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Explanations

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1. Parking within how many feet of a fire hydrant is prohibited?

- A. 10 ft
- B. 15 ft**
- C. 20 ft
- D. 30 ft

The key idea is keeping fire hydrants clear so firefighters can access them quickly. In California, you must not park within fifteen feet of a fire hydrant. The distance is measured from the hydrant to the nearest part of your vehicle. This buffer allows hoses to reach the hydrant and room for firefighters to work without obstruction, which can be critical in an emergency. Parking closer would block access and slow response, while parking farther away is still compliant but not necessary for safety.

2. Should you always drive slower than other traffic?

- A. No, you can block traffic when you drive too slowly.**
- B. Yes, you should always drive slower than other traffic.
- C. Only in school zones.
- D. It depends on weather conditions.

Driving at a speed that fits the flow of traffic is key to safety and smooth road use. You shouldn't assume you must always drive slower than everyone else; doing so can block lanes, surprise other drivers, and raise the risk of crashes. The safer approach is to adjust your speed to road and weather conditions and to match the surrounding traffic when it's safe to do so. If you're going slower than others, stay in the right lane and let faster vehicles pass when it's safe, and only move left to pass when it's appropriate. Weather or school zones can require adjustments, but the overall rule is not to impede traffic by driving unnecessarily slow.

3. A white painted curb means:

Curb color shows when you can stop and why you're stopping. A white painted curb means you may stop briefly to load or unload, but only for passengers or mail. You should not park there or leave the vehicle unattended—stop just long enough to drop off or pick up and then pull away. So this is why the statement about a white curb fits: it's a designated loading zone for passengers or mail only, not a general parking spot or a bus stop, and not a long-term parking area. The other scenarios describe conditions that aren't allowed or aren't the purpose of a white curb.

4. What action is described as cutting the corner when turning left?

- A. Turning the steering wheel too soon and entering the lane of oncoming vehicles.

Cutting the corner means taking a turn that moves you toward the center of the road or into a left-turn lane in an attempt to shorten the turn. This puts you into a space that isn't meant for you and can bring you into the path of oncoming traffic or vehicles making their own turns. The correct approach is to stay in your lane and complete the turn smoothly, using the appropriate lane as you exit. Driving close to the center divider or into the left-turn lane while turning left describes that unsafe shortcut, which is why this choice is the best answer. Signaling ahead of the turn and staying in your lane are good practices, but they don't describe the action of cutting the corner itself.

5. You may cross a double yellow line to pass if your side is broken.

- A. Your side is a solid line.
- B. Your side is a broken line.**
- C. Both sides are dashed lines.
- D. You may never cross.

You may pass across a double yellow line only when the line on your side is broken. This broken line means you're allowed to cross into the oncoming lane to complete a pass, but only if it's safe to do so. If your side is a solid line, you may not pass at all. If both sides are dashed, passing is allowed when safe, but the key requirement is that your own line must be broken to start the maneuver. Always ensure there's enough clear distance and visibility, and avoid passes near curves, hills, intersections, or other hazards.

6. On a one-way street, you may turn left onto another one-way street only if:

- A. Traffic on the street moves to the right.
- B. Traffic on the street moves to the left.**
- C. You have the right of way.

On a one-way street, you can turn left onto another one-way street only if the street you're entering has traffic moving to the left. This keeps your turn in the same direction as the flow of traffic and avoids driving into vehicles coming toward you from the other direction. If the destination street's traffic moves to the right, turning left would put you into oncoming traffic, which is unsafe and not allowed. A green arrow can provide a protected turn, but it's not required; the essential rule is matching the traffic flow on the street you're entering.

7. Which statement about nighttime headlight use is correct?

- A. Dim to low beams within 300 feet of an oncoming vehicle

When driving at night, you should switch from high beams to low beams whenever an oncoming vehicle is in your headlights' path at a distance where your high beams could dazzle them. This keeps the other driver from being blinded while still giving you enough light to see the road ahead. This rule matches the standard safety practice: dim to low beams before your headlights would shine directly into the oncoming driver's eyes. Dimming earlier than necessary reduces your own visibility without extra safety benefit, while dimming too late can cause glare for the other driver. The other distance descriptions don't align with this balance of protecting the other driver and maintaining adequate visibility for you.

8. You are about to make a left turn. You must signal continuously during the last ____ feet before the turn.

- A. 150 feet
- B. 100 feet**
- C. 50 feet
- D. 200 feet

The key idea is giving other drivers enough warning before you turn. In California, you should signal continuously for at least 100 feet before turning or changing lanes. That 100-foot cue gives following drivers time to see your intent, slow down if needed, and adjust to your movement. Keep the signal on right up to and through the turn so your intention is clear. Distances like 150 or 200 feet would be longer than required the warning can be misleading, and 50 feet doesn't give others enough time to react. The correct distance is 100 feet.

9. You might change lanes when:

- A. Moving from one lane to another.**
- B. Entering the freeway from an on-ramp.
- C. Exiting the freeway.
- D. Entering the road from a curb or shoulder

Changing lanes means moving your vehicle from one lane to another while you're still on the same road. You do this to pass slower traffic, set up for a turn, or position yourself for a safer or smoother flow of traffic ahead. The scenario described fits because it's about shifting from one lane to another, which is exactly what a lane change is. Entering the freeway from an on-ramp is merging into traffic, not simply switching lanes; exiting the freeway or entering a road from a curb or shoulder involves different maneuvers, not the act of changing lanes on the same roadway.

10. When you call for emergency roadside assistance, what should you do while waiting for help?

A. Stay in your vehicle until help arrives.

B. Stand behind your vehicle in the traffic lane.

C. Leave the scene immediately.

D. Jump a curb.

Stay inside your car with your seat belt fastened and your hazard lights on. This keeps you protected from passing traffic and makes you visible to help you've called, so you're safer while you wait. If you must move, do so only to get to safety away from the roadway, but otherwise stay put until assistance arrives. Standing behind the vehicle in traffic, leaving the scene, or jumping a curb all create serious hazards and should be avoided.
