The cuticle, which is the overlapping skin that protects the area between the skin and the nail, has a similar purpose in guarding against infection, but it's not the primary barrier when it comes to the nail matrix itself. The nail plate, formed from hardened cells, is also protective but does not directly contribute to blocking bacteria from the matrix area to the same extent as the nail mantle.
