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Explanations

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1. What is the best way to avoid confusion with pronoun references?

- A. Replacing all pronouns with nouns to avoid confusion.
- B. Guessing the referent based on the closest noun in the current sentence.

Tracking antecedents across sentences keeps pronouns anchored to their proper referents, preventing confusion. When a noun is introduced, it becomes the candidate for later pronouns, and as you move through a paragraph, several potential referents can exist. If you don't actively map who each pronoun could refer to, a reader (or writer) might mistake one noun for another, especially when the text shifts subjects or introduces new characters. By keeping a mental or written map of who or what each pronoun points to and clarifying by reintroducing a noun when needed, you maintain a clear, continuous thread of meaning from sentence to sentence and paragraph to paragraph. This approach minimizes ambiguity, supports accurate comprehension, and makes writing more precise. The other strategies fall short because replacing all pronouns with nouns is impractical and awkward in natural writing and reading, guessing based on the closest noun in the current sentence often fails in longer or more complex passages, and skipping the pronoun removes essential connective tissue, leading to gaps in meaning.

Interpreting charts and graphs in Reading tests works best by first reading the title and axis labels to understand what is being measured and in what units, then connecting that information to the text that accompanies the graphic. The title signals the main idea, the labels explain the variables, and the axis or legend shows exactly how the data relate. By tying the graphic to the surrounding passage, you confirm the context and interpret the numbers as the author intends, which helps you answer questions that require integrating information from both sources. Starting with numeric values alone misses what is being measured; focusing only on colors or shapes ignores the data; and ignoring the text loses the explanation that gives the chart its meaning.

The term describes gaining ownership of unowned personal property by taking possession and using it as your own. In property law, occupancy is the act of asserting control over something that has no current owner, with the intent to possess it and treat it as yours. Imply means to suggest or indicate something indirectly, which isn't about ownership. Habitability deals with whether a property is suitable to live in, not how ownership of unowned items is acquired. Solicit means to request or seek something, which again isn't related to acquiring ownership through possession.

Detail questions focus on a specific fact as it appears in the text. The best approach is to locate the exact sentence that directly mentions the detail or the precise phrase that contains it, then read it in context to verify it matches what the question asks. This keeps you anchored in the writing and avoids guessing based on general impressions. To do this well, first identify the key term or fact in the question, then scan the passage for that term, a name, a date, a number, or a distinctive phrase. Once you find a likely sentence, read the surrounding sentences to make sure the detail is stated explicitly and not inferred from nearby ideas. Other strategies are helpful for different types of questions: identifying the main idea targets the overall gist of a paragraph, determining the sequence of events helps with ordering questions, and inferring the author's attitude deals with tone or stance. These approaches won't reliably yield the exact fact a detail question asks for, so focus on pinpointing the explicit sentence that mentions the detail.

5. What does a Vocabulary in Context question require?

In vocabulary in context questions, you determine a word's meaning by using how the word is placed in the surrounding sentences. The nearby text provides clues—such as synonyms or restatements, contrasts, or examples—that show the exact sense the author intends. This approach works best because the writer often uses a specific sense that fits the passage, which may differ from a dictionary's general definition. Focusing on context clues rather than memorizing definitions or worrying about spelling helps you infer the precise meaning intended in that moment, and guessing randomly isn't reliable.

Checking comprehension after reading comes down to making sure your interpretation matches what the text actually says. Re-reading the part of the passage that relates to the question lets you confirm that your understanding is supported by the exact words and details. This practice helps you catch misreadings, misremembered details, or assumptions that aren't in the passage, and it strengthens your confidence before you answer. Skipping annotations removes a useful habit for tracking where ideas come from and what evidence supports them, making it harder to locate relevant details later. Guesses made without rereading rely on memory or intuition and can easily diverge from the text. Memorizing the question and answer without checking the passage ignores the source itself, so you might recall the question but not how the text supports the answer.

An idea put forward; a suggestion is best described as a proposition. A proposition is a plan or suggestion offered for discussion or consideration. The other words don't fit: a precaution is a safety measure, mandatory means required, and tuberculosis is a disease.

Rereading the relevant part of the passage after you've chosen an answer helps you confirm that your pick is really supported by the text. This check ties your conclusion directly to the evidence, ensuring you didn't misread or over-interpret a detail, and it helps you notice qualifiers, contrasts, or examples the author used. If the specific sentence or idea lines up with what you selected, you can trust that your answer matches the passage. If it doesn't, you know to rethink based on what the text actually says. Others habits aren't good verifiers: moving on without review skips the essential check, inspecting spelling doesn't test meaning, and guessing without review isn't a reliable way to confirm understanding.

Understanding an author's perspective means figuring out who is speaking in the text—the narrator or voice the author uses—and what stance they're taking. The best approach is to look at whose voice is represented and then check whether that viewpoint is supported by evidence in the text. By focusing on voice and the actual proof the text offers—quotes, examples, data, reasoning—you can see what position the author is advocating and why. This helps you distinguish the author's stance from a character's opinions and from surface cues like tone or word choice alone. It also guards against guessing or assuming the author must be extreme or in agreement with a character. So the key idea is to identify the voice presented and verify how the text backs that perspective with evidence.

Prompt means to urge into action by giving a cue, reminder, or encouragement. It's used when you want someone to start doing something or to respond quickly, like a teacher prompting a student to answer or a notification prompting you to take an action. The other terms describe different ideas: exposure is being subjected to something, submerge means to put underwater, and reimbursement is repayment of money spent.
