The other terms provided, while related to modernity in some aspects, do not specifically encapsulate the characteristic of instability as vividly as "liquid modernity" does. "Late modernity" refers broadly to the later stage of modernity

Recognizing that nations have historical roots speaks directly to the Perennialist belief in their long-standing origins and continuity over time. Additionally, the idea that nations perpetuate through historical ancestors underscores the connection of present national identities to past lineages, traditions, and cultural narratives, which is a fundamental aspect of Perennialist thought. Thus, the emphasis on modern political ideologies as a factor in the evolution of nations represents a more modernist perspective, distinguishing it from the Perennialist focus on continuity and historical depth.*

Larry Wolff discusses the construction of national identities in Eastern Europe, while Walter Mignolo addresses concepts of coloniality and the geopolitical aspects of knowledge, but none analyze the Balkans in relation to European identity as specifically as Goldsworthy does.*

Similarly, while religious doctrines and rituals played a role in Greek society, they were not the central concern of philosophers, who often sought to question and explore beyond traditional beliefs. Political structures and governance were topics of interest; however, they were usually discussed in relation to ethics and the ideal state rather than being the main emphasis of philosophical thought. Thus, the pursuit of knowledge and its relationship to the good encapsulates the essence of Greek philosophy.*

The choice accurately captures this mindset, which often reflects broader societal fears and misconceptions regarding the capabilities and behavior of cultures deemed as the "Other."*
