant risk.

5. In Troop Leading Procedures, which step is the first?

Receiving the mission is the starting point because everything that follows hinges on a clear understanding of what you're being asked to accomplish. When you receive the mission, you lock in the task, the commander's intent, the time frame, any constraints or rules of engagement, and the assets available. This gives you a precise objective and the end state you must achieve, which guides all subsequent steps in planning and execution. With that understanding, you can issue a warning order, begin formulating a plan, initiate movement, and determine what reconnaissance is needed. If you skip this first step, planning can drift from the true purpose, misinterpret the intent, or overlook critical constraints, wasting time and risking the mission. So the initial action is to absorb and confirm the mission to set the foundation for effective Troop Leading Procedures.

When communications fail, staying in control requires a layered approach that keeps information flowing and decisions moving despite outages. Using multiple, redundant links means there isn't a single point of failure—the team can switch to an alternate path for sending and receiving critical data. Offline planning tools provide access to plans, maps, and decision aids without needing live networks, so operations can continue even if the internet or command channels are down. Pre-scripted procedures give you ready-to-follow steps for outage scenarios, reducing hesitation and ensuring consistent responses when urgent actions are needed. Alternate communications ensure you're not limited to one method; if one channel goes dark, another can carry essential messages. Together, these measures create resilience: you don't depend on one communication path, you have resources that don't require online access, you can act quickly through rehearsed steps, and you can adapt by using different channels as needed. Relying on primary communications alone risks a total outage; pausing operations wastes critical time; and using only one solution like satellite phones leaves gaps in other necessary messaging and coordination.

7. Who leads the Target Value Analysis process?

Target Value Analysis is a process that ties target value directly to the effects fires can achieve. Because it centers on evaluating how hitting or influencing a target changes the enemy's capabilities and mission outcome, the lead role naturally falls to the fires cell. This team has the expertise to translate target value into fire planning decisions, sequencing, and munitions allocation, ensuring that the most impactful targets are addressed first. Inputs come from other cells: intelligence provides target data and threat context, operations shapes timing and maneuver considerations, and logistics ensures ammunition and resources are available. But the fires cell coordinates and leads the TVA, bringing together this information to produce a prioritized target list and a coherent fire plan.

RL progression days are built around being available for scheduled training, with certain situations defined as exclusions that pause or prevent progression. Authorized leave, aircraft non-availability due to movement, and weather-related cancellations are all examples of such exclusions because they keep you from actively progressing. Squadron training attendance is not an exclusion. It's the intended activity that counts toward progression, so it's considered part of the progression process rather than something that would stop it.

9. Which term is used to describe removing all hostiles from an area?

Removing all hostiles from an area is described as clearing. Clearing means that the objective area is made completely free of enemy personnel, equipment, or threats, and it includes thorough reconnaissance, securing all approaches, and maintaining security to ensure the area can be trusted as safe for friendly forces or civilians. This is different from containment, which is about restricting enemy movement without necessarily eliminating them; canalize, which focuses on directing or constraining the enemy along certain routes; and attack by fire, a tactic that uses fires to engage and degrade the enemy rather than achieving a guaranteed, threat-free area on its own.

10. AR 27-10 addresses which topic?

AR 27-10 addresses the military justice system under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. It lays out how legal processes are handled in the Army—courts-martial, nonjudicial punishment, investigations, rights of the accused, defense it may involve, appeals, and the overall structure for discipline and legal action. The regulation provides the procedures, authorities, and due-process protections that govern how offenses are processed and adjudicated within the Army. This topic isn't about safeguarding information and operations (operational security), overseeing intelligence activities (intelligence oversight), or managing the flow of supplies and equipment (logistics regulation). Those areas are covered by other regulations, while AR 27-10 specifically focuses on how the Army administers justice and enforces military law.
