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Explanations

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1. Non-electronic items which may be important to investigating electronic crime includes which of the following?

A. Notebooks which may contain relevant info associated with the investigation

B. USB drives

Focusing on non-electronic evidence in an electronic crime investigation shows that physical records can provide essential context, lead new lines of inquiry, and corroborate digital findings. Notebooks are particularly valuable because they may contain names, dates, contact info, transaction notes, passwords, or sketches related to the scheme, offering a tangible trail that can be analyzed for motives, timelines, and connections. Handwriting analysis can even link the notebook to a suspect, and the information inside can fill gaps left by digital data. USB drives and computers are electronic items, so they don't fit the non-electronic requirement, and magazines and newspapers, while non-electronic, are less likely to hold direct, case-specific information about the electronic crime unless there is something very particular to be found.

Felony vehicle stops are high risk because the encounter can be extremely dangerous, complex, and unpredictable; the people involved may be dangerous or highly motivated fugitives; and the subject in the vehicle can feel like they have the upper hand, which affects decision-making and adds volatility to the situation. The statement about being conducted in marked local LEO vehicles is not described as a reason for the high risk. Marked vehicles themselves don't inherently create or remove risk in the way the other factors do; the danger comes from the suspect's actions, weapons, and the dynamic environment of a stop, not simply the visibility of the vehicle.

High-risk felony vehicle stops require thorough preparation and structured planning. Clear safety priorities guide decisions in the field, helping maintain control of the scene, protect officers, and preserve life when possible. A complete operational plan with contingencies prepares for a range of twists—backup needs, communication protocols, medical readiness, escape routes, and escalation options—so responders aren't improvising on the fly. The option that suggests a universal okay to proceed with minimal planning does not fit. Proceeding with minimal planning undermines safety and control in high-risk stops, and it is not part of proper planning considerations.

Preservation letters are formal directives from an agency to protect relevant information and materials from destruction or alteration in anticipation of litigation or investigation. For this directive to carry proper authority and be enforceable, it needs to be issued on official agency letterhead and bear the supervisor's signature. The letterhead signals it's an official act of the agency, and the supervisor's signature confirms who is directing the preservation action, creating a clear paper trail and accountability. Verbal requests don't establish a written, enforceable obligation and can be easily forgotten or misinterpreted. Email notices, while quick, typically don't carry the same formal authority or records-preserving weight as a signed, letterhead directive. A standard memo may guide internal practices but lacks the formal validation and official status that a properly signed preservation letter provides.

Voluntary consent is valid only when two things are true: the person gives consent freely under the totality of the circumstances, and the person has actual or apparent authority to grant that consent. Voluntariness means the search isn't the result of coercion, threats, promises, or deceptive pressure; factors like the setting, how long it's been, the presence of officers, and whether the person was informed of their rights all influence whether the consent was truly voluntary. Authority to give consent means the person has control over the premises or items to be searched—typically the owner or occupant, or someone with shared or apparent authority over the area. If one element is missing, the consent may be invalid and the search may be unlawful. The other options introduce unnecessary requirements or misunderstandings: written consent and witnesses aren't required, and consent isn't about anyone present or in uniform, nor is it limited to consent from the person named on a warrant.

Criminals gravitate to the internet mainly because it lets them act with far less risk to their own safety. Problems that would put them in physical danger or expose them to direct confrontation can be avoided when crimes are planned and executed remotely from a secure location. This dramatic reduction in the likelihood of harm or arrest is the strongest pull. Anonymity and access to a worldwide pool of potential victims are important advantages that help sustain online wrongdoing, and they support the same goal by making it easier to hide and reach more targets. Low expense is a factor, but the core appeal remains the much lower physical risk compared to committing crimes in person.

Advertising ID is a unique, user-resettable identifier provided by the device's operating system that advertising services use to recognize a device across apps for personalized ads and to measure ad performance. It stays separate from hardware identifiers and isn't tied to your IP address or a browser cookie. This ID can be reset or limited by the user, and OS privacy settings control how apps access it.

In the approach phase, the focus is on how the team moves toward the entry in a way that maximizes safety and sets up a quick, controlled breach. The elements that fit this phase include the optimal distance you maintain from the target, the angles of approach that give you good sightlines and protection while minimizing exposure, the available cover you can use along the route, how team members are positioned to support each other and prevent crossing lines of fire, and the tools you bring to the entry so you're ready to breach or bypass obstacles without delays. Maintaining the right distance helps you react in time without crowding the target; choosing the right angles controls lines of sight and access to the entry; using cover reduces exposure as you advance; deliberate positioning ensures everyone has a clear role and a safe path, enabling a swift, coordinated transition into the breach; and having the appropriate tools on hand ensures you can execute the entry immediately when you reach the target. Other factors like how many officers are on the team, safety gear, or the specific roles assigned (shield, lethal, nonlethal, breacher) are important to the operation overall, but the approach phase centers on planning the movement and equipment configuration that make the entry possible.

9. If audio and video are being observed in real time, what instrument is required?

Real-time interception of audio and video is governed by the wiretap rules, which require authorization through Title III. Title III provides the framework and authority for intercepting communications and is the mechanism by which a court issues a wiretap order to permit live monitoring. This order is issued after showing probable cause and is tightly scoped, with safeguards to minimize intrusion and limit the duration of the interception. A subpoena does not authorize live interception, a preservation letter only directs retention of existing data, and a generic court order isn't sufficient for interception unless it's issued under Title III. So the instrument needed to lawfully observe the communications in real time is a Title III wiretap order.

10. DUSMs may participate in a high-risk vehicle pursuit initiated by other agencies if the subject is:

When a DUSM joins a high-risk vehicle pursuit led by another agency, the permissible scenario is tied to federal jurisdiction and coordinated efforts. If the subject is a federal fugitive or the case is assigned to a joint task force the Marshals Service participates in the pursuit under established supervision and interagency coordination. This setup leverages federal authority and the resources of a task force, ensuring actions align with policy and safety requirements. Armed subject or pursuing under any circumstances aren't the defining factors for cross-agency participation. The critical condition is the federal nature of the fugitive or the case's inclusion in a task force, which justifies Marshals involvement and formal coordination.
