Treatment with Flagyl/Spartrix helps to eliminate the protozoan infection, thereby alleviating the symptoms and preventing further complications associated with frounce. While Aspergillosis is caused by a fungal infection, coccidiosis involves a different type of protozoan, and lead poisoning is a toxic condition that does not respond to antimicrobial treatment. Therefore, Flagyl/Spartrix is specifically indicated for the treatment of frounce, making it the most appropriate answer in this scenario.
