The solar system is a collection of planets and celestial bodies that orbit our Sun, limited to that particular region of space. The cosmos is often used interchangeably with the universe, but it can sometimes be more philosophical in context, leading to potential ambiguity about the exact scope it references. In contrast, the universe is a precise term that clearly encapsulates everything.
