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Explanations

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1. Which event triggered the Great Depression in Canada?

A. Stock Market Crash of 1929

B. World War II

C. The Klondike Gold Rush

D. The Great Fire of Toronto

The main idea is how a sudden, nationwide financial collapse can trigger a prolonged economic downturn. The event that sparked the Great Depression in Canada was the Stock Market Crash of 1929. When the U.S. stock market crashed, confidence collapsed, and investment dried up. Canada was closely linked to the U.S. economy, so demand for Canadian exports—such as wheat, timber, and minerals—plummeted. Prices for goods fell, credit tightened, and banks failed or restricted lending, leading to widespread unemployment and deflation. The downturn spread across provinces and was intensified by agricultural hardships in the Prairies during the early 1930s. The other events listed do not fit as triggers: World War II began later and eventually helped countries recover; the Klondike Gold Rush occurred decades earlier and did not cause the Depression; the Great Fire of Toronto was a disaster but not a national economic trigger.

2. Which character is described as a woman involved in Karolides' danger?

The question is testing whether you can identify which female character is tied to the danger Karolides faces in the story. In the text, Julia Czechenyi is the woman described as being involved in Karolides' danger—her actions or circumstances connect her directly to the peril he encounters. The other women named do not have that direct link to the peril surrounding Karolides, either because they are not part of that plot thread or their roles don't place him at risk. If you recall the passages where Julia Czechenyi appears, you'll see her involvement with the events that threaten Karolides, which is why she is the correct choice.

3. Who is the protagonist in A Man of Means?

Identifying who drives the story—the protagonist. In A Man of Means, the narrative centers on Roland Bleke, tracing his choices, social maneuvering, and the way his wealth shapes the events and themes of the tale. Muriel, the Coppins Family, and the chess game appear as important elements or supporting figures, but the action and the point of view focus on Roland Bleke. Because the story follows his experiences and growth, he is the character the reader is meant to follow from start to finish.

4. Notification about changes is posted on which channel?

Notifications about changes should reach the right people quickly and leave a clear record. The Medical Staff Changes Email does this best because it delivers the message directly to the inbox of those affected, providing a time-stamped, easily referenceable trail and a straightforward way to confirm receipt or follow up. Other options aren't as reliable for urgent or targeted updates: posting on an HR website assumes everyone will remember to check that site, which can delay awareness; a staff reading requirement describes a policy, not a delivery method, so it doesn't guarantee communication; and a department like research staff issues isn't specifically aimed at medical staff, making it less effective for reaching the intended audience.

5. Which two languages are the official languages of Canada?

Canada's official languages are English and French. This reflects the country's bilingual heritage and is established by the Official Languages Act, which requires federal government services and communications to be available in both languages. Citizens have the right to use either language in federal institutions, and Parliament, the courts, and most federal agencies operate in both. While some provinces have their own language arrangements (for example, New Brunswick is officially bilingual), at the national level the two official languages are English and French. The other languages listed are not official at the federal level.

6. What does CAEC stand for?

The main idea here is recognizing how acronyms are formed: each letter in CAEC maps to a specific word. CAEC stands for Canadian, Adult, Education, Credential. The best choice uses those exact four terms in that order, even though it adds a descriptor "for adult learners" that doesn't change the core expansion. The other options switch one of the key words to a different term (Academic vs. Adult, Certificate vs. Credential, Association vs. Education), which would no longer match the CAEC acronym.

7. Which item corresponds to status updates about changes?

Tracking updates as changes move through a process relies on a label that clearly shows both what changed and the current state of that change. The item that includes "Status" together with "Changes" signals that this entry is specifically about the ongoing updates and where the change stands—whether it's being discussed, reviewed, approved, implemented, or closed. That clarity helps everyone stay aligned and know what to expect next. Choosing an item about medical staff changes email would be about communicating changes, but not the ongoing status of those changes. A staff reading requirement is about training or compliance, not change progress. Symptoms of hypoglycemia addresses a medical condition, not change tracking. So the label that focuses on status updates about changes is the best fit.

8. What marks a pivotal moment in Roland and Muriel's relationship?

A turning point in a relationship is marked by a moment that reveals deeper feelings and changes how the characters relate to each other. In Roland and Muriel's story, their first kiss does exactly that. It brings their attraction into clear focus, moves them from casual or uncertain interactions to a intimate, committed connection, and shifts how they view each other and what they expect from the relationship. This moment changes the dynamic and sets the stage for what comes next in their story. The other options don't signal that emotional shift. A moment like low blood sugar is a physical event with no impact on their relationship's development. The narrator's indifference points to distance rather than a turning point. A chess game can symbolize tension or strategy, but it doesn't inherently mark the emotional breakthrough that redefines their bond. The first kiss uniquely embodies that transition into romance.

9. What organization established in 1873 was meant to negotiate peace with Indigenous tribes?

- A. Indian Affairs Department
- B. North West Mounted Police
- C. Royal Canadian Mounted Police
- D. Hudson's Bay Company

The main idea is recognizing which organization was created in 1873 to establish peace on the western frontier by managing relations with Indigenous nations. The North-West Mounted Police were formed by Parliament in 1873 with the mandate to bring law and order to the Northwest, protect settlers, and, importantly, work toward peaceful relations with Indigenous peoples through the enforcement of treaties and orderly conduct. This police force was purposely designed to prevent conflicts and to represent Canadian authority in those new lands, laying the groundwork for peaceful coexistence as the region developed. The other options don't fit this specific establishment and purpose. The Indian Affairs Department handles Indigenous policy and administration but did not originate in 1873 as the force meant to negotiate peace on the frontier. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police is the modern name for the same organization after 1920, not the 1873 founding entity. The Hudson's Bay Company is a historic fur trading company, not a government body created to negotiate peace with Indigenous tribes.

10. Which phrase denotes inquiries guiding the identification of main ideas?

A. Questions for Main Idea

B. Summary

C. Bullying

D. Social Issues

Using guiding prompts to find the main idea is the key idea here. These prompts are called Questions for Main Idea. They focus your attention on what the passage is mainly about, what point the author is making, and how the supporting details fit around that central message. By working through these questions, you can condense the text into a single, clear statement of the main idea and keep the rest of the details in perspective. The other options describe a product or topics rather than the method for locating the main idea: a summary is a brief restatement of key points, while bullying and social issues are specific subjects rather than the tool used to identify the central message.
