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Explanations

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1. In what year did Prince Edward Island join Confederation?

- A. 1867
- B. 1873**
- C. 1869
- D. 1871

Prince Edward Island's entry into Confederation happened later because its decision was tied to specific terms and promises, not just a blanket move with the rest of the colonies. When Confederation began in 1867, PEI did not join then; the terms offered at that time didn't satisfy island interests and there was strong local opposition. It wasn't until 1873, after Ottawa pledged to address PEI's financial needs and to connect the island to the rest of Canada with a funded Intercolonial Railway, that PEI agreed to join. PEI became a province on July 1, 1873. So the correct year is 1873.

2. Which major constitutional change occurred in 1982?

In 1982, Canada brought its constitution home and added a charter of rights into it. This move, known as patriation, transferred the power to amend and govern the highest law from Britain to Canada, establishing a Canadian-based process for constitutional changes. Along with patriation, the Constitution Act, 1982 enshrined the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, which guarantees fundamental rights and freedoms and sets out how they are protected and applied. This combination—ending Britain's direct role in amending the Canadian constitution and placing a formal rights charter at the heart of the constitution—represents the major constitutional shift of 1982. Meech Lake was an later, incomplete 1980s attempt to modify the system; the Canada Act 1982 refers to the British statute that enabled patriation but is not by itself the full change, since the charter and the specific Canadian amending formulas are part of the same milestone.

Two new provinces were created from the Northwest Territories in 1905: Saskatchewan and Alberta. The question asks which province joined Confederation that year alongside Saskatchewan, and it's Alberta. This happened through the Alberta Act and the Saskatchewan Act, giving both provinces official status in 1905. Manitoba, Nova Scotia, and British Columbia had already become provinces earlier (Manitoba in 1870, Nova Scotia in 1867, British Columbia in 1871).

Responsible government is the system where the executive—the Prime Minister and the cabinet—must have the support of the elected legislature to govern. In this setup, the cabinet is drawn from elected representatives and can stay in office only as long as it has the confidence of the majority in the House of Commons. If the government loses a confidence vote or fails to pass crucial legislation like the budget, it is expected to resign or seek dissolution to trigger an election. This arrangement ensures the executive is directly accountable to, and dependent on, the elected representatives and, through them, the people. The other concepts describe broader structures (a ceremonial monarch within a constitutional framework, the idea that Parliament has ultimate legal authority, or an absolute monarch), but they do not capture the requirement that the executive must maintain legislative confidence.

5. Which body is the upper chamber of Canada's Parliament as established at Confederation?

At Confederation, Canada set up a two-chamber Parliament. The upper chamber is the Senate. It was created to provide regional representation and to review legislation from the elected House of Commons, offering a second layer of consideration and balance. Senators are appointed to represent provinces and regions, rather than serve as direct elected representatives. The other option, the House of Commons, is the lower chamber made up of elected Members of Parliament. The Lords is the British Parliament's upper house, not part of Canada, and the Council of Provinces isn't a formal parliamentary chamber in Canada.

6. Which option best describes the two main candidate cities for Alberta's capital?

Calgary and Edmonton were the two main candidate cities for Alberta's capital because they stood out as the province's strongest centers of population, trade, and administration at the time. Calgary was already growing as a key rail hub and commercial center in southern Alberta, offering economic vitality and easy transportation links. Edmonton had an established government presence and role as a regional administrative center, plus a central location within the province that made it a practical choice for a new capital as Alberta expanded. These factors kept Calgary and Edmonton at the forefront of discussions about where the capital should be located, while other towns like Red Deer lacked the same level of influence and infrastructure to be serious contenders.

7. Which statement describes a major trade concern for Prince Edward Island?

Prince Edward Island's major trade worry was access to wider markets beyond Britain, especially the United States. If Britain restricted or blocked PEI from trading with the U.S., the island's exports—like fish and farm goods—would face higher barriers and sell into a smaller market. Joining Confederation was seen as a way to secure more reliable access to larger markets and to build transportation links that would ease trade beyond the imperial system. That's why Britain's refusal to allow trade with the USA best explains the island's primary trade concern. The other options miss this imperial-trade emphasis or hinge on factors less central to PEI's pre-Confederation worries.

8. What event led to Manitoba's entry as a province in 1870?

The event being tested is how Manitoba joined Confederation through a political settlement that followed Métis concerns and land rights. The Red River Rebellion of 1869–1870, led by Louis Riel, put pressure on Ottawa to negotiate terms as Canada moved to admit Rupert's Land. To resolve these tensions, the Manitoba Act of 1870 was passed, creating the Province of Manitoba within Canada and outlining protections for Métis land rights and language/education. This act formalized Manitoba's entry as a province in 1870. Other options happened in different times or places and did not shape Manitoba's entry.

9. In what year did Alberta become a province?

Alberta became a province in 1905. After Confederation in 1867, the area that is now Alberta was part of the Northwest Territories. As settlement grew, the federal government created Alberta as a separate province through the Alberta Act, with provincial status taking effect on September 1, 1905. So, the year is 1905.

10. What role did William Henry Pope play in changing islanders' minds about Confederation?

William Henry Pope's influence comes from using media and public speaking to shift public opinion. He actively promoted Confederation on Prince Edward Island by writing editorials and delivering lectures that argued in favor of joining Canada. Through newspapers and public talks, he presented reasons why islanders should align with the federal plans, addressing economic and political benefits and countering opposition arguments. This kind of sustained persuasion helped change how islanders viewed Confederation and built the momentum needed for a pro-Confederation stance to take hold. He didn't lead a militia, draft Canada's constitution, or publicly oppose Confederation; instead, he worked to win support for it through communication and public persuasion.
