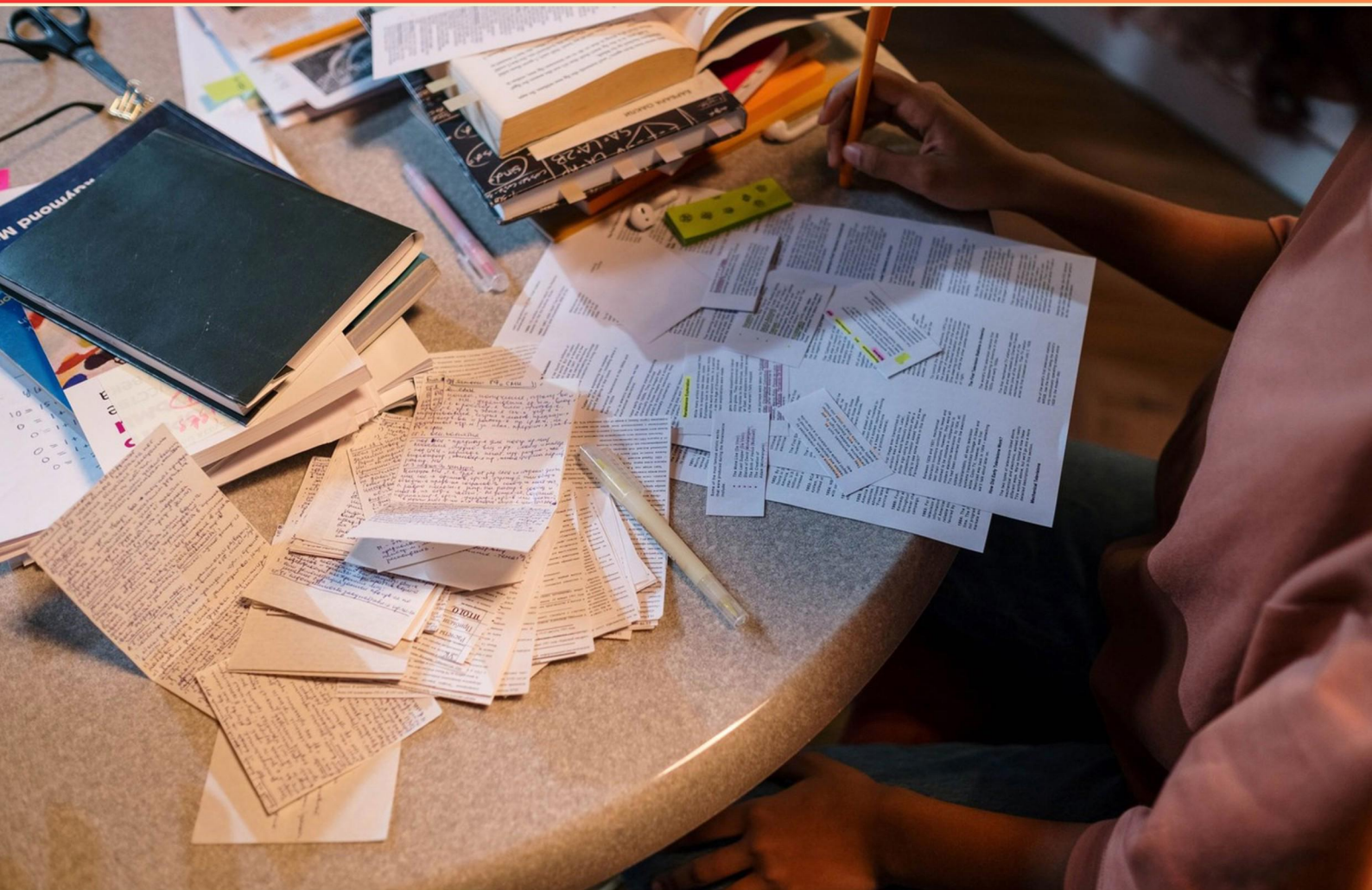

In the event of a tie for president according to the Electoral College rules, the decision goes to the Senate, with each state having one vote.
