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Explanations

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1. Which of the following is considered a clinical contact surface when using traditional radiographic procedures?

- A. Patient dental records
- B. X-ray control panel**
- C. Floor beneath the dental chair

A Patient dental records are not considered a clinical contact surface when using traditional radiographic procedures because they are not directly in contact with the patient's mouth or body during the procedure. C: The floor beneath the dental chair is not considered a clinical contact surface as it is not directly involved in the radiographic process and is not in contact with the patient or equipment. The legal framework governing dental procedures stipulates that such responsibilities must be performed by individuals who have received the appropriate certification and training for extended functions in dentistry. While a dentist can certainly perform this task, and in some cases, a dental assistant may assist with procedures related to temporary crowns, the RDAEF is the only classification among the choices provided that has the legal capability to independently cement permanent restorations. Other professionals like the hygienist do not have the scope of practice necessary to perform this task on their own.

7. The end of the HVE tip should be positioned _____ the occlusal surface of the tooth being prepared.

- A. Directly on
- B. Slightly beyond**

The end of the HVE tip should be positioned slightly beyond the occlusal surface of the tooth being prepared in order to effectively remove debris and maintain good suction. Directly on, or at a considerable distance from, the occlusal surface would not be as effective and may lead to debris and saliva remaining in the mouth. Far above would not allow for effective suctioning and could potentially injure the patient's soft tissues.

8. Through what surface of the posterior tooth is the dentist likely to enter with a rotary bur for root canal therapy?

- A. Buccal
- B. Lingual
- C. Occlusal**
- D. Distal

The dentist is likely to enter through the occlusal surface of the posterior tooth with a rotary bur. This is because the occlusal surface is the top surface of the tooth that comes into contact with the opposing tooth during chewing, and root canal therapy requires access to the root canal which is located deep within the tooth. The other options, such as the buccal, lingual, and distal surfaces, do not provide adequate access to the root canal as they are either located on the cheek, tongue, or side of the tooth respectively. A Partial is a type of removable denture that replaces multiple missing teeth but not all of them. It is often used when natural teeth are still present. A Denture is a removable prosthetic device that replaces all or most of the teeth on one or both of the arches (upper and lower jaw). So while it is a removable prosthesis, it is not specific to replacing only one or several teeth. Overall, a Partial is the most appropriate answer as it specifically refers to a removable prosthesis that replaces several teeth.
