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## **Explanations**

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## 1. What is ethos?

*Ethos is the appeal to credibility and character that persuades by emphasizing the speaker's trustworthiness. When a speaker appears knowledgeable, honest, and respectful toward the audience—demonstrating expertise, fair discussion, and goodwill—the audience is more likely to accept the message because they feel they can rely on the speaker. This contrasts with pathos, which aims to stir emotions to persuade, and logos, which relies on logical reasoning and evidence. So the description that centers on credibility and ethics best captures what ethos is, since it shows why the audience should trust the speaker.*

When colors, fonts, logos, and messaging are applied the same way every time, there's less confusion for customers and a stronger, cohesive identity that protects the brand from off-brand variations. While there can be some upfront work to set the standards, the payoff is easier production, fewer errors, and a clear, trusted image that supports recognition and loyalty. Choosing options that claim higher costs, reduced trust, or confusion misses the benefits that come from a consistent, well-managed brand presence.*

*TLQ stands for Transition, lead-in, quote. When you embed evidence, use a transition to connect the point you're making to the source, showing how the evidence supports your argument. A lead-in provides context—who is speaking, where the quote comes from, and why it matters—so readers understand the relevance. Then you present the actual quote itself, integrated smoothly with proper punctuation. This pattern keeps your writing clear and cohesive, guiding the reader from your idea to the evidence and back to your analysis. Terms like time or quotient don't describe this embedding technique, so TLQ is the standard way to remember the process.*

*Anaphora is the repetition of a word or phrase at the beginning of successive clauses or sentences. In the line "We shall go on to the end, we shall fight in France," the phrase "We shall" is repeated at the start of each clause, creating a rhythmic emphasis and unity across the sentences. That concrete, repeated opening is exactly what anaphora looks like in practice, making it a clear example. The other options describe the idea or a related device (like parallelism) but don't show the actual repeated opening in a single instance, whereas the quoted line does.*

*The tension between physical fatigue and mental restlessness is what drives Sonnet 27. This contrast—the body's urge for rest versus the mind's persistent activity and longing—creates the poem's central tension and mood. The other options don't capture this poem's main push, which centers on bodily exhaustion contrasted with inner, restless thought, rather than youth versus age, wealth versus poverty, or light versus darkness.*

#### 6. What best describes a foil in drama?

*A foil in drama is a character whose primary purpose is to illuminate another character's traits by contrast. By placing two characters with opposite or very different qualities beside each other, the audience sees those qualities more clearly and understands the main character's values, decisions, and weaknesses better. A common pattern is pairing a bold, impulsive character with a calm, cautious foil, which makes the hero's actions and motives stand out. For example, Mercutio's witty, irreverent energy contrasts with Romeo's earnest romantic seriousness, highlighting Romeo's traits more vividly. That's why the best description is a character who contrasts with another character. The other roles may appear in drama, but they don't define the foil's purpose of creating that pointed contrast.*

Subject-verb agreement means the verb must match the subject in number. If the subject is singular, the verb is singular; if the subject is plural, the verb is plural. In present simple usage, this often shows up as adding -s for third-person singular subjects (he walks, she runs) while other subjects pair with the base verb (I walk, you walk, they run). The core idea is that the form of the verb depends on the number of the subject, not on other words around it or on the noun alone. This is why the rule is stated as the subject and verb must always agree in number. The other options misstate how verbs attach to subjects: they're not always plural, they don't simply take an -s for every subject, and nouns by themselves don't automatically determine the verb ending.

In this sonnet, wakefulness shifts from a purely physical constraint to a state sustained by love and memory. The moment of resolution is that love keeps the speaker alert—emotionally and mentally awake—even though his body is exhausted from toil. The beloved's presence in thought acts like a spark that prevents sleep, turning what could be a simple fatigue into an active vigil guided by affection. This best answer fits because the poem shows the speaker resisting sleep not because he factors in reflection alone, but because his devotion or longing maintains his attention. It isn't external circumstances that determine his wakefulness; it's the internal force of love and memory.

## 9. How many quatrains and couplets are in a Shakespearean sonnet?

- A. 1 quatrain and 3 couplets
- B. 3 quatrains and 1 couplet**

A Shakespearean sonnet is built from three four-line sections (quatrains) plus one concluding two-line section (couplet), totaling fourteen lines. Each quatrain develops the theme or images, and the final couplet delivers a resolution or twist. This structure is reinforced by the typical rhyme pattern ABAB CDCD EFEF GG, which clearly delineates the three quatrains and the closing couplet.

**10. FIFO stands for First In, First Out. How is it applied in stock management?**

*FIFO means using items in the order they arrived, so the oldest stock is used first. In stock management this is put into practice by rotating stock on shelves and in storage so items with the earliest arrival or earliest expiry are picked and shipped before newer stock. This helps prevent spoilage and obsolescence, which is especially important for perishables or goods with a limited shelf life. To put it into action, you organize displays and storage to front-load older items, label dates clearly, and train staff to pick items by the oldest date. The other options don't capture that ordered use of stock—the terms there describe different ideas or goals rather than the practice of moving oldest stock first.*
