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Explanations

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1. It is illegal to drive if your Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) is...

- A. .08 or greater
- B. .10 or greater
- C. .05 or greater
- D. .00

A driver's legal limit is set because alcohol impairs the abilities needed to operate a vehicle. The widely used per se limit is 0.08% BAC; at or above this level, reaction time slows, coordination suffers, and judgment is impaired, making driving legally unsafe and unlawful in many places. That's why 0.08% BAC is the threshold you should know. 0.10% is simply a higher level of impairment and would also be illegal, but the standard threshold most often tested is 0.08%. A BAC of 0.05% is below the common legal limit in many jurisdictions (though impairment can occur earlier for some people), so it isn't the typical cutoff. A BAC of 0.00% means no alcohol is in the blood, which is legal to drive.

2. This round red circle with a cross mark on the arrow warns that...

- A. Must not make a right turn at the sign
- B. Must not make a left turn
- C. Right turn allowed
- D. U-turn prohibited

Prohibition signs use a red circle to show something isn't allowed. When the action is a turn, the arrow shows which direction is affected, and a cross over that arrow marks the ban. Here, the right-turn arrow has a cross, so turning right at that sign is not allowed. You should either go straight or, if permitted by other signs or rules, turn left. If it were a left-turn ban, the cross would be on the left-turn arrow; if right turn were allowed, there wouldn't be a cross; a No U-turn sign would show a U-turn symbol with a cross.

3. When following a large vehicle with limited visibility, what should you do?

- A. Tailgate to see around
- B. Stay back to increase view and reaction time

When you're behind a large vehicle with limited visibility, the priority is to increase your following distance. Large trucks and buses have big blind spots and can't see well to the sides or directly behind them. If you're too close, you may not be seen and you won't have enough time to react if they brake suddenly, stall, or encounter a hazard. By staying back, you gain a clearer view of the road ahead, you can see brake lights and signals sooner, and you have more time to react, which reduces the chance of a rear-end collision. In practice, give yourself extra space—often a four-second or greater separation is wise, especially in rain, fog, or at higher speeds. If you can't see the truck driver's face in their side mirrors, you're likely in a blind spot and should wait to pass or adjust your position. Other choices would put you closer to the vehicle, keeping you in its blind spots or reducing your time to react, and stopping in intersections can block traffic and create danger for everyone.

4. If a driver behind you repeatedly flashes his/her headlights, you should

When someone behind you flashes their headlights, it's a cue that you're holding up faster traffic. The safest move is to get out of the way by signaling and moving to the right or pulling over when it's safe so they can pass. This reduces the risk of a tailgating crash and keeps traffic flowing smoothly. Avoid speeding up or braking abruptly to "test" the signal; those actions can create a dangerous situation and won't help the situation.

5. This route marker sign indicates...

- A. Turn Right to Go West on Route 22.**
- B. Turn Left to Go North on Route 22.
- C. Continue Straight on Route 22.
- D. Route 22 Ends Here.

Reading route markers is about matching the route number with the direction and following the arrow that shows how to reach that direction. In this sign, you see Route 22 with West and an arrow pointing to the right. That combination tells you that to head west on Route 22 you must turn right now. The number identifies the highway, the word West shows the direction along that highway, and the arrow indicates the exact turn to take to join the westbound route. If you went left, you'd be heading onto a different direction or road; going straight would leave Route 22 entirely at this point; and a sign saying the route ends would look different, signaling an end rather than the continuation of Route 22 West.

6. What is the proper response to a flashing yellow signal at an intersection?

- A. Stop immediately
- B. Speed up
- C. Proceed with caution**

A flashing yellow signal means you should slow down and proceed with caution. It's a warning to be alert for potential hazards or changes in traffic, and you should yield to any vehicles or pedestrians already in or approaching the intersection. Treat it like a yield situation: you don't have an automatic right of way, but you can continue through if the way is clear and you can do so safely. Stop only if required by other signs or if traffic or pedestrians make it unsafe to proceed. So, proceed with caution rather than stopping immediately or speeding up; turning around isn't appropriate just because the light is flashing yellow.

7. Where will you typically see a no-passing zone sign on a two-lane or two-way road?

- A. On the right side of the road
- B. At intersection signs
- C. In the center median
- D. On the left side of the road**

A no-passing zone sign is used to warn drivers that passing is not allowed ahead because visibility or road conditions make it unsafe. On a two-lane, two-way road, this warning is placed on the left side of the road so it's clearly visible to drivers approaching from that direction. Seeing the sign in time helps you stay in your lane and refrain from trying to pass, which is exactly what the rule requires in that stretch. The other placements don't reliably reach all approaching drivers or aren't standard for this warning.

8. Which of the following is NOT true regarding pavement markings?

- A. Crossing double solid yellow lines to make a left turn to/from an alley is not against the traffic law.

Pavement markings tell you where lane changes and passes are allowed. Double solid lines are restrictions: you should not cross a double solid line to change lanes or pass. A double solid white line specifically means you must stay in your lane on a highway. That's why the statement about crossing a double solid white line being allowed is not true. By contrast, broken white lines indicate you may change lanes when it's safe, broken yellow lines mean opposing traffic and the option to pass when safe, and crossing a double yellow line to turn left into a driveway or alley is typically allowed if safe.

9. Passing on the right is permitted in all of the following situations, EXCEPT:

- A. On a road with two or more lanes traveling in the same direction
- B. When the vehicle ahead is turning left and there is a clear lane on the right
- C. When the lane to the right is open and clear

Passing on the right is allowed only when there's a safe, designated space to do so. On roads with two or more lanes in the same direction, a vehicle can move into the right-hand lane to pass if that lane is open and it's safe to do so. If the vehicle ahead is turning left and there's a clear lane on the right, you may pass on that right side to avoid being blocked by the turn, as long as you're in a legal passing area and maintain safety. If the lane to the right is open and clear, that same space can be used to pass. But on a single-lane road where traffic moves in both directions, there isn't a separate right-side lane to use for passing. Trying to pass in such a situation would require driving into the opposite lane or onto the shoulder, which is unsafe and typically illegal.

10. This diamond-shaped sign indicates that...

- A. Yield ahead
- B. School crossing
- C. A farm equipment vehicle is passing on the road

Diamond-shaped signs warn you of hazards or changes ahead. The sign showing a tractor alerts you that farm equipment may be using or crossing the road, so you should slow down, stay alert, and be prepared to stop if a tractor enters or is on the road. This isn't indicating a yield situation or a school or pedestrian crossing, which are shown with different symbols or shapes. The tractor symbol specifically means you'll likely encounter slow-moving farm vehicles, so give them extra space and proceed cautiously.
