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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which hero of the Trojan War is credited with inventing the Trojan Horse?**

It tests understanding of a famous instance of clever planning in myth. Odysseus is celebrated for his wits, and he came up with the idea of the Trojan Horse—a seemingly innocent wooden horse left by the Greeks and claimed to be an offering to the gods. The plan hinges on deception and timing: the Greeks pretend to sail away, and the Trojans, believing the Greeks have departed and the horse is an omen of victory, bring it inside their walls. At night, the hidden Greek soldiers emerge, open the gates for their comrades, and Troy is overtaken. The other names are notable for different roles in the story—one is a Trojan prince who fights bravely, another a prince who helped spark the war, and another a legendary Greek hero whose presence affected battles—yet none are linked to inventing this famous ruse.

The other authors listed wrote different famous works—Mary Shelley produced Frankenstein, Bram Stoker wrote Dracula, and Maurice Sendak authored children's books like Where the Wild Things Are—so they are not connected to Holden Caulfield.

The other names listed are well-known authors associated with different works—George Orwell with dystopian novels like 1984 and Animal Farm, Mary Shelley with Frankenstein, and Robert Louis Stevenson with classics such as Treasure Island. So the author of the Harry Potter series is J.K. Rowling.

A country's capital is the city where the national government is based and where Parliament sits. In New Zealand, that city is Wellington. Wellington was chosen in the 19th century to be the capital because of its favorable harbor, accessibility, and a location that sits toward the middle of the two main islands. Auckland is the largest city, while Christchurch and Hamilton are major cities in the South and North Islands, respectively, but none of them is the seat of government.

## 7. Who wrote the novel *Hunt for Red October*?

Identifying who wrote a well-known novel often comes down to recognizing the author's distinctive style and the historical context of the work. *Hunt for Red October*, published in 1984, was written by Tom Clancy. Those qualities—precise technical grounding, suspense, and a focus on military and geopolitical dynamics—make Tom Clancy the author most closely associated with this novel. The other names are known for music or different genres, not for this literary work.

Aphrodite is the goddess of beauty and love who is famously said to have arisen from sea foam. While some later sources present her as the daughter of Zeus and Dione, the sea-foam origin is the iconic tale that best links her to beauty and love in Greek myth. Athena is associated with wisdom and strategic war, Artemis with the hunt and the moon, and Demeter with agriculture. Those roles don't match the specific description of beauty and love tied to a birth from sea foam, which is why Aphrodite is the right fit.

The mood, theme, and twist align with Jacobs's style, helping to place the work in his portfolio rather than those of other authors listed. O. Henry is famous for clever, ironic endings in American fiction; Nathaniel Hawthorne wrote Puritan-era allegories, and Stephen Vincent Benét produced American epics and war literature. Keeping in mind the author's distinctive voice and period makes it clear who wrote this piece.

In Greek myth, after overthrowing Cronus, Zeus and his brothers divided the realms: Zeus would oversee the sky, Poseidon the sea, and Hades the underworld. That division helps explain why Poseidon rules the ocean and Hades the realm of the dead, while Hera remains the queen of the gods and goddess of marriage. So the best answer reflects Zeus's position as king of the gods and lord of the sky.**
