It also keeps the process collaborative and professional, reducing barriers to access and maintaining dignity. The other approaches fall short because they assume needs without asking, relocate the passenger to a less accessible area, or refuse accommodations altogether. Each of those undermines independence, safety, and legal or policy obligations.

This readiness reduces last-minute holds, streamlines boarding, and helps ensure the aircraft pushes back on time. Waiting until after boarding to address issues introduces bottlenecks and surprises that ripple into departure slips. Focusing only on safety while ignoring guest needs misses opportunities to prepare guests and positions the crew for delays. Delaying announcements creates uncertainty and slows guests' ability to comply with timing cues, which again harms on-time performance. Together, proactive preparation and clear, timely guidance during boarding embody service that supports timely departures by preventing problems before they arise and keeping the process moving efficiently.
