The correct answer is 27 because, prior to the United Kingdom's exit from the European Union, there were 28 member states. After Brexit, which officially occurred on January 31, 2020, the number of EU member states decreased by one, resulting in a total of 27 countries remaining in the Union. Each of these countries continues to participate in EU governance and decision-making, alongside the various policies and regulations that govern the EU as a whole. This reflects the current structure of the EU, reinforcing the significance of membership for political, economic, and social collaboration among European nations.

10. Which city will host the Summer Olympics in 2024?

Paris is set to host the Summer Olympics in 2024. This decision was made during the 130th International Olympic Committee (IOC) Session held in July 2017, when Paris was awarded the Games after a competitive bidding process. The 2024 Olympics will mark the third time Paris has hosted the Summer Olympics, having previously held them in 1900 and 1924. The event is significant not only for its historical context but also for its intent to embrace sustainability and innovation, as evidenced by the city's plans for eco-friendly facilities and infrastructure improvements designed to benefit the local community both during and after the Games. In contrast to Paris, Tokyo hosted the Summer Olympics in 2021, London in 2012, and Rio de Janeiro in 2016, making them past hosts rather than upcoming ones. This highlights the importance of understanding the scheduling of future Olympic events as part of international sports awareness.
