A musical tells a story through songs woven into dialogue and choreography, usually on stage. The Sound of Music is best known as a Broadway musical by Rodgers and Hammerstein, with songs that advance the plot and reveal character, not as a book, a continuous sung work, or a film version. While there is a famous film adaptation, the work's defining form is the musical, not a novel or an opera.

2. Which book features a character who calls herself 'two brains'?

- A. The Mighty Miss Malone**

Understanding a character's voice often comes from how they describe themselves. In The Mighty Miss Malone, the character Deza Malone calls herself "two brains," a line that showcases her sharp wit, confidence, and quick thinking as she navigates the hardships of the Great Depression. That self-description helps readers hear her lively, resilient perspective and matters of everyday life from her point of view, making this book the best match for the question. The other titles feature memorable characters and strong voices, but none center on a character who uses that exact nickname to describe herself.

3. Some of Part I of this story took place in the Sierra Nevada range in California.

The main idea here is using setting as a clue. The Sierra Nevada range in California is a distinctive landscape, and the story that places Part I there uses that specific location to ground its events and themes. Two Degrees centers on climate-change scenarios and includes scenes set in the Sierra Nevada, helping readers connect the geographic context to the unfolding narrative about environmental events. That California mountains setting sets it apart from the other titles, which unfold their stories in very different places: Stranded focuses on survival on a remote location not tied to the Sierra Nevada; The Lightning Thief moves through mythic adventures across various locations, not centered in California's mountains; The Breadwinner takes place in Kabul under Taliban rule. So the Sierra Nevada setting in Part I points to Two Degrees as the book described.

4. Which book features nights often uneasy for a character because he could hear the distant roar of lions and the screams of their prey?

This line shows how a writer uses sound to place a character in a dangerous, remote setting. The distant roars of lions and the cries of their prey create an atmosphere of isolation and threat at night, signaling that the wilderness itself is a real danger and heightening the reader's sense of unease. That fit is strongest in A Long Walk to Water, where Salva's journey takes him across the Sudanese landscape. The savanna can be filled with wildlife and harsh conditions, so nights would feel tense as he moves through unknown territory, relying on each small sign of danger to survive. Other books lean in different directions: one is a highly controlled, non-wilderness society; another centers on a survival story in a different environment with different threats; and the fantasy tale uses magical conflict rather than real-world predator noise. The description here aligns most naturally with Salva's perilous trek.

Understanding how a character reacts to everyday language shows how authors reveal voice, quirks, and attitudes through dialogue. When a reader notices that a character thinks the expression "spitting image" is nasty, it signals sensitivity to bodily imagery and possibly cultural or personal tastes about language. In Clean Getaway, there's a moment where a character explicitly dislikes or finds the expression unpleasant, which highlights that character's perspective on language and what counts as acceptable or off-putting wording. This kind of reaction is the vivid clue the question is probing for—a precise moment that ties the idiom to a character's viewpoint. The other novels don't hinge on that specific reaction to the phrase, so they don't demonstrate the same pattern of language attitude the question asks about.

That playful, memorable visual cue fits the book's light, road-trip adventure tone and helps readers picture the character right away. The other novels—a dystopian tale, a coming-of-age with sharp realism, and a myth-inspired quest—use different kinds of descriptions and vibes, so the cotton-ball-on-a-cone image points you to Clean Getaway as the best match.

7. Which novel features a spelling clue where Mississippi is recited as M, I, crooked letter, crooked letter, I?

The question hinges on recognizing a distinctive spelling cue used to signal a place. In Clean Getaway, a character uses the familiar mnemonic for Mississippi—M, I, crooked letter, crooked letter, I—where “crooked letter” stands for the S, turning the sequence into MISSI..., a playful way to spell out Mississippi. This clue ties directly to the road-trip setting and the family’s connections to the South, highlighting how geography and memory shape the story. That specific device isn’t found in the other novels listed, which leaves Clean Getaway as the best match.

This question centers on a moment that shows how a family manages everyday choices to support a child with a disability, and how small actions reveal deeper concerns about safety, access, and independence. In Out of My Mind, a mother buys a used CD for five dollars and then breaks it in half. That act isn’t just about the object itself; it signals the careful balance the family tries to strike between enabling Melody’s learning and protecting her from things that could cause frustration or harm given her situation. The scene helps readers see the practical, sometimes tough, decisions families face when supporting a child who sees the world differently, and it highlights themes of care, resilience, and the desire for Melody to navigate the world with as much autonomy as possible. The other titles take place in different settings and explore distinct stories and themes, so they don’t contain this specific moment.

9. During play practice, a character had to answer three knocks on the door by three different people while looking in the bathroom mirror. What did he have to do?

This item tests how you respond to cues during a scene. The moment describes the character dealing with three different visitors knocking at the door while he’s looking in a bathroom mirror, so the action required is to answer the door to each visitor. That’s exactly what “answer three knocks” means—the actor must acknowledge and respond to each knock. The other options describe activities not shown here: memorizing lines would be preparing words in advance, a monologue would be a long speech, and singing a song isn’t indicated by the knocking scenario.

10. A box held approximately thirty chalkboard erasers in this novel.

A. The Scarlet Letter

B. The Wednesday Wars

C. Lord of the Flies

This detail hinges on a realistic school setting and the everyday objects that fill a classroom. A box holding about thirty chalkboard erasers points to a middle grade story centered on school life, where the narrator thinks in terms of desks, chalk, and classroom routines. The Wednesday Wars follows Holling Hoodhood, a seventh grader in the 1967–68 school year, and much of the action centers on his experiences in class, with the teacher and the school environment shaping the story. The other novels are set in very different worlds—The Scarlet Letter in Puritan-era society, Lord of the Flies on a deserted island, and The Great Gatsby in Jazz Age New York—and none focus on a modern classroom filled with chalkboard supplies. So this erasers detail best aligns with The Wednesday Wars, making it the right match.
