Glucose levels are not predictably elevated in a normal pregnancy; they stay close to prepregnancy values unless gestational diabetes is present. Bilirubin levels are not typically higher than before pregnancy, and hematocrit usually decreases due to plasma volume expansion outpacing red blood cell production, leading to physiologic anemia rather than an increase. So the elevated lab value most characteristic of normal pregnancy is fibrinogen.

The crucial step is explaining how those quotes support your argument—connecting the evidence to your thesis and showing why it matters for your analysis. This approach keeps the focus on your reasoning rather than on lengthy blocks of quoted text. Relying mainly on plot summary bypasses interpretation and analysis, so it doesn't demonstrate your analytical thinking. Quoting extensively without explaining what the quotes show leaves readers without a clear link between the evidence and your argument. Citing sources without including quotes misses the textual grounding that helps illustrate your claims. In contrast, paraphrasing for understanding, inserting brief quotes to illustrate a point, and then explaining their relevance provides a clear, well-supported analysis.

Leptospirosis usually shows up as an acute febrile illness with systemic symptoms. The most common clues are a sudden high fever, severe headache, and nausea or vomiting, often accompanied by muscle pains. A rash, on the other hand, is not a typical feature of the usual early presentation. It can appear in some cases or in certain severities, but it's not what clinicians expect as part of the common disease picture. So, among the options, the symptom that does not fit the usual pattern is the rash. If the infection progresses to Weil's disease, other signs like jaundice and kidney dysfunction may appear, but the hallmark early signs remain fever, headache, and vomiting.

In the postpartum period, a rise in white blood cells—leukocytosis—is a normal response to the stress of labor and delivery. This inflammatory and stress reaction commonly pushes the WBC count above the nonpregnant reference range, often into the teens or even higher, without signaling infection. A value around 16,000 cells per cubic millimeter fits this typical postpartum pattern, so it's the best match for what would be expected after delivery. The other values shown can fall within normal limits or reflect the general tolerance of blood counts after blood loss but do not specifically illustrate the postpartum change. Hematocrit around 39% and hemoglobin about 15 g/dL are commonly within normal ranges for many adults, and a red blood cell count near 4 million/mm³ also can be normal. In short, leukocytosis is the hallmark postpartum finding among these options. If the WBC were significantly higher, or if fever and other symptoms were present, that would warrant evaluation for infection or other complications.

First, restating the thesis in light of what the essay has shown signals that the argument has been integrated rather than simply repeated. It reframes the central claim to reflect the journey the essay took with the evidence. Next, a concise recap of the key points reminds the reader how each part of the argument built toward that claim, reinforcing how the pieces fit together. Finally, reflecting on broader implications or themes extends the discussion to real-world relevance, connections to bigger questions, or potential future directions. This combination produces a thoughtful, unified ending rather than a simple final statement. Dramatic quotes can feel flashy or distracting if they overshadow the synthesis. Introducing new, unsubstantiated ideas at the end can undermine credibility because the closing should consolidate what's already been established. A bibliography at the closing sentence isn't a closing thought at all; it's a reference list, and the essay's last sentence should deliver the synthesis and reflection instead.

It also strengthens your argument by allowing you to refine your reasoning and address potential objections with solid data, analysis, or examples. So the best approach is to acknowledge alternatives and address them with evidence to reinforce the main claim. Undermining the main argument and should be avoided, optional, and merely summarizing without engagement aren't how high-quality essays typically handle opposing viewpoints.

In contrast, focusing on a single quote is close reading of one moment, not synthesis; summarizing without analysis is just restating the plot, not building an interpretive claim; listing facts about the author brings in external context and doesn't advance a cohesive reading of the text itself.
