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Explanations

The House of Representatives is made up of 435 voting members. This number has been established since the Permanent Apportionment Act of 1929, which set the size of the House at 435 and outlined the procedure for distributing those representatives among the states based on population data collected through the decennial census. The apportionment ensures that each state has a proportional representation relative to its population, with the total number of seats fixed at 435. As populations in some states increase and in others decrease, the distribution of these seats can change after each census, but the total remains constant.
