1. William Lloyd Garrison advocated for what stance on slavery?

*Garrison argued for immediate abolition of slavery. He believed slavery was a moral wrong that must be ended now, not gradually or through political compromises, and he used his abolitionist writings, especially *The Liberator*, to push for emancipation without compensation and for equal rights for Black Americans. He also rejected schemes like colonization and argued that the Constitution and political processes should not be used to justify or preserve slavery, aligning with a push for abolition rather than expansion, compromise, or constitutional protection of slavery.*

2. Which pair of sounds are articulated in the same place and manner?

- A. M/N

Understanding how sounds are described in terms of place and manner helps you see why this pair fits best. The place of articulation tells you where in the mouth the sound is formed, and the manner tells you how the airflow is shaped to make the sound. To be in the same place and have the same manner, both features must match. The pair in question are both bilabial stops: the air is fully blocked by bringing both lips together and then released to produce the sound. They share the same place (bilabial) and the same manner (stop/plosive). The only difference is voicing—one is voiceless, the other voiced—which does not affect place or manner, so they satisfy the condition. The other pairs don't fit as well: one pair are both nasal sounds but are produced with different places (one at the lips, the other at the alveolar ridge). Another pair combines a stop with a fricative, which means both manner and place differ. The last pair are both stops but at different places (alveolar vs velar), so the place isn't the same. So the pair that is articulated in the same place and manner is the one formed with both lips as a stop, regardless of voicing.

In Mesoamerica, the diet rested on maize paired with squash and beans. Maize provided most of the calories and became central to food preparation, while squash offered essential nutrients and the beans added protein; together they formed a complementary trio. Farmers often grew them together in milpa systems, sometimes called the three sisters, where maize supports climbing beans, beans enrich the soil with nitrogen, and squash covers the ground to retain moisture and deter weeds. The other crops listed come from regions outside Mesoamerica or from later introductions: rice, wheat, and barley are Old World staples; potatoes and quinoa are Andean; sorghum, millet, and teff are common in Africa and parts of Asia.

An index is designed for quick lookups. It lists topics and subtopics in alphabetical order and shows the pages where they appear, often with cross references. This lets you jump straight to the exact information you want without scanning the whole text. A table of contents maps the book's structure in order of appearance, pointing you to chapters and sections rather than every topic by name. A glossary focuses on definitions of terms, usually in alphabetical order, but its purpose is to define terms, not guide you to where they're discussed in the book. A bibliography lists sources used, not content locations within the work. So for finding specific information by topic in alphabetical order, the index is the go-to feature.

The idea being tested is understanding how textbooks help you find information efficiently. An index is an alphabetical list of topics and names, each with page references, designed to take you directly to where that topic is discussed across the whole book. That cross-referencing function—quickly locating exact places in the text—is what makes an index a primary navigational tool. Among the options, the index best matches that role. The table of contents points you to the chapters and sections in order, which helps you gauge the book's structure but isn't as useful for locating a specific topic scattered throughout chapters. The glossary provides definitions of terms, useful for understanding vocabulary but not for locating discussions across the book. The appendix collects supplementary material and isn't a general navigation aid to the main content. So the section that serves the same navigational purpose as an index is the index itself, because it's built for precise, topic-wide retrieval of information. For example, you can look up a topic like photosynthesis and jump to every page where it's discussed, rather than scanning chapters one by one.

In ancient Greek democracy, power was exercised through three main bodies that worked together. The Assembly was the large gathering where male citizens could vote directly on laws and policies. The Council, a smaller group of citizens chosen by lot, prepared the daily work of government, proposed laws, and set the agenda for the Assembly. The courts or judicial assemblies (the courts of jurors) handled legal cases and disputes, enforcing laws and delivering verdicts. This trio—citizen assembly, governing council, and the citizen juries in the courts—embodied the democratic system described. It contrasts with monarchies, where a king rules; theocracies, where religious leaders govern; and autocracies, where a single ruler holds all power.

7. Amy Lowell is known for employing which literary device in her portrayal of urban scenes?

Personification is attributing human qualities to nonhuman things. In Amy Lowell's depictions of city life, the urban landscape often feels alive and responsive because streets, buildings, lights, and sounds are described as if they can act, speak, or feel. This approach lets the city itself become a character that breathes, observes, or interacts with people, which deepens the mood and emotional texture of the scene. By giving the city human traits, Lowell invites readers to experience the urban environment with immediacy and intimacy—seeing it as something that can warmly greet you, bustle with activity, or loom with presence. Allegory would use a broader, symbolic narrative with a hidden moral; irony highlights a contrast between appearance and reality; satire aims to critique through humor or ridicule. These devices serve different purposes, whereas personification directly animates the urban setting to convey mood and atmosphere in a vivid, sensory way.

A biographical sketch is a brief, factual portrait of a person, usually written in the third person, that highlights key life events, roles, and achievements and explains the person's significance. It isn't an autobiography, which is written by the person about themselves in the first person. It isn't a news article, whose main purpose is to report events as they happen, though it may include biographical details. It isn't a novel, which is a work of fiction. So the description that matches a biographical sketch is a concise, third-person overview of a person's life and impact.

Using multiple forms of a text engages students by offering different ways to access and interpret the same story, which tends to deepen understanding. A book provides narrative detail, description, and insight into a character's thoughts, while a play highlights dialogue, actions, and the dynamics between characters. When students experience both, they can compare how events are portrayed, infer motives, and analyze themes and tone across formats. This multimodal approach also supports diverse learners—some students connect through reading, others through listening and discussion or even performance. Discussing and possibly acting out scenes boosts engagement and collaboration, making the material more memorable. While planning might take more time, the payoff is clearer comprehension and greater participation, so using a book and a play together is most likely to enhance student learning.

10. During which centuries did Islam spread into northern and western Africa?

The main idea here is how Islam diffused across Africa through a combination of conquest, trade, and cultural exchange, and when that diffusion became established across both northern and western regions. Islam began spreading into northern Africa in the late 600s and into the 7th century, driven by Arab conquests. However, its broader and more sustained spread into western Africa—via trans-Saharan trade routes and the rise of Islamic centers and learning along the Sahel—gathered momentum mainly in the 9th and 10th centuries. By that time, Islamic influence had become well established in northern Africa and was expanding decisively into western Africa, making that period the best fit for when both regions experienced widespread diffusion. The earlier centuries saw initial entry into northern Africa, but not the same level of diffusion into western Africa. The later centuries would come after that key period of establishment.
