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Explanations

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1. After his restoration, for how many years did Job live?

- A. 120 years
- B. 140 years**
- C. 100 years
- D. 80 years

The question focuses on how long Job lived after his restoration. The Bible states that after God restored him, Job lived 140 years, seeing his sons, grandsons, and four generations. This detail—"after this, Job lived 140 years"—is the explicit timeframe given for the post-restoration period, and it emphasizes the long blessing he experienced after his trials. The other numbers don't correspond to the post-restoration lifespan described in the text, so 140 years is the best answer.

2. How many books make up the Pentateuch?

- A. 4
- B. 6
- C. 5**
- D. 7

The Pentateuch is a five-book collection. The name itself comes from Greek: pente means five and teuchos means book or scroll, signaling that it comprises five separate books. Those five are Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy, and together they form the Torah in Jewish tradition—the foundational narrative and law for the Bible. That's why the correct answer is five. The other numbers don't fit the standard scheme: four would miss one book, six would extend beyond the traditional Pentateuch (some traditions call a six-book set the Hexateuch by including Joshua), and seven isn't the traditional count for these early writings.

3. In 1 Corinthians 10:20, idols are described as what?

- A. False Gods
- B. Demons**

At the heart of this verse is the reality Paul presents: idols are not mere images; behind them stand spiritual beings—demons. Paul explains that what the Gentiles sacrifice to idols is offered to demons, not to the one true God. This shows that participating in idol worship links a person to demonic influence, not to God. Because of that spiritual danger, the text identifies idols specifically with demons, emphasizing why believers should avoid any connection to idolatry. The other possibilities don't capture the explicit identification Paul makes in this context, where the real force behind idolatry is described as demons.

4. Which apostle was designated to carry the Lord's name before the Gentiles and kings?

The key idea here is recognizing the unique assignment given to Paul to proclaim the Lord's name beyond Israel. In Acts 9:15–16, the Lord tells Ananias that Paul is a chosen vessel to bear His name before the Gentiles, and kings, as well as the children of Israel. This sets Paul apart from the other apostles, whose work was primarily centered on the Jewish people and the early church in Jerusalem. Paul's ministry consistently shows him taking the gospel to non-Jewish nations and to rulers, a theme reinforced as he stands before governors and kings in subsequent events and in his letters. That specific commission is what identifies Paul as the one designated to carry the Lord's name before the Gentiles and kings.

5. How many people were saved from the flood, in the days of Noah?

- A. Six

Eight people were saved from the flood. The account says Noah, his wife, and his three sons (Shem, Ham, and Japheth) went into the ark with the wives of the three sons. That totals Noah and his wife (two) plus the three sons (three) plus their three wives (three), which equals eight.

6. What does the wine symbolize?

- A. The body of the Lord
- B. The blood of the Lord**

- D. The new covenant

The wine symbolizes the blood of the Lord. In the institution of the Lord's Supper, Jesus says, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood" (see Luke 22:20 and parallels in Matthew 26:28 and Mark 14:24). That statement ties the cup to his sacrificial shed blood, which makes forgiveness possible and ratifies a new covenant relationship with God. So the act of drinking the wine points to Jesus' blood poured out for many, not to his body, the Holy Spirit, or the covenant itself as a separate symbol. The bread represents his body, while the wine uniquely communicates the blood shed for redemption and the establishment of the new covenant.

7. What date did the Apostle Naason receive his calling?

- A. Sunday, December 8, 2014

Understanding this item hinges on matching the event to a specific date in the timeline. The material places Naason's calling on a Monday in December 2014. Checking the calendar shows that December 8, 2014 was a Monday, while the other given dates fall on different weekdays (December 7 was Sunday, December 9 was Tuesday). Since the source specifies a Monday for the calling, the date is Monday, December 8, 2014.

8. What is the punishment for idolaters according to Revelation 21:8?

The key idea here is the final judgment described for idolaters in Revelation 21:8. In that verse, idolaters are marked for the lake of fire, a vivid image of eternal punishment, also called the second death. The phrase "the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone" is Revelation's way of signaling irreversible, eternal separation from God. This isn't about exile or mere darkness in this context; the imagery conveys complete and permanent judgment. So the punishment for idolaters, as described, is the lake of fire—the second death.

9. In what condition was the Apostle Samuel born?

- A. Stillborn (With no life)**
- B. Alive and healthy
- C. Premature birth but viable
- D. Born with life

The main idea here is that Samuel was born alive and grew up to serve God, not stillborn. The biblical account tells how Hannah prayed for a son, God answered, and she bore a son she named Samuel because she asked the Lord for him. After Samuel was weaned, she brought him to the house of the Lord at Shiloh, and he served there under Eli. This sequence shows a normal, living birth and a growing life, rather than a stillbirth. So the birth condition described in the text is that Samuel was born with life and lived to fulfill his calling as a prophet.

10. Who prepared the ark by faith when warned by God?

A. Noah

B. Abraham

C. Moses

D. Daniel

This question centers on faith expressed through obedience to God's guidance. Noah is the one who prepared the ark in response to God's warning about a coming flood, demonstrating trust by acting exactly as God commanded. In Genesis, Noah is described as a righteous man who found favor with God, and Hebrews 11:7 emphasizes that by faith he prepared the ark, even though the events were unseen, saving his household. This shows faith as active trust—believing God's word and then doing what He asks, even when the task seems improbable. The other figures—Abraham, Moses, and Daniel—are famed for different acts of faith in their own stories and aren't linked to building an ark. Noah's faithful obedience is the key reason this answer fits.
