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Explanations

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1. In what scenario would a Border Patrol Agent conduct a "warrantless search"?

Warrant requirements and general legal standards typically apply in those scenarios, emphasizing the unique nature of exigent circumstances that allow for immediate action without a warrant.

For instance, the notion of being convicted of murder is not a requirement for all felonies, since there are various types of felonies beyond homicide. Similarly, the principle of being innocent until proven guilty pertains to the presumption of innocence prior to a legal determination of guilt, highlighting that guilt must be established in court through due process. Thus, while a person is indeed presumed innocent until proven guilty, once they are determined guilty of any felony, it impacts how future legal situations might be handled.

This reflects an understanding of the logical implications of the premise provided.
