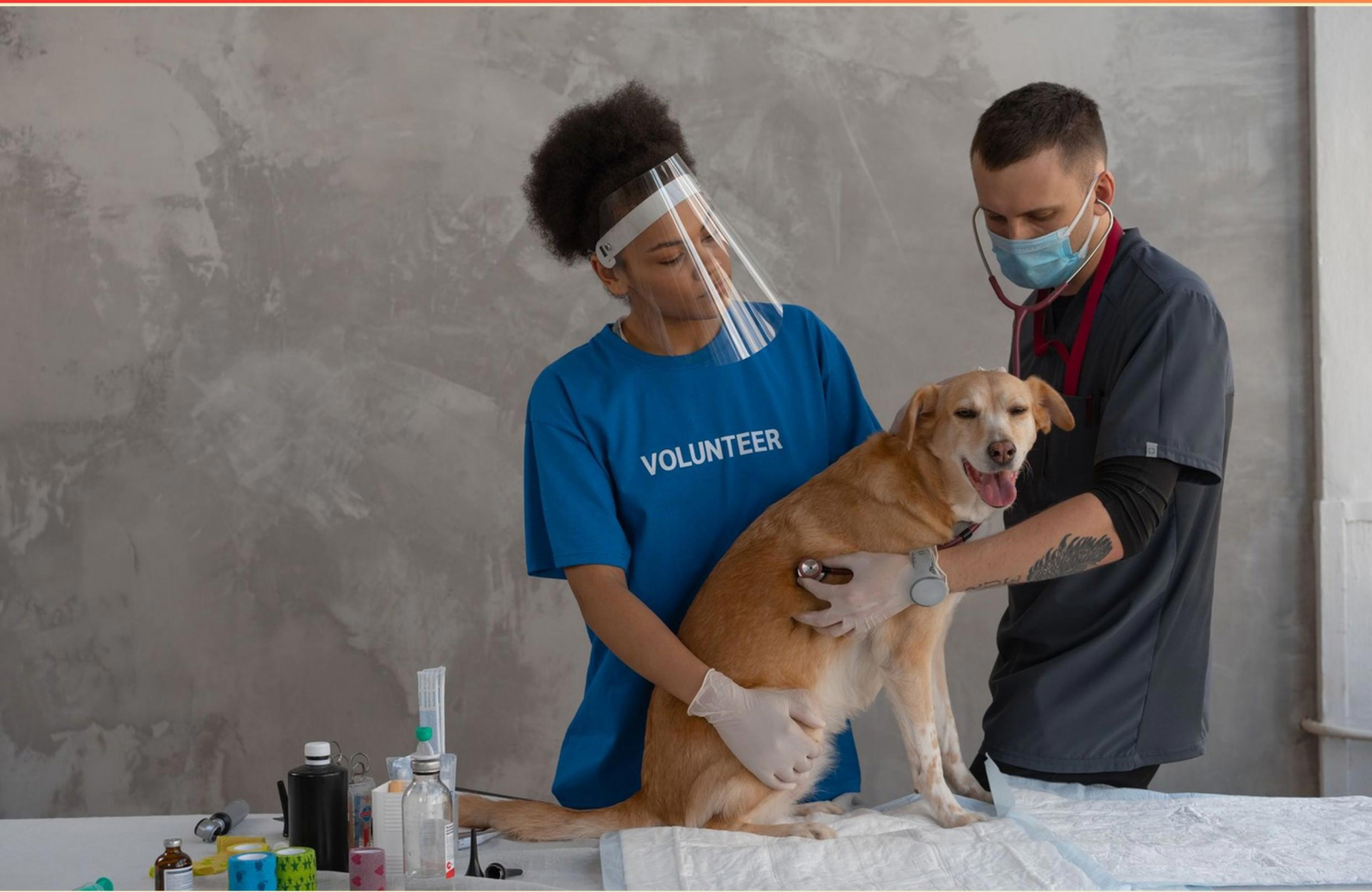

Lastly, minimizing client communication undermines the veterinarian-client relationship, crucial for effective healthcare delivery and ensuring that pet owners are informed partners in their pets' health management.

Normal growth is not a condition but rather a state of development that would not be affected in a straightforward way by obesity, as excessive weight can actually hinder proper growth and health in pets.
