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Explanations

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1. What is the arc of horizon coverage for a masthead light?

- A. 225 degrees**
- B. 180 degrees
- C. 360 degrees
- D. 112.5 degrees

A masthead light is a white light that is placed at the highest point on a boat's mast. It is used to indicate the position and direction of a boat to other vessels at night. The arc of horizon coverage for a masthead light is important because it determines the maximum distance that the light can be seen from. In this case, the correct answer is 225 degrees, as this is the typical coverage for a masthead light. Option A can be eliminated as jet skis are motorized and not powered by human strength. C can also be eliminated as it includes motorized fishing boats, which are not human-powered.

5. How many fire buckets are required on boats between 12m and 24m?

Fire buckets are an essential safety feature on boats to handle any potential fire emergencies. The number of fire buckets required depends on the size of the boat. The first-aid kit can be used for any minor injuries that may occur, and having local hazard information allows the boater to avoid any potentially dangerous areas. Safety equipment should always be in working order to be ready in case of an emergency. Thus, the correct answer is option C, Personal ID Card, as it is not a mandatory equipment for safe boating.

8. What sustained wind speeds range is associated with a gale warning?

The number of fire extinguishers required on a boat primarily depends on the length of the boat and the type of appliances onboard. B, C, and D have no relevance to the amount of fire extinguishers needed on a boat. Therefore, they are incorrect options. It is important to follow the specific guidelines set forth by the Canadian Small Vessel Regulations in order to ensure proper fire safety measures on board larger vessels.
