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Explanations

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1. What is required for vessels less than 20m in length for sound-signalling?

- A. A flag signal kit
- B. A sound-signalling device (whistle) or air horn**
- C. A VHF radio
- D. A visual distress signal

Vessels less than 20m in length are not required to carry a VHF radio or a visual distress signal, as these are optional equipment for them. However, they are required to carry a sound-signalling device (whistle) or an air horn for sound-signalling purposes. The flag signal kit mentioned in option A is only required for vessels over 20m in length. Therefore, option B is the correct answer for this question.

2. How many fire buckets are required on boats between 12m and 24m?

- A. One
- B. Two**
- C. Three
- D. No fire buckets are required

Fire buckets are an essential safety feature on boats to handle any potential fire emergencies. The number of fire buckets required depends on the size of the boat. According to maritime regulations, boats between 12m and 24m are required to have two fire buckets onboard. Option A and D are incorrect because one fire bucket is insufficient and no fire buckets at all would not meet safety regulations. Option C is incorrect because three fire buckets are only necessary for boats over 24m. Therefore, the correct answer is B Two fire buckets are required on boats between 12m and 24m for safety purposes.

3. Under what condition is a magnetic compass not required on a boat?

- D. All boats require a magnetic compass regardless of conditions

A magnetic compass is not required on a boat if only option C applies - if the boat is 8m or less in length and operated within sight of navigation marks. Options A and B are not sufficient conditions on their own to exempt a boat from needing a magnetic compass. However, it is important to note that option D is incorrect because even if a boat meets the conditions in option C, it does not necessarily mean that it does not require a magnetic compass. Therefore, option D is incorrect.

4. What safety equipment is mandatory for boats up to 9m in length?

- A. A bailer or manual bilge pump and a manual propelling device or an anchor with at least 15m of line**
- B. A watertight flashlight
- C. Twelve Canadian-approved pyrotechnic distress signals
- D. A buoyant heaving line of at least 15m in length

The other options are incorrect because Option B is not applicable since it is not a safety equipment required for boats. Option C is not the correct answer because it is a requirement for boats longer than 9m, not up to 9m. Option D is also incorrect because it does not include the mandatory equipment stated in the correct answer.

5. Under what condition may operators tie to a buoy, according to the Criminal Code of Canada?

- A. Any signal or navigation buoy if no dock is available
- B. Mooring buoys only**
- C. Any buoy if the boat is less than 20 feet in length
- D. Any buoy in case of emergency only

Mooring buoys are the only acceptable option for tying to a buoy according to the Criminal Code of Canada. Option A is incorrect because it says "any" signal or navigation buoy, which is not specified in the law. Option C is incorrect because the boat length should not determine which buoy can be tied to. Option D is incorrect because emergency situations are not the only acceptable circumstance for tying to a buoy.

6. What is the recommended action for attracting attention with a distress cloth?

- A. Burying it under supplies
- B. Wearing it
- C. Spreading it on the cabin or deck top**
- D. Keeping it folded for emergencies

Wearing it may not be effective if the person is already wearing bright or distinctive colors. Burying it under supplies may make it difficult to see. Keeping it folded for emergencies is also not recommended as it is not easily visible. Spreading it on the cabin or deck top is the recommended action as it allows for the distress cloth to be seen from a distance. This option also keeps the cloth above ground and easily visible to passing ships or planes.

7. On which channel does DSC operate to provide automatic digital distress alerts?

- A. Channel 16
- B. Channel 70**
- C. Channel 9
- D. Channel 13

DSC, or Digital Selective Calling, operates on channel 70 in order to provide automatic digital distress alerts. Option A, channel 16, is the international VHF emergency channel but does not support automatic digital distress alerts. Option C, channel 9, is designated for hailing and safety and does not support automatic digital distress alerts. Similarly, option D, channel 13, is designated for navigational safety and does not support automatic digital distress alerts. Therefore, the correct answer is option B.

8. What visual signals are boats no more than 6m in length required to carry?

- A. A watertight flashlight**
- B. Three Canadian-approved pyrotechnic distress signals
- C. Twelve Canadian-approved pyrotechnic distress signals
- D. Six Canadian-approved pyrotechnic distress signals

Boats that are no more than 6m in length are typically smaller recreational boats and are not required to carry the same safety equipment as larger vessels. This is why options B, C, and D can be eliminated as they all require more than one type of pyrotechnic distress signal. These signals are typically used for larger vessels and not suitable for smaller boats. The correct answer, A, is a watertight flashlight which is a more appropriate and practical safety item for smaller boats. It can be used to signal for help in case of an emergency and can also serve as a light source in low visibility conditions. Additionally, pyrotechnic distress signals can be dangerous if not used properly, so it is important for smaller boats to carry suitable safety equipment.

9. How does the number of fire extinguishers required on a boat primarily depend?

- A. The length of the boat and type of appliances onboard**
- B. The color of the boat
- C. The speed of the boat
- D. The year the boat was made

The number of fire extinguishers required on a boat primarily depends on the length of the boat and the type of appliances onboard. This is because larger boats and boats with more appliances are more at risk for fires and require more fire extinguishers to meet safety regulations. B, C, and D have no relevance to the amount of fire extinguishers needed on a boat. The color of the boat does not impact fire safety, the speed of the boat does not affect the likelihood of a fire, and the year the boat was made is not a factor in determining the number of fire extinguishers needed. Therefore, A is the most logical and accurate answer.

10. What color are Anchorage Buoys?

A. Yellow

B. Red

C. Green

D. Blue

Anchorage buoys are color-coded in a system established by the International Association of Marine Aids to Navigation and Lighthouse Authorities. The purpose of this color-coding system is to ensure safe navigation for ships. Yellow buoys typically mark anchorage areas, meaning areas where ships can safely anchor. Buoys that are red and green indicate the edges of shipping channels, with green buoys being placed on the starboard or right side for vessels entering harbors, while red buoys are positioned on the port or left side. Blue buoys are generally used to mark the presence of navigational hazards, such as shoals or rocks. Therefore, yellow is the correct color for anchorage buoys, as it serves as a clear indicator for ships to safely anchor.
