### 1. A spot check is best described as which of the following?

*A spot check is a quick, targeted verification of specific items or conditions during ongoing operations to confirm they meet requirements. It's a focused check, not a full review, so it's faster and less formal than a complete audit. Spot checks are used to catch issues early by validating just the areas or elements being inspected, rather than examining everything in depth. In contrast, a full audit involves a thorough, documented examination; an interim report communicates status during a project; and a final inspection verifies everything at the end.*

### 2. Who can extend stay times?

- A. Security Officer
- B. XO
- C. Co**
- D. Supervisor

*Extending BEQ stay times is an administrative housing decision handled by the person who manages unit housing matters. The Company Officer oversees personnel administration and housing assignments, so they have the authority to approve extensions based on needs like training, deployments, or administrative holds. The Security Officer is focused on safety, the Executive Officer handles command duties, and the Supervisor isn't the designated authority for BEQ occupancy lengths. That combination of housing responsibility and delegated authority makes the Company Officer the correct choice.*

### 3. If there are twenty watchstanders, how many EEBDs should be available?

*The concept here is ensuring enough emergency breathing devices with redundancy so everyone on duty can access one quickly, even if devices are being used or moved during drills or an incident. EEBDs provide breathable air in smoke-filled or toxic spaces, so you want coverage for every watchstander plus backups. Doubling the count to forty for twenty watchstanders gives each person a ready device and keeps spare units available in nearby locations or at other stations for rapid deployment, without creating a bottleneck. Having only one per person risks running out during multi-person incidents or drills, while substantially more than forty would exceed typical safety provisioning.*

#### 4. Which heat-related injury is indicated by hot, dry skin and bizarre behavior?

- A. Heat stroke

*Hot, dry skin with bizarre behavior points to heat stroke, a life-threatening condition where the body's cooling system fails and core temperature rises, often above 104°F (40°C). The dry skin occurs because sweating has stopped, and the abnormal mental state reflects brain dysfunction from overheating. This differs from heat exhaustion, where sweating is typically present and the person is faint or weak rather than profoundly altered; heat cramps are painful muscle spasms without CNS symptoms, and hyperthermia is the broad term for elevated body temperature with heat stroke being the dangerous specific form. Immediate action is crucial: seek emergency help and begin rapid cooling—remove excess clothing, apply cool water or ice packs to the neck, armpits, and groin, use fans, and monitor consciousness and breathing.*

#### 5. What do face shields protect from?

*Face shields are designed to guard the face from liquid splashes, sprays, and droplets, protecting the eyes, nose, and mouth by creating a barrier between you and the fluid. They also help deflect some flying debris. They're not intended for heat protection, hearing protection, or as the primary protection against dust; for those hazards you'd use specialized equipment like heat-rated shields, hearing protection, or respirators/goggles as appropriate.*

#### 6. Which color tag is associated with caution in maintenance areas?

- A. Red
- B. Yellow
- C. Orange
- D. Blue

*Safety color tags communicate hazard levels, especially in maintenance areas. Yellow is used to signal caution, meaning equipment or space may pose hazards and should be approached with care. Before operating or entering, verify that the issue is being handled by authorized personnel and follow any prescribed procedures to avoid injury or damage. Red indicates immediate danger or out-of-service status, so it's not used for general caution. Orange is tied to more urgent warnings around specific hazards, not the routine caution tag. Blue is often associated with mandatory actions or information.*

## 7. Which program is designed to manage materials and resources?

Managing maintenance tasks along with the parts, tools, and personnel needed to complete them is handled by the 3-M Program. This system standardizes how work is planned, resourced, and tracked, ensuring that materials and resources are available when maintenance is scheduled. It ties together task planning with supply and manpower so that maintenance can proceed without delays due to missing parts or people. The other options relate to different aspects: one focuses on planning and scheduling maintenance tasks, another is a reference list of equipment and procedures, and the last is a program with a different scope. The 3-M Program is the one designed to coordinate maintenance actions with the necessary materials and personnel, making it the best fit for managing materials and resources.

## 8. Which document provides the correction conditions for tag-out work?

The key idea here is where the specific criteria for when tag-out work is required and when it can be released are defined. That information is laid out in the TORS. This document provides the correction conditions that must be met before tag-out can be removed and the system can be safely returned to service. It outlines what deficiencies or hazards trigger tag-out, the corrective actions needed, how those corrections are verified, and the steps to release the tag-out once the work is complete. SOPs cover general procedures for tagging and isolating, but they don't specify the exact corrective conditions that must be met before tag-out can be cleared. MFR and PM relate to reporting/maintenance activities and scheduling, not to the corrective criteria for tag-out.

## 9. Which cooling method is not recommended as part of initial heat exposure management?

- A. Move to shade and hydrate

Initial heat exposure management aims to cool someone quickly using safe, readily available steps in the field. The focus is on removing heat sources and promoting cooling with simple measures like moving the person to shade, offering fluids if they are able to drink, and using evaporation and surface cooling. That's why moving to shade and hydrating works well, and using fans with lighter clothing helps heat loss through evaporation and convection. Applying neck wraps fits into this approach by cooling large blood vessels near the surface to assist with lowering temperature. Immersion in cold water is a much more aggressive cooling method that requires careful supervision and the right setting. In non-clinical environments, it can pose risks such as shock, overheating from rapid temperature changes, or aspiration if the person isn't fully conscious. It's typically reserved for specific cases like heat stroke under trained medical oversight and appropriate equipment. For initial management in the BEQ context, safer, easily applied measures come first, with immersion reserved for situations where professional care and monitoring are available.

## 10. When should you not mark EEBD stowage cabinets?

- A. When they are installed above berths
- B. When they are installed under berths**

*The idea being tested is that safety markings must be visible and easy to read when you need them in an emergency. EEBD stowage cabinets are marked to show what's inside and whether the cabinet is in use or empty, so rescuers and personnel can locate and assess them quickly. When a cabinet is installed under berths, access is limited and the label is often blocked by bedding or the berth itself, making the marking hard to see in a hurry. Because of that, you don't mark those cabinets in that location. In contrast, cabinets in more accessible positions (like above berths) should be marked so their contents and status are immediately identifiable, and you would update markings if the EEBD is in use or if the cabinet is empty.*
